J. W. Curry, K.C., who is the so-licitor for the complainant, explained to The World that Mr. Robertson was determined to compel the G-T.R. to comply with its charter and to carry passengers upon at least one train each day at the rate of a penny (two

This charter is contained in the act passed by the parliament of Canada in 1852, authorizing the road to be constructed from Toronto thru Port Hope, Cobourg and Belleville to Kingston, and thence to Montreal (16 Vic. Ch. 37). Section 3 of the act defines the accommodations to be furnished, and the fares to be charged as follows:

And be it enacted, that the gauge of the said railway shall be five feet six inches; and the fare or charge for each firstclass passenger by any train on the said railway shall not exceed two pence currency for each mile traveled, the fare or charge for each second class passenger by any train on the said railway shall not exceed one penny and one half penny currency for each mile traveled, and the fare or charge for each third class passenger by any train on the said railway shall not exceed one penny currency for each mile traveled; and that at least one train having in it third class carriages shall run every day thruout the length of the line."

It is a matter of common knowledge that the G.T.R. has ignored that part of the act providing for a shird-class carriage and a two-cent fare, but in order to prepare his case,

every eastbound train and tendered ever reason apologizes for crime or legal fare of two cents a mile. The ticket agent has uniformly refused to sell him a third class-ticket, and he has been ejected from every G.T.R. train going east from Toronto upon tendering the legal fare and re-fusing to pay a higher rate than two

His characterized Chas, Murphy's action at the Buffalo convention as an "astonishing and unpriicipled per-formance" and asked if it "would not better for Tammany to be defeated nighting for a principle than to dishonor itself by outraging the principles of Jefferson."

CHICAGO POLICE SAY

Chas. Norton Arrested for Swindling Operations All Thru the States - Negotiable Papers Found in His Room to the Value of \$2,000,000.

Chicago, Nov. 1.—Charles Whitney Norton, said by the police and postal authorities to be responsible for extensive swindling operations, is under arrest here and will be turned over to

tensive swindling operations, is under arrest here and will be turned over to the federal officers by the local police, who took him into custody. It is claimed that Norton has defrauded people in all parts of the United States out of bonds and securities amounting to \$3,000,000.

A federal warrant was served upon Norton late in the afternoon, and he was taken to the county jail. He will be arraigned to-morrow before United States Commissioner Foote.

The specific case for which Norton was arrested is in connection with the stock of the Monarch Mining and Smelting Co. of Arizona. A businessman in Peoria, Ills., secretary of the mining company, sent to Norton for sale 8000 shares of the stock. This man, falling to obtain either the stock or its price from Norton, resigned and came to Chicago, where he engaged in the brokerage business. Norton, after returning to this city, entered tha Chicago office of the former Peoria man and offered him the same stock, which he had given to Norton for sale. His arrest followed within a short time. It is claimed by the federal authorities that Norton was enabled to make deals for stock business on highly favorable, but forged reports of himself; said to be issued by a prominent mercantile agency. It is claimed by the officers that Norton would obtain stock from any person who would trust him, and agree to sell it in the market. He might, the police declare, sell the stock and he might retain it, but the result to the person owning the stock was the same. which they were serving.

After this the supreme court is privy council will determine whether the modus vivendi overrides the col-onial enactments. The government, furthermore, expects that threats of prosecution will deter the colonists from going beyond the marine boundary to join American vessels, and that the latter will therefore be unable As this would nullify the spirit of the modus vivendi, which agrees that mobody shall be penalized for joining American vessels, it is expected to result in trouble between the cabinets at London and Washington.

THE DIFFICULTY EXPLAINED.

Hon. A. B. Morine, now of Toronto but formerly leader of the opposition in the parliament of Newfoundland, and ex-minister of fisheries for the island colony, was the guest at the Empire Club luncheon yesterday. He explained at some length the recent disturbance in Newfoundland respectthe fisheries and contended that imperial government had shown to the colony every consideration. He more than intimated that the present outcry was largely a matter of local politics. He strongly favors the annexation of Newfoundland with Can-

"The fishermen of the United States resort to Newfoundland for two purposes: First, to secure bait for carrying on a deep sea fishery on the grand banks; secondly, to obtain herring for food purposes in the autumn and early winter, which fishery is known as the herring fishery, or the winter herring fishery," said Mr. Morine.

"The Americans have a right to fish of all kinds on the west coast, including

cluding herrings, by virtue of the treaty of 1818. On the south coast and the east coast they have no treaty rights. The winter herring fisheryso called-is, therefore, not only different from the bait fishery in the maner and period of its prosecution, and its object, but it differs in this harked respect—it involves difficult uestions of treaty rights.

"The words of the treaty of 1818 bearing upon this subject are as follows: It is agreed that the inhabitants of the United States shall have forever in common with the subjects of His Britannic Majesty liberty to take fish of every kind on that pay take fish of every kind on that part





In the second round Kaufman landed with his right on Berger's jaw and floored him. Berger stayed down nine seconds and came up groggy.

After the third round Kaufman fought in close and did damaging work with right and left uppercuts that Berger apparently culd not avoid. In the last few rounds Berger grew steadily weaker. His legs worbled and his blows lacked steam. Occasionally he would stand up and swing, but he seldom landed. All the time Kaufman was boring in and uppercutting in the clinches. In the ninth round Berger went down for the count from a right to the jaw. He got up and Kaufman beat Berger into a state of helplessness. Forger could not hold up his hands or head and was about to fall to the floor when his seconds threw up the sponge.

In the early part of the fight Berger shewed signs of cleverness, but he lacked steem. Kaufman was slower, but strong and kept after his man all thru the fight. For a heavyweight fight it was a fast contest. Both men weighed in late this afternoon and Berger fipped the beam at about 190 pounds. Kaufman were both right for their battle. Berger was a slight favorite over the young blacksmith, the betting to-day going to 10 to 9 in his favor. This is one point better than yesterlay, when the best to be obtained was 10, to 8.

(2) To obtain the best legal advice as to the legal position of the shareholders, including the right of the shareholders or the bank to recover from the directors.

(3) To acquire proxies from shareholders for the special meeting called by the curator for Dec. II.

It was stated that the committee will report the result of their findings at the meeting on Dec. 11. The committee expressed themselves as being anxious to work in harmony with the curator and the advisory board, and are of the opinion that their organization will be a great benefit to the shareholders of the bank in general.
