

#### ELDERS' DISTRICTS.

District No. 1.—Mr. Paterson: Richmond Road and its adjoining neighbourhood, west of the toll-gate. In the absence of Mr Paterson, this district will be visited by the Elder of District No. 2.

District No. 2.—Mr. Frank Bronson: Victoria Island, Le Breton Flats, south-west to Wellington street.

District No. 3.—Hon. E. H. Bronson: From Concession street westward to Hintonburg, and from Richmond Road and Wellington street southward to St. Louis' Dam.

District No. 4.—Mr. Wyld: From Concession street eastward to Bay street, and from Sparks street southward to Isabella street.

District No. 5.—Mr. Cassels: From Bay street eastward to Bank street, and from Sparks street southward to Gloucester street.

District No. 6.—Mr. May: From Bay street eastward to Bank street, and from Gloucester street southward to Cooper street.

District No. 7.—Mr. Macoun: From Bay street eastward to Bank street, and from Cooper street southward to Isabella street.

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District No. 8.—Mr. Gibson: From Maria street northward to Sparks street, and from Bank street eastward to the Canal.

District No. 9.—Mr. Orme: From Maria street southward to Somerset street, and from Bank street eastward to the Canal.

District No. 10.—Mr. Hamilton: From Somerset street southward to Lewis street, and from Bank street eastward to the Canal.

District No. 11.—Mr. Chrysler: From Lewis street southward to Billings' Bridge, and from Bank street eastward to the Rideau River.

District No. 12.—Mr. Drummond: From Sparks street northward to the Ottawa River.

District No. 13.—Mr. Larmonth: From Rideau street southward, and from the Canal eastward to the Rideau River.

District No. 14.—Colonel Macpherson: From Mackenzie avenue eastward to Cummings' Bridge, and from Rideau street northward to Rideau Hall.

District No. 15.—Mr. Borthwick: Gloucester and Country sections beyond the Rideau River.

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#### PASTORAL LETTER.

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#### KIRK SESSION REPORT.

The time has again arrived when the various organizations connected with the Church are expected to report the result of their efforts in the several spheres of Christian work in which they have been engaged during the past year. The Kirk Session, in the performance of a similar duty, desire to submit the following statements in regard to matters pertaining to church life and work, which have been more especially entrusted to their oversight.

In the course of the past year the strains of Knox's Jubilee services have directed attention to the progress which the Presbyterian Church has made in Ottawa from the earliest days of its pioneer missionary work until the present time. In this progressive Christian work St. Andrew's Church has from the first taken a prominent part, and during the sixty-eight years of its history it has continuously maintained religious ordinances in this community, and the frithful labors of its successive pastors have exerted an influence for good on all who came within the range of their ministry. The successful Christian work which the Great Head of the Church has thus enabled us to accomplish affords encouragement to continue our efforts in every branch of Christian activity, and to use with fidelity the various talents which He has entrusted to our stewardship, and which He expects us to employ wisely. not for ourselves only, but also for the good of our Presbyterian brethren who are not so highly favoured as ourselves with religious ordinances and Christian privileges. The Congregation of this Church recognizing its responsibility for the proper use of its talent of material resources, and animated by a sincere desire to promote therewith the interests of Presbyterians and others in the more southern part of the city, recently authorized its Glebe trustees to set apart six lots of the Glebe property as a site for a Sunday School Hall or Church, and also instructed them to pay over to the Temporal Committee the sum of \$2000 (two thousand dollars) to be expended in the erection of such hall. The time for commencing the building was left for the Session to determine, and, after consulting all the parties interested in the opening of the proposed school, the Session resolved that the Temporal Commitee should proceed with the work, and it was accordingly begun in November and completed in February, and having obtained the sanction of

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the Presbytery to open the School forthwith, and also to make arrangements for the holding of weekly Prayer Meetings, the Hall was opened on Sunday, the 24th February, with appropriate services, and the School is now in operation under the superintendence of Mr. Chrysler, and should prove a great convenience to the families in that locality, and tend to promote the best interests of the Presbyterian Church in that rapidly increasing part of the City.

The comfort and convenience of the Congregation has been greatly increased by the alterations and improvements which have been made in the Church during the past summer. The Organ has also been rebuilt and greatly improved. The Church buildings may now be considered complete and furnished with all that is necessary for the proper carrying on of modern Church work. Our external equipment for service is apparently very complete, yet, great as these advantages are, we know that our best efforts without the quickening influence of the Divine Spirit will be fruitless, we therefore pray that His vitalizing power may quicken our members and especially those who are engaged in Christian work, so that we may become a truly prosperous Church—strong in faith and fruitful in good works.

