

Big Deputation Oppose Any Attempt to Close Jane Street.

With only three out of the five mem-bers of the York Township Council present at Monday's meeting business might naturally be expected to move along in something of a routine, but it was one of the biggest in point of num-bers that the council chamber has held in a long time. And it all came thru the old and vexed question of the Jane-street crossing in the west end. The C. P. A MOMENTOUS CHANGE.

Municipalities, including Toronto complain of the low price their debentures bring here and in England. The World believes that the whole security market is being demoralized by that system of finance which involves in mary flotations the giving of bonus stock. In other words a lo of securities are being put out that are made up of debentures or bonds or guaranteed stock that carry with

them an amount of free or bonus commor stock. In this way, the investor has been tempted to pass the old line securities and to more or less speculate with his money (altho he imagines that it is secure) in the hope that while drawing his regular interest he will get a dividend some day on the free stock that he got. He therefore passes the cld line security. A deplorable accompaniment is that the ordinary daily press in its financial columns, probably by reason of the fact that "the interests" have got the newspapers, ignore the old line securities and unmercifully puff the new ones with the speculative side to them.

Also note that interest on mortgages in this country is steadily rising, probably also partly due to this new feature. Bankers will tell We do not propose to make any deliverance at this moment other than to call attention to the revolution that is being effected in financial methods and to the changes in the value of money brought about, as we believe, by imparting a wider range of speculation to the selling and buying of securities. The "safe" investor is becoming more speculative.

It is of good omen for the future of the United States that the people are everywhere exhibiting their willingness and determination to support men who have given ground for belief in the rectitude of their conduct and their loyalty to public rights. Governor Hughes expressed his belief that the privileges of citizenship had. never before been so highly prized, but present. he added the warning that they depended upon the constant vigilance of the citizen, his readiness to take part in active political work, his insistence upon right conduct, his demand for fidelity in public offices, his attachment to the fundamental principles

of his government and his abiding love of justice., The United States. constitution has had the defects of its qualities. The elaborate chain of checks and balances it embodies, originally designed to protect the liberties and property of the individual has been employed to injure and destroy them. 





Prof. W. C. Palmer, agricultural editor of the extension department of the State Agricultural College of North Dakota, says this in a foreword to "the ten commandments of dry farming," submitted to John T. Burns, secretary

of the Dry Farming Congress, for adoption at the fifth annual convention, in Spokane, Oct, 8 to 6, in connection with the third international exposition of dry farming products. The commandments follow:

I. Thou shalt plow deep.

Deep plowing permits rain to permeate the soil easily and without run-off, also provides more feeding space for plant roots and makes available more plant food. II. Thou shalt keep the surface soil

This prevents soil moisture from eva-poration and conserves the rainfall. Harrow grain after it is up two inches

or use weeder. III. Thou shalt cultivate level. Level soil affords the least exposure to the air and will take in rainfail faster than ridged soil. IV. Thou shalt summer fallow: IV. Thou shalt summer fallow: This should be practised in all dis-tricts where the annual precipitation is less than 15 inches, as it conserves two years' rain for one crop and kills weeds and plant diseases; land should be cultivated. Where the yearly rain-CAN BE BOTH. Hamilton correspondence that, in a fall is more than 15 inches corn is as good a preparation for a crop as the bare fallow. V. Thou shalt add organic matter to the soil. This holds moisture and plant food, improves mechanical conditions of the soil and lessens washing, drifting and blowing. Stable manure is the best form. Plow weeds under while green. VI. Thou shalt keep down the weeds. Weeds consume motisture and plaut Weeds consume moisture and plan food, crowd plants, shade crops, retard plant life and make land work harder. VII. Thou shalt grow early maturing crops. Conditions for growing are best during the early summer; winter grains are better than those sown in the spring. VIII. Thou shalt grow corn every three to five years. The cultivation required for corn saves moisture, kills weeds and plant diseases. Corn is the best preparation for a grain crop; it produces more food and fodder per acre than other crops. Do not hill up the corn, as this wastes the moisture. IX. Thou shalt grow clover or alfalfa every few years. Rotating with these grasses adds fertility and organic matter to the soil: kills weeds and diseases of plants and produces excellent hand and valuable produces excellent hand and valuable seed crops. X. Thou shalt keep stock. The most profitable way of market-ing grain and fodder is thru stock, which produces the manure necessary to the soil and brings presentation of the plenty to the dry land farmer. "Prof. Palmer's presentation of the principles of this modern method of tillage, in the shape of precepts, ap-peals strongly to membars of the local board of control." said Secretary Burns. "and it is likely that a substantial prize will be offered for the best ten commandments on dry farming. The commandments on dry farming. 
