Daily Telegraph's Correspondent Cables That He is Convinced That Such is the Case—General Massacre in Honan and Shansi.

United States Officials Are Beginning to Feel That They Have Been "Faked" By the Chinese in Regard to Conger's Messages—Has Prince Tuan Been Killed?—Sheng Says Legations Are Being Fed.

London, July 26 (4 a.m.)—Mr. Lyman Gage's statement that there is still hope but it is constantly diminishing is held here to define accurately the situation. The Chinese Minister in London, Sir John S. P. Lee, yesterday received a cable from Sheng, Director of Railways and Telegraphs, to the effect that an Imperial decree in the following terms was issued on July 24:

It is fortunate that all the foreign representatives, except Baron Von Ketteler, are found in safety and unharmed. Provisions in the shape of food stuffs, vegetables and fruits will be supplied to the legations in order to show our courtesy."

It is possible some of these may have been murdered also, the Rev. Mr. Ewing of the Toronto branch of the mission thinks it possible that two of the three children may have been attending school at Che Foo. Prepare for Advance. Thus, despite the daily alternation between hope and fear, the reiterated Chinese assertions of the safety of the Minister fall to carry conviction, and the decision of the United States not to delay military measures is approved as the only possible course to pursue.

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Says Missionaries Still Alive. London, July 27.—The Shanghai correspondent of The Daily Telegraph says: Trustworthy information which reached me today (Friday) convinces me that all the Ministers, except Baron Von Ketteler, are still alive.

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MONTREAL HAS A MYSTERY LOOKS BAD FOR GERALD SIFTON IF MORDEN TELLS THE TRUTH

Witness Swore That the Accused Offered Him a Large Sum of Money to "Do Away With the Old Man"—Startling Testimony in Preliminary Trial at London.

London, Ont., July 27.—The interim sessions room at the Court House was crowded this morning when the preliminary examination into the circumstances connected with the death of Joseph Sifton was commenced before Justice Smith. The prisoner, Gerald Sifton and Walter Herbert, were visibly affected as the examination proceeded. Mr. T. W. Sennet and Mr. I. F. Helmuth appeared on behalf of Sifton, and Crown Attorney Magee conducted the Crown's case.

The evidence taken up till 1 o'clock, when an adjournment was made for lunch, contained nothing of a startling nature, although some of it may have importance as the testimony accumulates.

The case was adjourned to 5 p.m. till 1 o'clock Saturday morning.

HE KILLED FOUR POLICEMEN BEFORE BEING HIMSELF SLAIN

Robert Charles, a New Orleans Negro Desperado, Sold His Life Dearly—The Whole City in a State of Frenzy—Warehouses Set on Fire—Military Called Out.

New Orleans, La., July 27.—(Special) Robert Charles and Corporal John Lally were killed by a negro at the corner of Saratoga and Chestnut streets this afternoon at 4:30 o'clock, and Officer Jackson wounded.

At this time the ambulance arrived and two citizens volunteered to go into the alley-way and bring out the body of Lally. They entered and saw the dead officer from that of his colleague, Charles fired again. The citizens nevertheless got Lally's body out of the alley and afterwards succeeded in taking Porteous' body out also.

It was then seen that Charles did not pose to take the body of the dead officer in the alley. After a time he came to the window, and as citizens, one by one, entered the alley he blazed away at them.

Decided to Burn Him Out. Ultimately it was concluded by those who were handling the situation that the only way to get Charles was to burn the building in which he was entrenched. This was done, and he was finally forced out to meet death.

Others Who Are Missing. Washington, July 27.—The State Department is in receipt of a cable despatch from Consul Fowler at Che Foo, in reply to one sent him asking information of missionaries in China. Mr. Fowler, in his reply, says that only one missionary, presumably French, he remembers to be in the interior of Honan. At Shanghai only Americans are situated. Those not rescued are the persons who went to Pekin belonging to the American Board of Foreign Missions, and are the wife of Arthur Smith and wife, Wickoff Sisters, Chapin, wife and two children. Their names were given in a previous despatch, in which Mr. Fowler said he believed that only two foreigners were in the interior, both French.

The cablegram is somewhat confused, but is given out exactly as received by the State Department. It probably means that the Americans who were killed comprised the Sinton family, either man or woman named Taylor and named Sinton and the Misses Gould and Morrill.

