This does not exclude the idea of a very profitable trade between the two countries. It is not a question of whether we have no doubt that it will be enlarged without interfering with the development of Canada.

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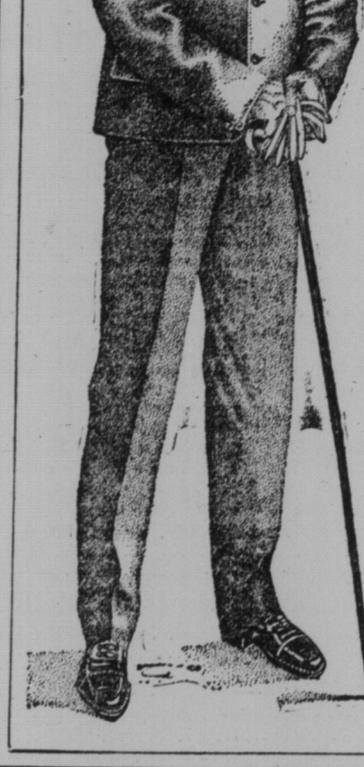

SINGLE TAXERS TO THE MAYOR

Say That Scarcity of Houses May Cause Migration of the Working Classes.

HOW NEW STATUTES AFFECT COUNCIL

Need of More Civic Dumping Grounds—Court of Revision and Ward 4 Appeals.

The Single Tax Association have addressed the following letter to the Mayor, on the matter of the scarcity of houses:

"The scarcity of small houses for the people of moderate means is becoming a question of moment. According to a recent paper your office has, of late, been greatly bothered with complaints of people disappointed in their quest for such houses.

"We are not advocating that the city should become a landlord and build the necessary houses for rent; a better plan would be to encourage private enterprise. This might be done in two ways, either by bounting, or by stopping, discounting, but do at present. Bounting is at all times bad, but the latter course is never so bad as when it is applied to a public utility.

How It Works Out.

"A tax on houses discourages their building and therefore their cost; so that reducing the taxes on houses we are going to encourage their building and consequently reduce their cost. A tax on land acts differently, but on the same result. It discourages speculators from holding it idle and consequently encourages their building on it.

We are perfectly safe in saying that this exemption will not encourage small houses that it will not be long before the demand will be practically filled.

"We would respectfully suggest to you that you should have the City of Toronto's attention directed to the necessity of carrying it into effect."

Mayor's Salary Raised.

The new act providing for the election of the Board of Control by the city at large is causing much comment throughout the city at present. The controllers are no longer to be known as aldermen, although they have a seat in the City Council.

Street Commissioner Jones is advocating the purchase of a tug and two motor launchers for the purpose of carrying out street cleanings and sweepings to the island, to be used for filling in the lagoons, and as a surface dressing on the sand bars.

"There are, throughout the city, many low lying vacant lots, which would make ideal spots for dumping purposes, but the owners seem to be afraid of the street sweepings and desire only 'good, clean earth,' hence the island is the only place which presents itself as being at all available.

"City Engineer Rust says a tug would cost in the neighborhood of \$4000, and the launchers, of \$2500 each. The cost of the tug would be saved many times over by the advantage derived from its use.
