



Bogoliepoff, the Russian Minister of Public Instruction (who, as cabled last might, has been sentenced to 20 years' penal ser vitude with a loss of civil rights). Was Cotton and Flannel Shirt Waists. strictly secret. Admittance was only by card. Among those present were the Ministers of Justice, of the Interior and of Finances. Only 50 cards were distributed. Karpovich spoke for an hour regarding the student trubles under Bogoliepoff, and the disorganization of the universities. The
