TO PROSECUTE FISHERMEN DESPITE MODUS VIVENDI

Newfoundland Government Announces a Policy That May Stir Up Considerable Trouble.

St. John's, Nfld., Nov. 1.—The colonial government has decided to test the validity of the modus vivendi. It has issued an official notice to-day enforcing the Bait Act, which forbids Newfoundlanders to fish on board foreign vessels with intent to prosecute one or more colonial fishermen who have been paid off by American vessels on the three-mile limit, after these men have been paid off by American vessels on which they were serving.

Franchise May Be Transferred to Syracuse, Backed by Buckenberger

Syracuse, Nov. 1.—President John H. Farrell of Auburn has called the annual meeting of the New York State League to be held in the Vanderbilt Hotel here Friday night at 8 o'clock. Representatives of all the clubs will be present. The plan is to be officially announced to Scranton and tentative plans for the next playing season will be made.

Whether Syracuse will again be represented in the State League becomes more and more of an open question. There is no doubt that Atlanta Field will never be a success and there exists the risk of any suitable playing ground in the city. Moreover, there has now arisen the possibility that the City of Montreal will be selected for membership in the Eastern League.

The Montreal franchise, owned by the New York Americans, which doubtless is transferred to some American city, and A. C. Buckenberger is backing the plan of placing it in Syracuse. If negotiations go thru and a suitable ground is furnished by the Rapid Transit Company or other interests, Eastern League ball may again be had here. It was not a success but if Syracuse got an Eastern League franchise the State League franchise would go elsewhere. Geo. N. Kuntzschke, when questioned last night, seemed indifferent to its ultimate fate. Sandy Griffin is reported to feel the same way.

It is also said that Scranton is ambitious to break into the Eastern League. There may be real rivalry between two or more cities over the question of Montreal's successor.
