## Phone Committee Ask Ontario Cabinet For Referendum on Provincial System

**Extortion and Discrimination of Bell Company To Be Referred To Railway Commission Who Will Be Asked To Grant Relief—Sub-Committee Named To Prepare Case for the People Against Monopoly.**

The first fruits of the World's campaign for justice for telephone users in Toronto and suburbs were placed yesterday afternoon, when the special committee appointed by the city council to investigate the question of the phone rates met at the city hall.

The committee, which consisted of Controllers Ward and Harrison and Aldermen Chisholm, Church, Maguire, McGhie, Vaughan, R. H. Graham, O'Neil and Bredin, were all present.

**Fight For Cheaper Phones.**  
Ald. Church occupied the chair, reviewed the history of the question. In 1895, he said, when Sir William Mullock was postmaster-general, a select committee of parliament was appointed to look into the question. The recommendations of this committee, however, had never been adopted. Certain legislation, it was true, had been introduced giving the railway commission power to regulate telephone rates, but this had not as yet been productive of results.

He instanced Alberta and Manitoba, where, thru governmental control, the rates had been cut in half, and went on to speak of the exorbitant charges exacted from citizens of West Toronto, Deer Park, East Toronto and other suburbs.

He hadn't much hope of anything being done by the commission, and thought it high time that the whole matter should be brought to the attention of the provincial government. The people of Toronto, he said, had been suffering from monopoly for a long time.

**Must Have Fair Play.**  
Ald. Vaughan was of the opinion that it was up to the committee to see that the people got fair play. He declared emphatically that there should be a rate cut all over the city. There was no more reason, he said, why a man should have to pay more for his phone because he was a considerable distance away from the central station than in case of a near-by user.

Ald. Chisholm mentioned the district beyond Danforth-road, where, he said, there was a lot of trouble. There was no agreement for a phone and had paid \$25, but that it had not been installed as yet, although there were other phones within 100 yards of his store.

William Foster, who has a lumber yard at Dovercourt-road, on the north side of the C.P.R. tracks, complained that he had paid \$80 for the last two years, although on the other side of the tracks only \$50 was charged.

**Over One Hundred Complaints.**  
The chairman announced that he had received over 100 complaints from citizens, which were held in confidence.

Controller Ward said that the local merchant at West Toronto paid a rate of \$25. He was probably satisfied with this for his local business. He would like to hear what these men thought of the proposal to make a rate of \$50 over the city.

Ald. Maguire gave it as his opinion that since there was no agreement at present in force between the city and the phone company, the only thing left to be done was to appoint a sub-committee to collect evidence and to go before the railway commission.

Ald. Bredin spoke of the extortionate charges for and the inconveniences of two party lines, which he declared were beginning to be quite common in the outlying districts.

The sub-committee to collect evidence was appointed, and the resolutions outlined above were passed and the committee concluded its labors. It is now up to the sub-committee.

**NELD. FINANCES SHOW DEFICIT**  
\$150,000 Behind Last Year—Extensive Program Laid Down.  
ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., June 1.—The colony ran behind \$150,000 in its finances during the fiscal year, according to a statement to be submitted to the legislature. The report shows a deficit of \$150,000, for which a loan bill will have to be passed at this session.

## Favor Referendum on Govt. Telephones.

The following resolutions were adopted by the special committee of the city council on telephones:  
That the City of Toronto renew its application to the Ontario Government for a referendum on the question of taking over by the government of the telephone service throughout the province and that the cities and towns of Ontario be requested to co-operate in having a vote of the people taken on January 1, 1910.

That application be made to the Board of Railway Commissioners for Canada for an order to define the terms for telephones in the City of Toronto, both for business and for residence purposes.

That it be recommended to the city council that the city solicitor be authorized to secure the services of such expert assistance as he may deem necessary in the preparation of a case for the railway board.

That a sub-committee, consisting of Controllers Harrison and Ward, Aldermen Maguire, Church and McGhie, be appointed to investigate the complaints filed against the Bell Telephone Co., and to assist the city solicitor in securing evidence to be placed before the Board of Railway Commissioners.

## IS MONTROSE WRIGHT IN CHURCH TROUBLE?

Special Meeting of Brantford District Will Be Held to Consider Whether He is to Be 'Passed.'

BRANTFORD, June 1.—(Special).—The stationing committee of the Hamilton Conference continued its session here to-day, with no prospect of a first draft before to-morrow.

