The first fruits of The World's campaign for justice for telephone users in Toronto and suburbs were plucked yesterday afternoon, when the special committee appointed by the city council to investigate the question of the phone rates met at the city hall.

The committee, which consisted of Controllers Ward and Harrison and Aldermen Chisholm, Church, Maguire, McGhle, Vaughan, R. H. Graham, O'Neil and Bredin, were all present.

Fight For Cheaper Phones. Ald. Church coupled the chair, reviewed the history of the question. In-1995, he said, when Sir William Mulock was postmaster-general, a select committee of parliament was appointed to look into the question. The recommendations of this committee, however, had never been adopted. Favor Referendum on Govt. Telephones.

The following resolutions were adopted by the special committee of the city council on telephones:

That the City of Toronto renew its application to the Ontario Government for a referendum on the question of taking over by the government of the telephone service thruout the province and that the cities and towns of Ontario be requested to co-operate in having a vote of the people taken on January 1, 1910.

That application be made to the Board of Railway Commissioners for Canada for an order to define the terms for telephones in the City of Toronto, both for business and for residence purposes.

That it be recommended to the city council that the city solicitor be authorized to secure the services of such expert assistance as he may deem necessary in the preparation of a case for the railway board.

That a sub-committee, consisting of Controllers Harrison and Ward, Aldermen Maguire, Church and McGhie, be appointed to investigate the complaints filed against the Bell Telephone Co., and to assist the city solicitor in securing evidence to be placed before the Board of Railway Commissioners.

It was a panic of sentiment—a disaster caused by the fear of something that did not. It frightened people into withdrawing their money from circulation.

As far as the mental attitude of the public is. oncerned, we are on a saner basis today than we were in 1907." Mr. Harriman spoke haltingly often stopping as if groping for words to match his thoughts. His voice and manner were those of a man worn phy-







So we will not go under mother's own assumption that the old furniture and the shabby carpets will "do" well enough with simply a "clean pair of cur-

We advocate first a Bedstead of mahogany or English walnut.

The Carpet should come right to the base board at the wall—an Arminster or a Wilton of mellow tone, a green preferably, with a large, but subdued pattern.

Curtains of Brussels net, with a dainty figure or frilled muslin. If you think you would like something nicer still, we suggest curtains of cream scrim, with Torchon lace and insertion. Over curtains of chints, recalling the carpet design.

The walls should be papered in a chintzed effect of greens and mauve, in a small dainty pattern.

The Dressing Table should be fitted with accessories, which carry a touch of the mauve where possible, as should the cushions; bedrom boxes and upholstery. The bed cover should be of net similar to the curtains, underlined with mauve or green sateen. Bolster rell, if any treated with similar colors.
