Drills at Pearl Lake Property Reach 200 Foot Level

Better Tone in Mining Markets Develops Late in Session

Another Shake-out Early in Day Succeeded by Upward Swing to Prices—Cobalts Inactive and Steady.

World Office, Wednesday Evening, Dec. 6. Porcupine stocks displayed a somewhat steadier undertone in the late dealings in today's markets, a moderate firming up in prices being displayed as a result of the incoming of a new line of buying, formulated on the idea that the decline had gone far enough.

The market early in the day showed no perceptible improvement from its immediate predecessors, a continuation of the liquidating movement being still in effect, and a round of additional declines being shown in the usually active issues.

Trading was somewhat more active than usual, and was accepted as a good sign by floor traders, who viewed the increased speculation with satisfaction as the precursor of a broader movement, which would permit of a turn for the better in the course of prices.

Hollinger a Weak Spot. The early decline was led by the gold Porcupines, and particularly by Hollinger, which sold off 23 points to 11.05 under some draggy liquidation.

In this instance the shares continued heavy all day, and at the close were only a slight distance removed from their low point.

The whole market was influenced by the decline in the erstwhile leader, which soon found a reflection throughout the list. Ros dropped down below the three-dollar mark again, the shares retreating to 23.25, a loss of 5 points for the session, and closed bid at that figure.

In the cheaper securities declines of one to two points occurred, but it was in this section that the late recovery occurred, and here it was that traders found the one bright spot in the day's happenings.

Such issues as Dome Extension, Vipond and Pearl Lake, all more or less prominent of late, suffered from liquidation during the morning session, and in each instance a decline of the full points was shown before the movement culminated. Excellent buying was noted around the low figures, and all day, about a sharp turn for the better, in which the losses were fully made up, the three stocks closing about on a par with last night.

A prominent feature of the day was a fractional advance in Crown Chartered, which resumed its upward movement under a sustained buying demand. These shares have been one of the prominent spots in the list of late having held their own in the face of the extreme weakness which has characterized the rest of the day. After a rise of 25 points, such as the shares have undergone, this is a remarkable record.

Cobalts were quiet and unchanged in the majority of instances, Timiskaming dropped another fraction early in the day, but regained its loss during the afternoon session.

IN ORE AT 1200 FEET Deep Drilling at Pearl Lake Gold Mines Gives Good Results. The most important news yet forthcoming from the Pearl Lake Mine was received yesterday by President Cartwright.

A wire from the superintendent of the mine stated that one drill has struck a vein at a depth of 1160 feet and that it was still in ore at 1200 feet. The core shows values of over \$10 to the ton.

Two other drills are down, one 400 feet and the other 800 feet. An immense body of ore has now been proved on the Pearl Lake, more than sufficient to start up one of the big Porcupine properties.

The large electric motor ordered by the company in England, has arrived at Halifax, and will be installed during the present month.

At present, train service is inaugurated as follows: Train leaving Toronto at 8.30 p.m., arriving in Porcupine at 4.20 p.m. the following day, train leaving Porcupine at 12.20 p.m., arriving in Toronto at 7.30 the following morning.

The old train service, arriving from Kelso at 11 o'clock at night, and leaving the following morning, going to North Bay, will be continued for the present. Dining cars are carried on the three trains.

NEW DEVELOPMENT IN TIMISKAMING AFFAIR TO PROVE UP PROPERTY AT 200-FOOT LEVEL

Crown Chartered Will Cross-Cut Vein at That Depth—New Camps Going Up.

Porcupine, Dec. 4.—(From our Man up North).—Announcement is made as to the matter of the Crown Chartered will cross-cut the 200-foot level and again a cross-cut run into the sheared zone to intercept the vein matter. This work will begin at once.

The cross-cut at the 100-foot level is run to the north for a distance of 135 feet, and drifting will be done thru the vein matter.

From the bottom of the shaft in the cut, Old Keewatin country rock was encountered for approximately 47 feet. The foot-wall was then cut, and a schist and quartz stringer appeared as vein matter for about 2 feet, when a strong quartz lead was cut. The schist and quartz stringers continued in the cut till the 135-foot mark was reached in the sheared zone. The hanging wall has not been cut. The mineralized zone is an extremely large one.

A sleeping camp, one that will accommodate 60 men, is being pushed to completion. The plans call for a two-story building, 75 by 32 feet in dimensions, with a wing which is large enough to afford a kitchen, private dining-room, storeroom and sleeping rooms for the cooks.

Steam heat and hot water facilities will be provided. The building, when completed, will be one of the modern kind.

OLD-AGE PENSIONS. Editor World: There appeared in today's issue of The World a short article on the question of old age pensions in New Zealand. It is evident that progressive country is setting an example to our country and especially to Canada in caring for its aged poor. Many old men in this wealthy city have no provision made for them, but have to rely on the rates. Now, sir, I think if the authorities figured it out they would find it would be cheaper to allow old men \$2.50 a week as in New Zealand than to have to keep them in prison or some other place. Besides it is a reflection on a great country like Canada to allow itself to be outstripped in a Christian and social duty by an infant dominion like New Zealand. Surely it is time this country woke up to the urgency and importance of this question. I never hear anything said from the pulpit on the question, but the pastors seem to be more concerned about the poor in China or India than those in Canadian cities. BERLIN'S STRIKE OVER. The lockout of metal workers which began on Nov. 31 and affected between 50,000 and 60,000 men ceased to-day. A majority of the strikers were opposed to a compromise between the masters and men, which was drawn up yesterday, but as a technical ruling of the trade unions requires a two-thirds majority to reject compromise proposals and to refuse to return to work, and this majority was not obtained, the lockout has come to an end.