Public services in connection with this Church have been held every Sunday throughout the year, and notwithstanding the occasional failing health of our Pastor it has seldom prevented him from attending to his pulpit ministrations on the Lord's Day; and these have continued to be marked by the same vigorous thought, careful preparation, and eloquent delivery, which have always characterized his preaching. The congregation and the public generally have shown their appreciation of his ministry by the uniformly large attendance at all the Sunday services in which he officiated. While the alterations and improvements in the Church were in progress, during July, August and September, the services were held in the Sunday School Hall, which afforded ample accommodation for the smaller attendance of worshippers in these months. The thanks of the Session are due to the Rev. Principal Grant of Queen's University, who officiated at several of these services with his usual ability, and also to Mr. James Rollins, a graduate of Queen's, who ministered to the Congregation with much acceptance for the greater part of that time.

The mid-week services were held during eight months of the year. They were discontinued in June, July, August and September. The

the year. er. The The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was administered to the Congregation four times during the past year. The average attendance at these quarterly communions, exclusive of those present from other Congregations, was (269) two hundred and sixty-nine, being rather more than the average reported for the previous year.

The numerical strength of the Congregation has not been greatly changed since last report. The number then on the Roll was (533) five hundred and thirty-three, since that date (26) twenty-six have been added, (8) eight on profession of faith, and (18) eighteen by certificate from other congregations. During the same time (16) sixteen have been removed, (7) seven by death, (8) eight by certificate, and one by action of Session. The Roll thus adjusted numbers (543) five hundred and forty-three, being a net increase of (10) ten members since last Report.

By reference to the Treasurer's statement it will be seen that the plate collections at the public services on the Lord's Day were rather larger in amount than the same collections of the previous year.

The statement submitted by the 'Treasurer of the Schedule Fund shows that the amount at the credit of that Fund has been allocated as follows:—

The liberality of the Congregation towards the Schemes of the Church for the past year is worthy of commendation, yet, the Session still feel that a larger proportion of our membership should be annual contributors to the missionary and benevolent enterprises of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, of which we form a part, and should sustain to the extent of our ability; all our members giving as God has prospered them.

The Session might refer more fully to the work which has been accomplished in the the several departments of our Church work, but as it has now become customary for the various organizations of this Church to submit annual reports of what they have done, the Session deem it unnecessary to do more than commend their reports to the attention of the membership.

The Session regret that in consequence of failing health our pastor has found it necessary to discontinue his ministerial work for a time, a few months of uninterrupted rest being prescribed as the most likely means of his restoration to health. On receiving this intimation the Session relieved Mr. Herridge from duty, and arranged for the supply of his pulpit on the 24th February, and also for the Communion Service on the 3rd March, and they now report the matter to this annual meeting of the Congregation, with the recommendation that a resolution be adopted granting Mr. Herridge four months leave of absence in addition to his usual summer vacation, and authorizing the Session to secure an ordained minister, if possible, to occupy the Pastorate in his absence; the expense of such service to be borne by the Congre-The Session have already given expression to their deep sympathy with Mr. Herridge, both in his time of bereavement, and of his serious illness, and they cherish the hope that after a few months rest he will return to us in September next, to resume his work with renewed vigor, and such acquired spiritual strength as may come to him in the quiet hours of his temporary retirement from ministerial duties, and they pray that He who doeth all things wisely and well may so overrule this seemingly adverse dispensation of His Providence in our Congregational affairs that it shall ultimately promote the highest good of both Pastor and people.

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## ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING.

Pursuant to notice read from the pulpit on the two preceding Sundays, the Annual General Meeting of the Congregation of St. Andrew's Church was held in the Sunday School Hall this Monday evening, the 4th of March, 1895, at 8 o'clock.

Rev. Mr. Herridge not being present, Mr. L. Crannell was moved to the chair.

Meeting opened with prayer by Mr. W. Hamilton, Elder.

Minutes of Annual Meeting, March 5th, 1894, also the Special Meetings of the Congregation on May 1st and November 15th, 1894, were read and confirmed.

#### REPORTS.

Reports were received from the following committees:—Kirk Session, Temporal Committee, Building and Organ Committee, Glebe Trustees, Glebe Sunday School Building Committee, Ladies' Aid Society, Poor Relief, Home and Foreign Missionary Societies, Schedule Fund, Sabbath School, Young People's Society, and Glebe Sunday School were read at the meeting.

Moved by G. L. Orme, Esq., seconded by Hon. E. H. Bronson, that the various reports and statements as read be received and adopted.

—Carried.

Moved by J. W. McRae, Esq., seconded by Sir Jas. A. Grant, that the members of the Congregation of St. Andrew's Church in meeting assembled, while most keenly regretting that their pastor, owing to ill health, finds it necessary temporarily to cease his ministrations among them; nevertheless fully approve and confirm the action of the Kirk Session in extending to Mr. Herridge the offer of a six months leave of absence, trusting that in the Providence of God at the end of that time, and in full strength and vigor, he may be returned to them and to his work amongst his people.—Carried.

