THE FINANCING OF MUNICIPAL FRANCHISE COMPANIES.

The capitalization of companies holding public franchises in cities is well worthy of some attention on the part of the Ontario Legislature, now in session.

At present there is no limitation or regulation of the money issues of these propositions. For instance, the Toronto Railway is financed on seven millions of capital, six millions of which was water; all the rest of the financing was done by bonds.

Let us take another instance: The Consumers' Gas Company of Toronto is applying for power to increase its stock. So far the city council has not taken any stand in regard to the proposed legislation, although the company is by law allowed to pay dividends of ten per cent. on this stock.

The legislature, therefore, ought to compel all these companies holding municipal franchises to go to the Ontario Railway and Municipal Board for power to increase their stock or bond issues; they ought to be compelled to give a reason for such increased capitalization; they should not be allowed to issue one dollar in water, as is the law in New York; and provision should be made for expropriation on reasonable terms, say plus ten per cent. on the actual expenditure on the road, or on its present physical condition.

What member of the legislature has been watching the finest law in America to-day in regard to this case? This is the law now being enforced to the great benefit of the public in the State of New York.

Every day demonstrates in some new way the advantage that the Ontario Hydro-Electric Power Commission gives to the province. The only objectors to the commission are the power monopolists or would-be monopolists, who find that the competition on independent lines of the people's power lines will compel them to abate the exorbitant demands they would otherwise make.

free water access between the ocean and the inland provinces of Canada.

The British Royal Commission recommends the acquisition by the state of the inland waterways, and this is a guide for Canadian action.

Commenting editorially on "Municipal Ownership in Practice," The Christian Science Monitor of Boston, Mass., quotes some interesting figures regarding the municipal street lighting undertaken of Nashville, Tenn.

Comparing 1902 with 1906—the latter year is taken because the capacity of the plant was then unchanged, but under municipal management—the facts show that the cost of operating the plant in the latter year, including interest on the investment, etc., was \$28,986, or \$11,301 less than the cost of lighting the city in 1902.

Some peculiar facts, says The Monitor, were revealed. For example: The gross income of a private corporation's lighting department for 1906 was approximately \$400,000. That company charges 12 cents per kilowatt. Had this same electricity been furnished by the city to the same citizens who purchased it, at exact cost to the city, the consumer would only have paid \$77,000.

In another column appears the annual report of the Canada Permanent Mortgage Corporation. It indicates that the past year has improved the already splendid position of the company. According to the financial statement the net profits, after deducting interest on borrowed capital, expenses of management, and all charges, amounted to \$265,428.

LONDON, Jan. 31.—(C.A.P.)—William O'Brien, the leading Independent Nationalist, in a letter read to a meeting in North Cork, said that if Asquith retains office at all which Mr. O'Brien doubts—one of two things must happen:

1. The Dillon-Devlin party will only have a choice between following us to the lobby against the budget, causing the expulsion of the government from office, or supporting the budget, thus sealing their own fate at the polls in the new general election that will soon be upon us.

WHY GARFIELD WAS CUT OUT. Would Have Opposed the Alaska Coal Land Patents.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31.—When the Ballinger-Pinchot investigating committee adjourned late to-day until Friday morning, Louis R. Glavis was still on the witness stand.

Senator Fletcher of Florida, Glavis said that Ballinger, while commissions of the land office, had appeared before committees of congress and by his testimony had favored a large Alaska coal company.

Senator Paynter of Kentucky resigned from the committee to-day. Illness was given as the cause. The appointment of a successor has been left to Senator Money, who offered the place in vain to more than half a dozen senators to-day.

## MAKING A NEW LIBRARY

Mr. Pardoe Has Got Together New Sets of Valuable Journals.

Since the parliament buildings fire of September last, in which the provincial library suffered the greatest loss, Chief Librarian Avery-Pardoe has been laboring industriously towards reassembling new copies of volumes which were destroyed. He has been successful in securing copies, which it was at first believed it would be impossible to duplicate. The present state of the library has been dealt with in a comprehensive report, which will shortly be laid on the table of the house by the chief librarian.

According to the report, 10,400 books were saved from the flames, valued at some \$30,000. All the books in the annex, worth \$35,000, were destroyed, and only about 500 in the main library of the 50,000 volumes were saved. The books on the north wall of the library were not burned, and luckily these were valuable works, such as encyclopedias, dictionaries and books of reference, etc. About 2500 books in the librarian's room were not damaged, and 700 in the room east of the library also escaped.

