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North Grey Appeal Argued. Judgment Reserved By Mr. Justice MacLennan in Respect to the Spoiled Ballots.

HON. S. H. BLAKE, K.C., FOR MR. BOYD. Held That the Four Votes in St. Vincent Township Should Go to the Conservative.

In the Court of Appeal yesterday Mr. Justice MacLennan heard the argument in the North Grey election appeal on behalf of George M. Boyd, the Conservative candidate. The successful candidate, A. G. McKay, also appears against Judge Morrison's decision respecting a number of ballots cast in the late Ontario elections.

Mr. Boyd was represented by Hon. S. H. Blake, K.C., and W. D. McPherson, and the Liberal candidate by George H. Watson, K.C., and Grayson Smith of Owen Sound.

CORONATION WEEK BEGUN

King Edward and Queen Alexandra Arrived in London Yesterday From Windsor.

RAS MAKONNEN A BIG ATTRACTION

Suggestion Made That at Same Time Throat Empire the National Anthem Be Sung.

London, June 23.—King Edward and Queen Alexandra arrived in London from Windsor at 12.30 to-day. His Majesty appeared to be in his usual health.

With the return of the court to London the festival of the coronation of King Edward may be said to have commenced, and each day until midnight Saturday, when the last gun of the royal salute will be fired by the fleet at Spithead, will furnish its quota of the attractions which promise to make the week memorable.

From today the special ambassadors, envoys and guests invited to join in the festivities become the guests of the King.

Through the day numbers of royal presents have been arriving from the continent. They were met at the railroad stations by royal carriages and guards of honor, and were escorted to the official residences assigned to them.

Consequently, plenty of entertainment was provided for the crowds of sight-seers filling the streets. A big throng took the opportunity of greeting the King and Queen on their entry into the Capital and semi-state progress to Buckingham Palace.

Accompanied by the King's household and a detachment of the Royal Guards, along the route were followed by the late Queen Victoria.

Abolitionists an Attraction. One of the special envoys who arrived, they include, officers of the greatest European dynasties, aroused as much interest as did Ras Makonnen, the victorious Ethiopian general, and special representative of King Menelik.

Mark, their Majesties reached Paddington at 12.30 p.m. and proceeded in semi-state splendor by the Victoria line with positions, preceded by outriders, and attended by an escort of the Royal Household, along the route were followed by the late Queen Victoria.

Hon. Thomas Chapais, president of the St. Jean Baptiste Society, having cabled congratulatory messages to King Edward upon his approaching coronation, and to the Pope, assuring the Catholic Church, sympathetic messages of thanks and best wishes have been received from both.

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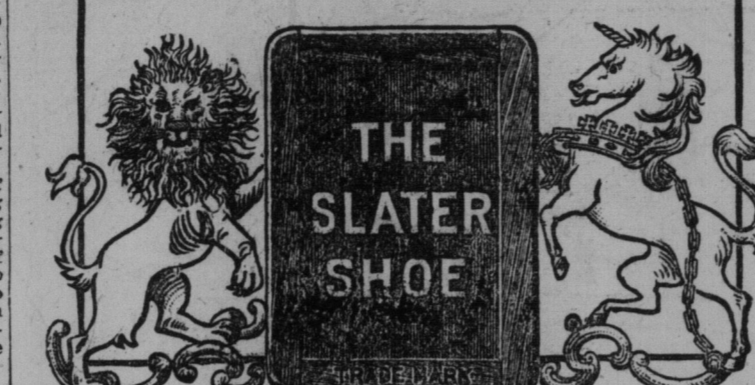

In the course of his reply Lord Kitchener, referring to the country of his nativity, and paid a special tribute to the services of the Irish troops during the South African war.

Subsequently, at a luncheon, in accepting the presentation of a sword of honor, Lord Kitchener took the responsibility of having enforced martial law in Cape Colony. He declared it had prevented a general rebellion by stopping the dissemination of lies. Now he asked for the suppression of all racial feelings and feelings and feelings. Lord Kitchener's speech was so full of kindly feelings and feelings and feelings that the rebels would not be dealt with vindictively.