One new feature which has developed in connection with the conference is the case of Clair Montrose Wright, the young divinity student who figured conspicuously in the Kinrade case. He is a probationer of the Hamilton Conference, being connected with Brantford District, which he left one year ago to attend Victoria College at Toronto.

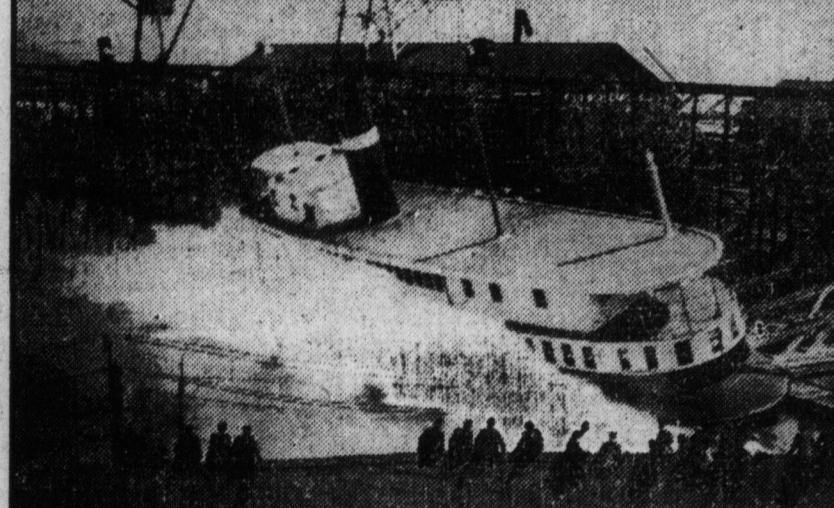

**HOTELMAN GOES TO JAIL**  
Four Months Sentence For Selling Liquor at Kilmount.  
LINDSAY, June 1.—(Special).—Jas. Simpson, proprietor of one of the hotels at Kilmount, a local option village, was this afternoon sentenced by Magistrate Moore to four months in the reformatory for selling liquor.

The sentence is the first of its kind to be meted out to any local option hotelkeeper in Victoria County. Simpson has been fined previously, hence the incarceration.

**CANADIANS IN LONDON.**  
LONDON, June 1.—(C.A.P.).—Canadian officers competing at the horse show arrived in London and are busy making preparations for practicing in the riding schools. They express confidence that they will hold their own.

G. C. Douglas, mining engineer, charged with larceny in Canada, was arraigned in Bow-street in consequence of the non-arrival of the Canadian officer with depositions. In accordance with a cable the officer was expected yesterday, but he did not appear. Douglas protested, as he has already been in custody for seven weeks.

## THREE MORE DROWNINGS TWO ARE FROM CANOES

Stanley Ostrom, of Alexandra, a Surveyor, is Drowned in the Wilds.

OTTAWA, June 1.—News has been received in the city of the death by drowning at Whitney last week of Norman Connors, aged 24, who came from Kirrie Muir-Scotland. He was attempting to paddle a canoe across the river, when it was seen by a boy named Cartwright to capsize. Assistance was speedily secured, but no trace could be found of the unfortunate young man, who was unable to swim.

Arthur Martineau, aged 14, of Hull, was drowned to-day shortly before noon by falling out of a boat in the middle of the Ottawa River, between the foot of the locks and the Hull shore. The lad was engaged with another young boy in gathering driftwood.

**COMPROMISE IN PETERSON**  
Two of the "Outs" Admitted to the Directorate.  
MONTREAL, June 1.—(Special).—Peterson Lake Mining Co.'s troubles are over, and where open warfare reigned last evening, all is now harmonious.

No vote was taken to-day, for wise counsels had prevailed during the night, and to-day the management agreed to allow the outs to have representation on the board. **BRUSH WITH SHOPLIFTER**  
Caught in Eaton's, Made Desperate Effort to Escape.  
William Wilcox of Port Credit was the central figure in a small riot in Eaton's yesterday afternoon, when he was carried off to the police station charged with shoplifting. A house detective described Wilcox acting suspiciously and seized him. The man from the seaport town proved too much for him, however, and broke away, only to run into the arms of a floor walker, who was hurrying to the rescue. There was a sharp struggle, in which Wilcox was overpowered and held till Detective Murray arrived. Just as the latter was getting out of the store with his man, Wilcox made another break, but was caught and carried off to No. 1. He is charged with trying to steal a massage machine, a brush and a wrench.

