him. "That every such person, contractor or sub-contractor who has under him, or who employs, workmen or laborers, and who wilfully vlotates the provisions of this Act, is guilty of an indictable offence and liable to a penalty not ex-ceeding one thousand dollars or to im-prisonment for a term not exceeding six months, or to both penalty and impris-onment, in the discretion of the court."

Then, as to macadam, while this is a good road in its place, it is not fit for a city pavement, unless on boulevards and drives-confined to light driving, as being easier on horses' feet. But on a city street it is always, as our citizens know, either covered with dust or mud, and on a city thoroughfare. Is the most expensive of all pavements to keep in repair. For example, Queen-street-avenue was thor-oughly macadamized in the spring of 1896 and a portion of it had to be done again last fall, and the balance must be done again soon. Gravel roads are only fit for country side-roads. It is not durable enough for a country main road. See Parkdale gravel "pavements" of a year ago-now mud roads. As to cedar block pavements, it is not necessary to speak. Asphalt for cities is the result of all past experiments. It is always smooth, is ensilv renaired never dusty, except where the dust is carried on to it from the neigh-boring mud (macadam, gravel and old block) roads, in the immediate vicinity.