The librarian has succeeded in getting together a new set of the journals of the Upper Canadian council and assembly of the Upper Canada and Ontario law reports, supreme and exchequer law reports and other valuable law records. A file of The London Times for the last 70 years has been secured, together with complete files of The Nineteenth Century, Contemporary Review, Fortnightly, Chambers' Journal, Quarterly Review, Edinburgh Review, Statistical Journal, Harper's Century, Scribner's, Canadian, etc. From the library of the late Chief Justice Sir Henry Strong of Ottawa were purchased 1200 volumes for the departments of history and economics.

A set of journals of the house of commons and of the house of lords is coming from the imperial parliament dating back to earliest times.

## COAL CLAIMS JUMPED

Cassiar Co. Carry Their Troubles to Premier McBride.

VANCOUVER, B.C., Jan. 31.—(Special.)—Forty-two coal claims in Telkwa and Bulkley valleys, owned by the Cassiar Coal Co., an eastern corporation, of which Samuel Barker, M.P., Hamilton, Ont., is a prominent official, have been "jumped" for alleged non-compliance with the mining regulations. It is alleged that while the company paid an annual license of \$100 per claim every year, continuous development was not prosecuted as required by law.

The matter has been referred by the Hazelton mining recorder, to Premier McBride, as minister of mines.

Locations were made about five years ago, and the company applied for crown grants a few months ago. The property is very valuable, as the area embraces valuable farm lands and several prospective townships.

## THE CUSTOMS REVENUE

Govt. Expectations of Hundred Millions for Year Not Being Realized.

OTTAWA, Jan. 31.—(Special.)—While customs revenue of \$48,900,112 for the ten months ending to-day shows a surplus of \$1,029,027 over the previous corresponding period, the gain for the month, \$867,205, is a total revenue of \$4,529,981 shows a decrease.

Unless February and March show increases of above the million mark, there is no chance of a hundred million total for the fiscal year.

## Dolley Awarded \$1500.

James Dolley was awarded \$1500 by the jury in the assize court as damages against the McCann-Knox Milling Co. for injuries received thru falling down the elevator shaft. He claimed that he ascended to the second floor and as he was stepping off, suddenly and without warning, the elevator gave way and he fell to the floor below. He sued for \$5000 damages.

## TREASURER PAID \$84,000 FOR A WOMAN'S SILENCE

Warriner, of the Big Four, Says He Paid \$1000 a Month for Seven Years as Blackmail.

CINCINNATI, Jan. 31.—Eighty-four thousand dollars was the price Chas. L. Warriner, defaulting local treasurer of the Big Four Railway, paid for a woman's silence. Fearing exposure of his short-comings, he gave Mrs. Jeanette Stewart Ford, an average of \$1000 a month for seven years, the payments stopping only when the exposure came from other sources November 2 last.

Such was the substance of the testimony which Warriner gave to-day at the trial of Mrs. Ford on a charge of blackmailing him.

Mrs. Ford sat thru the recital with immobile countenance. Twice only during the day did she utter her feelings to show. The first instance came before Warriner appeared, when Judge Swing ordered her two children removed from the court room.

Mrs. Ford's second ordeal came at the end of the proceedings. Just before adjournment of court, letters were introduced by the state which also had written to Edgar S. Cooke, formerly an employe in the Big Four Railway offices here. The missives mentioned visits she had made to Cooke, and were couched in the most endearing terms. As her declarations of affection for Cooke were read to the jury, Mrs. Ford shook and tears streamed down her cheeks.

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## ELECTRIC WIRE TAPPED

Readings Suddenly Dropped From \$10 to 75 Cents a Month.

By means of an ingenious device which evaded the meter set to measure the consumption of electric current supplied to a shop in East Toronto, a new case of wire tapping was rounded up by the police Saturday night, when Detective Newton seized the meter and attachments. The woman charged with theft of the juice from the city, which supplies it in that section, will appear in police court this morning.

It was noticed that a sudden drop occurred in the meter readings, which fell from \$10 for a month to 75 cents. A meter was put on the supply wires from outside, and this kept up the old rate. The woman was taken to the detective office yesterday and will appear to-day.

## COOKING SCHOOLS IN STREET

To Show New York Housewives How to Do Without Meat.

NEW YORK, Jan. 31.—The Gotham Beef Party was formed to-day by the National Women's Progressive Suffrage Union, which has been particularly active in the campaign against the higher cost of living. Mrs. Sophia Loebinger and others addressed an open air crowd of some 300 in Madison-square.

Petitions were circulated asking that the board of health condemn all meat in cold storage more than 60 days.

Mrs. Loebinger said some of the beef now in storage had been there for three years and had turned as hard as leather. Within a week she and her associates propose to open public cooking schools in the streets, where housewives will be taught to cook without meat.

At the offices of Swift & Co. here to-day, it was denied that shipments of beef from the west would be curtailed in an effort to hold up the price.

Small retailers continue to report a shrinkage of family trade, but the large hotels report no change in demand.