## Quebec Will Put a String on Pulpwood

In Future it Must Be Manufactured in the Province Before Exportation to the U.S.

MONTREAL, June 1.—(Special).—Sir Lomer Gouin, speaking at a banquet given in his honor to-night by the Reform Club, and attended by 450 representative Liberals, announced that in future the crown land policy of the provincial government would be changed so that all pulpwood being sent to the United States must be manufactured within the confines of the province.

Gouin said that such a policy might be detrimental to certain private interests, but he thought the general welfare of the province demanded a change similar to that now in force in Ontario.

# COBALT--New Workers Contrast Mexican Mines With Those of Cobalt

## Mining Market is Firm The Prices Marked Time

### Little Nip Took a Sharp Rise in the Morning, But Later Lost Some 3 Points.

World Office, Tuesday Evening, June 1.

The local mining markets to-day were inclined to be a shade on the easy side. Profit-taking by outsiders was the chief reason given for the small setback that occurred.

Beaver lost a point of its recent rise, but offerings were well taken. The stock was active on both boards and closed firm.

The higher priced stocks were steady around yesterday's close and lost nothing on the day.

Little Nipising was the feature, selling up to 23 on the morning board on the afternoon, the closing some 3 points above yesterday.

Temiskaming was dull, as was also Nova Scotia.

Business was quite satisfactory and the market closed firm, with a good many buyers orders waiting to be filled at a slightly lower level.

### WETLAUFER MINE

Consulting Engineer Says It Has Big Showing Outside Cobalt.

COBALT, May 31.—(World's Special Commission.)—Frank Loring, M.E., consulting engineer of the Wetlaufer Mine in the South Lorrain District, has returned from a trip to the property and tells me that the biggest showing outside of Cobalt is at the Wetlaufer.

Mr. Loring says that \$15,000 worth of silver has been taken out of a shaft 60 feet down.

Thirty men are now on this property working under Supt. A. C. Bailey. A plant consisting of a five-drill compressor, driven by two 40 h.p. boilers, is partly installed, and should be running in a month's time.

The shaft will be sunk 100 feet before a station is made.

The showings increase in value and depth, which is considered highly satisfactory to property owners in South Lorrain. A. C. Pulver.

### INSURANCE DISTRIBUTION

\$480,800,000 Paid in U. S. and Canada During 1908.

Life insurance organizations distributed in 1908 in the United States and Canada \$480,811,000, according to the figures published by the Insurance Press. In these computations the figures are of the amounts paid to insured persons or their beneficiaries in the forms of claims and death claims or of level-premium companies or the certificates of various life insurance companies.

The amounts paid by the regular companies in dividends to policyholders, for surrender values, to annuitants, are not included.

Summation of life insurance payments of all kinds in 1908 would give the following:

Claims paid in United States and Canada.....\$320,811,000

Payments for dividends and for surrender values and to annuitants (estimated).....150,000,000

Grand total.....\$480,811,000

From a point of view, 1908 was practically a year of no progress, the official returns from many states showing a falling off in payments for death claims and annuities, says the Insurance Press.

To some extent the falling off was due to the extension of the business disturbance, during the closing months of 1907, far into 1908, as indicated by the increase of loans on policies and the lapse of policies.

The former reducing the amount payable on a large part of insurance protection. The effects of adverse legislation, that was begun in 1906, were also toward the reduction of protection through the decrease of agency forces and the limitations on the business. Returns from fraternal societies showed in amounts cases considerable improvement, indicating for them the effect of the hard times.

Of \$18,000,000 paid in Canada, Toronto had \$1,032,712, Quebec \$433,631; St. John \$447,312, Victoria \$173,337, Halifax \$164,325, Montreal \$152,549, Yarmouth, N. S. \$119, London \$109,891, Kingston \$99,500, Hamilton \$97,769. There were more than 2100 policies in excess of \$10,000, including \$3,500,000 and 1 of \$500,000, the two latter in Pennsylvania.

### RAN INTO OPEN SWITCH

Accident to Imperial Limited in Which Tramp is Killed.

NORTH BAY, June 1.—At 8 o'clock last evening the eastbound Imperial Limited C. P. R. express ran into an open switch at Hobson, 333 miles west of North Bay, derailed, and a small car, carrying a tramp, was thrown into the air.

The train was on the platform of the small car, was instantly killed.

Fell From His Engine.

PETERBORO, June 1.—A C. P. R. fireman, Red by name, of Windsor, in the hospital here, was killed in an accident last night and wasn't missed until the train had gone two miles. He is found unconscious, having evidently been dragged along the ties for a distance.