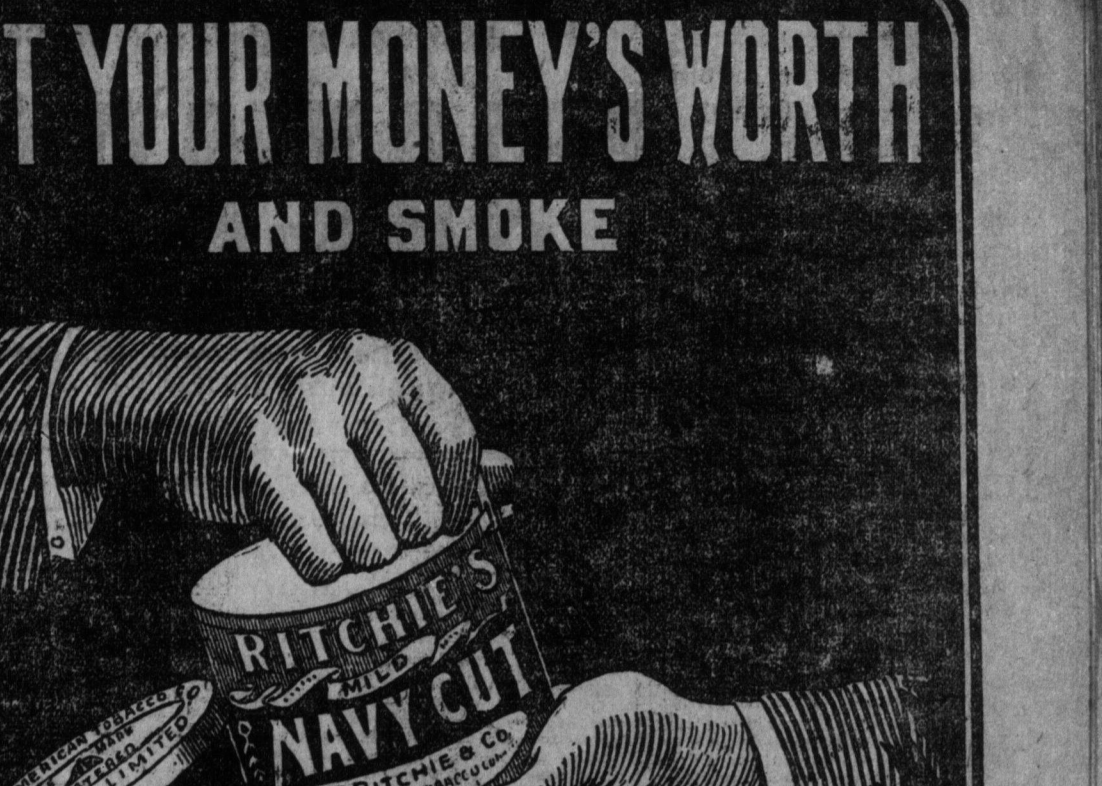

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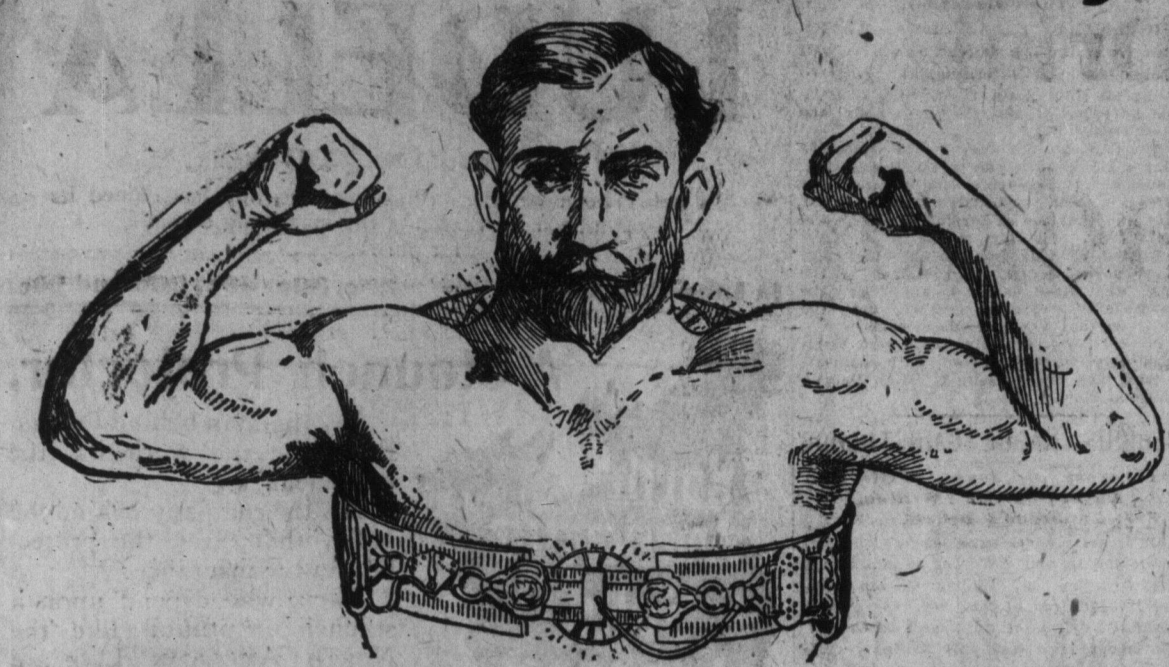

