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



PHILADELPHIA, Pa., Nov. 11.—Declaring that the youth of China, the younger and more progressive element in the nation, would in a great revolution overthrow the present dynasty, Rev. William Christie, a missionary at the Christian and Mission Alliance, stated that great disturbances were about due in the celestial empire, and also that a war with Japan was in contemplation.