### DECLARE OPEN SHOP

American Sheet and Tin Plate Mills Issue Notice.

WHEELING, W. Va., June 1.—Official notices were posted in all the mills of the American Sheet and Tin Plate Co. today, stating that after June 30 all of the plants of the company will be open shops.

The line of the company was sent to newspaper offices with the statement that the company will no longer treat with the amalgamated association.

The order affects about 10,000 men, who have been working in Wheeling and Martin's Ferry, Ohio, under the amalgamated scale.

### DOG SAVES CHILD.

Ottawa, June 1.—Jumping into the Rideau Canal near the St. Louis dam, a big collie dog grabbed a little girl, pulled her out.

In the Police Court.

Mary Peake was charged in the police court yesterday morning with theft of a necklace, and also with neglecting her four-year-old child.

She was remanded for sentence for the theft, and it being shown that she did remarkably well by the child under the circumstances she was allowed to keep it, despite the misdirected effort of one Patrick Hynes, agent of the St. Vincent de Paul Society.

Jacob Munnshaw and Thomas Carleton, charged with theft of spoons from Adolf Meyers, whose effects they were moving, went to the Central Prison for six months.

Unable to Locate Gas or Oil.

WELLAND, June 1.—The Provincial Gas Company has just finished a final attempt to get gas or oil in the marsh south of here. The well, completed at a depth of over 3000 feet, is an ordinary failure, and an absolutely dry hole.

The Provincial company has probably sunk twenty wells for gas and oil in the marsh in rental and costly drilling operations, getting no results whatever in return.

Out of Commission.

The Lakeside, of the Niagara, St. Catharines and Toronto Line is in dry dock at Port Dalhousie, and the Macassar of the Hamilton Line is being repaired at Kingston.

### FORTUNES IN DUMPS BEING MADE POSSIBLE

Expansion in Profits in Sight by Elimination of Long Expensive Freight Hauls.

COBALT, May 30.—(World's Special Commission.)—The fact that the Conlagas are going to treat "customs" and run their smelter to a 300 ton capacity per month is a departure that is significant.

To be a bit historical, it is only necessary to say that a few years ago, the agents of the American Smelting Companies practically dictated to Cobalt mines as to cost of treating Cobalt ores.

There was no way out of it at that time, owing to the difficulty experienced in treating arsenic ores, and the shipments had to go across the line.

Up to last week, low grade ores had to be sent to Denver. It was only a matter of time when Cobalt would be able to remove a barrier to profits and the situation is coming to pass, and the ores can be smelted in Canadian furnaces.

Distinct Advantage.

The shipping of low grade stuff nearly across the continent was nothing more than a great economic waste and this long freight haul was something that stared every manager in the face.

Then, the O'Brien Smelter at Deloro, decided to treat customs, and now the Conlagas, and in time there will be something like that. Then Cobalt will be complete in itself and will be the best all-around equipped camp in the world.

The charge levied by the O'Brien people for treating of customs is 250 per ton, and an additional charge of one cent per ounce for refining the silver and six per cent of the cobalt is paid for at the rate of 10 cent a pound. When a stable market is found for cobalt, there will be no doubt, but white arsenic. Thus it will be seen that all of the associated metals will be refined and that this will increase and dividends expand.

Optimistic Outlook.

One has only to glance at the records to observe that until now Cobalt has been treated as a dump. One hundred ounces of silver to the ton had to be thrown on the dump, and yet the smelting of low grade stuff is in prospect. There will be plenty of it.

A tour of this camp brings the idea to anyone in the least observant, that dumps are in some cases getting to be immense dimensions.

At the King Edward Mine on Cross Lake, in the Kerr Lake section, there is a veritable hill of the stuff, and this is only one mentioned.

There are thirty others and when the grand day of cleaning up happens the waste will be a great deal more numerous in Canada than at the present time, there will be some magnificent fortunes made out of these "dumps."

And when more smelters come on the scene, and hence a keener competition among smelting companies, there will be a reduction in freight charges, which will be necessary, of course, to make low-grade stuff a substance of wealth.

Conditions have bettered themselves and will continue to do so, to the glorification of this camp. And money for fortunate shareholders in fortunate mines.

Cobalt

HYDRAULIC AIR, ELECTRIC POWER RUNNING WATER

Mining Will Be Simplified and Living Made More Comfortable by These Improvements.