PEACE REIGNS AT PANAMA.

The Civil War in Colombia is Over After a Desperate and Bloody Battle.

REVOLUTIONISTS SURRENDERED.

Will Hand Over Their Arms and Return the Government Grants a General Amnesty.

New York, July 27.—A treaty of peace between the Government and the revolutionists has been signed, says a special to The Herald from Panama.

This action followed directly after the most desperate battle of the entire revolution, in which the losses on each side were very heavy.

Rebels Fought Desperately. The rebel troops made charge after charge upon the trenches of the government forces, pushing forward with a reckless courage.

The tide was turned by the arrival of an express train from Colon of 800 fresh troops to reinforce the government and the rebels withdrew.

Dead and dying men were lying along the Colón road beyond the railroad bridge for half a mile, sometimes scattered a few feet apart, and more often heaped together in a narrow trench.

Red Cross Corps at Work. As quickly as possible the Red Cross corps, under the direction of Dr. Carlos Mendon, secretary-general of the Revolutionary Government, went to the old station of the Panama Railroad.

Surrender and Amnesty. Under the terms of this treaty the surrender of the insurgents is complete. They agree to deliver up all arms, ammunition and ships in their possession.

The Insurrection. The insurrection in this city is already gradually subsiding and there is general rejoicing that the fighting has ended without the threatened bombardment of Panama.

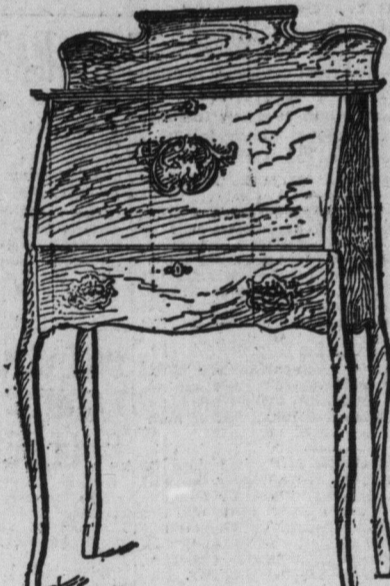

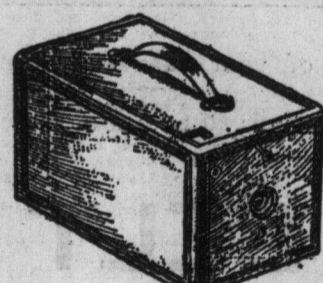

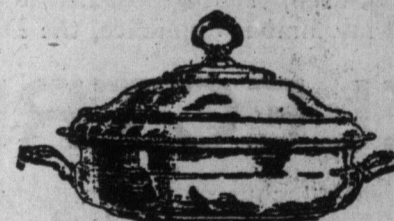

SCORES' High-Class Cash Tailors.
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THE OUTLOOK FOR BUSINESS

No Import: Changes in Trade and Speculation—Demand in Some Sections.

IMMENSE CORN CROP PROMISED.

Cancelled Orders for Fall Goods Are Being Renewed in the West.

New York, July 27.—Breadstuffs for tomorrow will say.
Important changes in trade and speculation are notably lacking this week, but counter currents of demand in various sections and industries tend a rather more than usually irregular appearance to the general situation. Amongst the favorable features calling for notice are the practical assurance of an immense corn crop for the recent copious rains in the farther west, the continued cheerful reports from the sections which have gathered and are now marketing a large quantity when cool, and advice of continued improvement in tone in the Northwest, with reports of renewals of earlier cautious orders for fall goods, fairly satisfactory gains in growing rubber, and, less well known in price of the country, a leading cereal products, based on renewed buying exports, rather than an enquiry for raw wool by manufacturers.