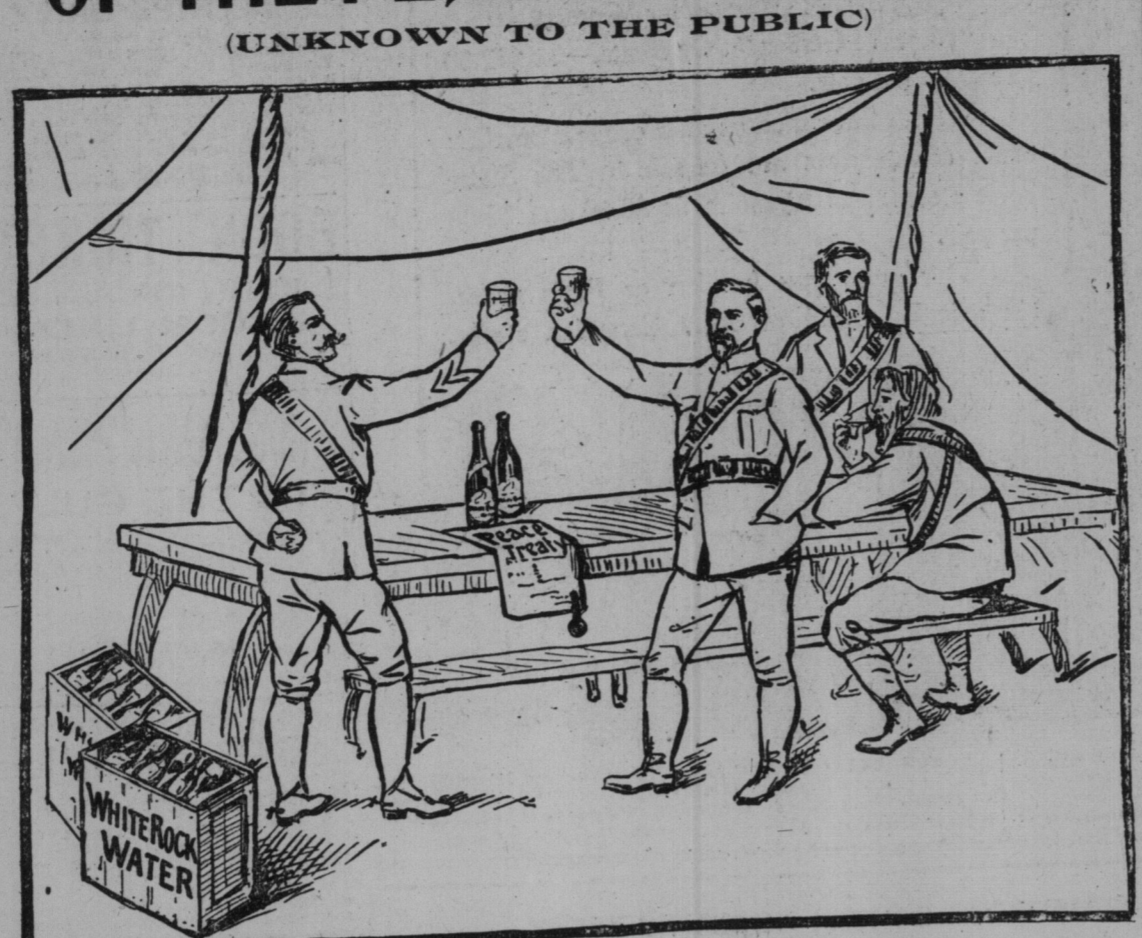

Rochester, June 23.—The twenty-third annual convention of the Knights of St. John was opened here to-day for a four-day session. It is estimated that fully 10,000 St. John's knights and friends are in the city. A grand international parade, in which fully 5,000 participated, took place this afternoon.

New York, June 23.—William McQueen, an alleged Anarchist, who is charged with having incited violence at Paterson last week, was arrested here to-day. McQueen took his arrest coolly. He said he was born in Scotland, was 28 years of age, and was an editor.