COBALT, May 31.—(World's Special Commission.)—The work in this camp will be simplified to a great extent after the 1st of August, when about that time the Cobalt Hydraulic Power Co. will be able to deliver air, with air pressure from Ragged Chutes, on the Montreal River.

Nine miles of 25 inch pipe will be required to bring this air flow into camp and 12 inch loop line will start at the La Rose bridge, circle the entire town and join the main pipe in addition to the loop there will be branch lines, by way of the Colonial and Nova Scotia and another line will run to Kerr Lake.

At Cobalt there will be about 110 lbs. pressure and will be charged for per that pressure.

To the larger consumers the air will be supplied by meter, the terms of which will be 25 cents per thousand cubic feet of compressed air at 100 lbs. pressure, which will be measured by the meter similar to the system used by gas companies in the big cities.

To the small consumers, who will pay for pipe connection from premises to main pipes, the following rates will be charged, per drill per 16-hour shift: 1) drill, \$2.50; 2) drill, \$3.00; 3) drill, \$3.50; 4) drill, \$4.00.

Stimulate Development. At this date there are 60 compressors in Cobalt camp, but in at a great expense to mine holders.

The result of this air equipment will be to stimulate development work on properties, which are discouraged indications, but on which the managements hesitated to go down to any depth, as that meant the installation of a plant and compressors and perhaps worthless expenditure.

Undertaking of Magnitude. Five million pounds of pipes, bolts and other material will be required to make complete the construction and materialization of the scheme which will revolutionize the mining business in this country.

A great deal of this material was sent over from Germany by an expert buyer and after it reached Cobalt was shipped to the end of the spur line near Grouse Lake, and then teamed for six miles to the chutes.

The power house is now completed at that point and half a mile of piping has been attached, and it is confidently expected that about show up, signified by the first week in August.

Electric Power Soon. By July 1 the transmission line for the electric power from the Fountains Falls will be ready for use.

The rates charged will be under 25 h.p., 3c per kilowatt hour, as figured by Watts meter.

Over 25 h.p. and under 50 h.p., 2c. Over 50 h.p. and under 100 h.p., 1.5c. Over 100 h.p. and under 200 h.p., 1c. Over 200 h.p. and under 300 h.p., 1c. Over 300 h.p. and under 400 h.p., 1c. Over 400 h.p. and under 500 h.p., 1c. Over 500 h.p. will be 5c per kilowatt hour and in addition to these rates there will be a charge of \$1 per month per horse power on the rated capacity of the installed motor.

Running Water. It will not be long before Cobalt can do away with water at 25c per gallon bottle.

In fact, some of the citizens, who are fortunate enough to have already connecting pipes in their houses and places of business, are drinking fresh, pure, delicious water from Saugatung Lake, which lies about 15 minutes' walk from the centre of the town.

Lake producing veins. The McDonald vein shipments average 2000 ounces to the ton, the No. 7 8000 ounces to the ton, while the Jacobs, which is now down over 400 feet, the deepest in the camp, averages 4500-ounces to the ton.

The Kerr Lake mine, it is estimated, is blocking out about 700,000 ounces of silver a month, while it is shipping but 200,000 ounces a month. The Kerr Lake has 200 feet of the Jacobs vein, which runs across the southeast corner of their property and into both South Hargrave and East Hargrave.

It will take about three weeks to drive the additional 20 feet of the main Hargrave shaft to the 300-foot level and cut the station, and about two to three weeks to drift in to the Kerr Lake mine. These are of the most important strikes of the year is expected.

There has been quite a demand for Hargrave stock, and 30-day delivery, as it is figured that within that time the strike will have been made. About the time Crown Reserve made its big strike around 82. Before the 60 days had expired the stock had risen to 255, and holders of the 60-day delivery bought at \$2.50 made for \$25.

Buyers of Hargrave 60-day delivery are evidently figuring on a similar occurrence in Hargrave. It is known that bonanza ore in the Kerr Lake's sixth level continues right along up to the Hargrave line and into the Hargrave property. It is said to run 6000 ounces to the ton where it crosses the Hargrave line.

MEXICO V. COBALT. New Yorkers After Visit Are Enthusiastic With Cobalt.

Frederick the Great Morris of 43 Exchange-place, New York, got back to Toronto yesterday from Cobalt with his car of congenial comrades and courteous capitalists. All with the exception of Kaiser Morris had never seen the silver city before. Having seen, they are amazed at the extent and the richness of the camp.