The Unfavorable Elements.
Trade in dry goods, at the east particularly, seems backward, pending a clearer realization of the cotton goods situation. Business failures are smaller, numbering 183, as compared with 202 last week, 170 in this week a year ago, 190 in 1898, 235 in 1897, and 221 in 1896.

Wheat, including flour, shipments for the week aggregate 2,368,743 bushels, against 2,622,383 bushels last week, 3,306,485 bushels in the corresponding week of 1899, 3,022,262 bushels in 1898, 2,348,021 bushels in 1897 and 2,646,748 bushels in 1896. Corn exports for the week aggregate 3,204,745 bushels, against 4,212,129 bushels last week, 2,770,320 bushels in this week a year ago, 2,601,821 bushels in 1898, 2,482,757 bushels in 1897 and 1,465,812 bushels in 1896.

Activity for Summer in Canada.
Seasonable summer activity is reported in Canadian trade, and manufacturers are well supplied with orders. Prices are fairly well held, and some advance in refined sugar is said to have operated as a check to retail distribution of that product. Meat, in addition to reporting the above, notes that the heavy rainfall has injured some crops, and collections are poor. Veterinary reports are good at Halifax, and collections are better. Toronto reports re-assertion of good volume in fall business looked good, and the outlook for Ontario trade favorable because of the good wheat crop, thus partly making up for smaller trade from Manitoba due to only half a crop of wheat in that province. Grain exports in Canada, lumbering has resulted from the new export law. Bank clearing at six cities aggregate \$20,154,374, a decrease of \$3 per cent. last week, but a gain of 4 per cent. over last year. Canada fall number 15, as against 28 last week, 10 in this week a year, 24 in 1898, 32 in 1897 and 24 in 1896.

WHAT DUN'S REVIEWER SAYS.
Producers and Consumers Are Getting Together—Improvement in Iron Trade.
New York, July 27.—R. G. Dun & Co.'s weekly review of trade-to-morrow will say: Speculative activity in raw materials is not present to discourage new business. Producers and consumers are getting together more than ever, and a correction, although the summer inactivity is emphasized by disturbed foreign relations and the cessation always attending a national political campaign.

Wool and Cotton.
A stop to the decline in wool brought many manufacturers into the market asking terms. Sales of wool at the three chief markets were only 4,367,000 pounds, against 10,773,500 last year. Cotton improved slightly, and more business occurred in cotton goods.

Better Tone in Iron.
Similarly in iron, the depression in which has resulted in hesitation and fear in other industries, the tone is better; and in the Pittsburgh district the mills have booked a decrease of four per cent. in orders for structural and bridge materials are better.

Shoes and Leather.
Jobbers in boots and shoes are demanding prompt delivery on old orders, but new business is scarce. Manufacturers are taking leather only for immediate needs, but sole is more active in a large city for belting at a moderate concession is reported. Packer hides sell freely at Chicago at the recent reduced price.

As to Wheat Crop.
It was not surprising that wheat declined still further this week, for the price had been held far above the quotation ruling at this date in 1896, and crop conditions are so generally satisfactory as to assure an abundance for all home requirements and a usual amount for export. High prices have curtailed foreign buying to some extent, and in four weeks Atlantic exports of wheat including foreign have been only 7,204,436 bushels, against 8,430,431 last year.

Fullers for the week were 231 in the United States against 151 last year, and 28 in Canada against 10 last year.

The Pasture in Canada.
Moderate improvement is noticed in many lines of trade in the Dominion of Canada. Crop conditions are decidedly more favorable on the whole, and this has a helpful influence on general business. Halifax reports a promising crop outlook and healthy financial conditions throughout Nova Scotia. Trade is quiet at St. John, but not unusually so for the season, and the fall outlook is encouraging, with collections fairly good. Business is satisfactory for the season at Montreal, and country collections are fair to good. Heavy metals are dull, but good orders are received for shelf hardware. Groceries more freely, but local buying of leather is dull. Exports of leather and cheese are satisfactory. Trade continues favorable, but damp weather has an unfavorable effect on growing crops in Quebec. There is moderate trade in hardware, metals and leather at Toronto, and groceries are in fair demand, with the general outlook considered satisfactory. Sales are good for the season in clothing, groceries and hardware, at Hamilton, and crops are much improved by recent rains. Wholesale reports the volume of trade light at Winnipeg, and collections continue slow. Shipments to the north make trade active at Victoria, and local business shows signs of improvement in retail lines.