M. C. Zuckerman, M.E., who knows his Mexico like a book, testifies that Cobalt is richer in ore and more suitable for profitable mining than any southern country. Even in the dumps he sees values that would make the Mexican see white. Others of the party, particularly Charles Brady formerly of McClure's, were eloquent in their praise of the sights and the possibilities of Cobalt. Besides the Kaiser mentioned, there were J. Woodruff, G. Knight, S. A. Bendick, Dr. A. M. Trenholm, A. L. Carr and T. C. Graham. They left yesterday afternoon for New York.

Mount Royal Operating. ELK LAKE, May 30.—(From the Sun Up.)—Active mining operations are being carried on at the Mount Royal Mines, situated on the Montreal River, about four miles from here. The indications of silver are good, the veins being well defined, and the prospecting shows up well under development. Six men are employed. P. Roe of Cobalt is managing director of this property.

WOMAN HEARD BURGLARS. Screams Awakened Neighbors and the Intruders Decamped.

BROCKVILLE, June 1.—(Special.)—Mrs. Genov, housekeeper for N. Gaffield, and a servant had an exciting experience at an early hour this morning.

They were alone in the house and burglars effected an entrance thru a kitchen window. They had obtained down stairs—and were discussing the advisability of paying attention to the upper portion when the conversation was interrupted by the servant, who ran screaming to the room of Miss Genov. The ladies raised the bedroom window and shouted for help. Neighbors responded, too late, however, to catch the visitors, who decamped, leaving their plunder behind.

YOUNG MAN CUTS HIS THROAT. James McKay of Lanark Ends His Life in a Field.

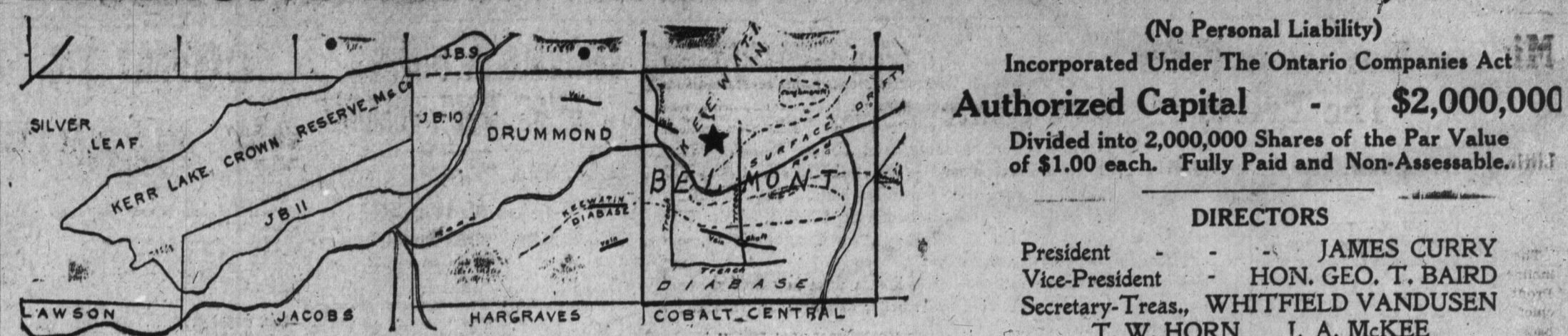

**Holidays Provide Substance For the Stock Markets**

**Wall Street Opens Up Buoyant and Continues Thruout Day—Toronto Market Shows More Activity.**

World Office, Tuesday Evening, June 1, 1909.

Speculation developed to a greater extent in Canadian securities yesterday, the holidays apparently having stimulated some buying owing to the anticipated buoyancy of the New York market.

The premier security on the Canadian exchanges, namely, C.P.R., was the chief centre of interest during the day, although the transactions at the Toronto Market were not of a large nature. The Montreal Market is evidently in better shape to take advantage of the high-priced securities, the transactions there being much larger than those in Toronto. The advance in C.P.R. was initiated at the London Exchange this morning and was freely taken up on the markets at this side.

Outside of this issue interest was largely concentrated in MacKay, Mexican Light & Power, Nova Scotia Steel and Rochelle & Ontario. MacKay common made a new high record, selling as high as 118 on the New York Exchange, the highest price reached here being 80 1/4.

Nova Scotia Steel developed some activity during the morning session, and made were made as high as 69, but profit-taking brought the reaction in the price later in the day.

In the other semi-speculative issues, public interest was largely concentrated at the end of last week and then held up two points, without any difficulty.