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N, on Clerk. Moved by F. P. Bronson, Esq., seconded by W. Hamilton, Esq., that a committee composed of the Rev. Mr. Herridge, Messrs. Hamilton, Gibson and May, be appointed to attend to the publication of the Annual Report and the distribution of the same to the Congregation.—Carried.

#### By-LAW No. 27.

By-law of the Temporal Committee of St. Andrew's Church, in the City of Ottawa, in connection with the Church of Scotland, hereby enact as follows:—

That the Glebe Trustees of St. Andrew's Church, Ottawa, are hereby authorized and required to pay to the said Temporal Committee a sum not exceeding two thousand dollars (\$2,000) for the purpose of completing the erection of the school building on the Glebe property, the Sunday School Hall and the heating of the Church. Done and passed at the City of Ottawa, in the County of Carleton, this 4th day of March, 1895.

Moved by Hon. E. H. Bronson, seconded by Jas, Gibson, Esq., That Messrs. J. W. McRae and Geo. S. May be recommended for the vacancy in the Temporal Committee, and Mr. F. H. Chrysler for the vacancy in Glebe Trustees Board, and that suspending all rules to the contrary the Secretary be instructed to cast a ballot for the same.—Carried.

Secretary cast a ballot as above, Chairman declared them elected for three years.

Moved by F. H Chrysler, Esq., seconded by Geo. L. Orme, Esq., That the thanks of the Congregation are hereby tendered to the Ladies' Aid Society for their valuable services during the past year.—Carried.

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ne, Esq, Ladies' Carried. The Chairman introduced the question of giving up the old cemetery on Sandy Hill to the Board of Park Commissioners to be used for a Public Park. The question was discussed and referred to a committee.

Moved by W. Hamilton, Esq., seconded by J. W. McRae, Esq., That the question be referred to a committee of Hon. E. H. Bronson and Mr. F. H. Chrysler to report on at a future meeting of the Congregation.

Meeting was closed with prayer by Mr. F. P. Bronson, at 10 p.m.

#### REPORT OF THE TEMPORAL COMMITTEE.

To the Members and Adherents of St. Andrew's Church :-

The Temporal Committee herewith submit their statement of receipts and expenditures for the past year, duly audited; the balance of cash on hand at date being \$301.65. All the accounts for the current year have been paid with the exception of \$1,010 interest, falling due during March, 1895.

Payments of pew rents for last year have been fairly satisfactory, but we would urge more prompt payment on the part of pew holders. If the rents were paid according to the regulations, namely, quarterly in advance, your Committee would be able to pay current expenses of the Church without the necessity of borrowing money.

Since our last report there have been two memorial windows placed in the Church, one of which was donated by the members of the family of the late Mrs. Alex. Fleck, and the other by Mr. J. R. Booth, in memory of the late Mrs. Booth.

What is practically a new organ has been erected at a cost of \$3.900, towards the payment of which the legacy of the late John Roberts, amounting to \$2,000, was used.

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## REPORT OF THE GLEBE TRUSTEES.

In presenting the Fifth Annual Report of the Glebe Trustees of St. Andrew's Church we are pleased to report that the transactions of the year which has closed have been fairly satisfactory.

When the Glebe Trustees assumed office they received from the Temporal Committee Mortgages and balances unpaid upon lots in Spenceville to the amount of about \$7,000.00.

Prior to the 1st of March, 1894, the Glebe Trustees had sold from the property upon the west side of the canal 251 lots for the price of \$66,185.00. During the current year they sold 28 lots for the price of \$7,075.00, making a total number of 279 lots sold for \$73,260.00, which, added to the sum of \$7,000.00, transferred by the Temporal Committee, amounts to \$80,260.00.

The unsold lots comprise about 90 lots in Spenceville, 71 lots between Elgin street and Bank street, and 510 west of Bank street.

Prior to the 1st of March, 1894, the Glebe Trustees had paid for the purposes of the congregation, including payments upon Mortgages and the amount paid for the purchase of the Manse and the erection of the Sunday School Hall, \$42,400.00, and they have paid to the Temporal Committee, during the current year under various by laws, further amounts aggregating \$13,500.00, making in all \$55,900.00, of which the sum of \$20,000.00 was borrowed upon Mortgage on part of the Glebe property.

In addition to the unsold lots the Trustees have on hand, amount of principal due on Mortgages, \$36,905.24, and cash, \$4,546.05.

The balance of interest handed to the Temporal Committee, after providing for the interest upon the Glebe Mortgage, is the sum of \$900.00, showing a total interest payment from the revenue of the Glebe of \$1,900.00.

The assets upon hand in cash and Mortgages, together with the amount of 35,900.00, expended, show the net amount realized from the property to be about \$77,500.00.

No new blocks were opened for sale during the year, and, the Glebe Trustees hope that it will not be necessary to open further blocks for sale until some provision is made for the drainage of the southern portion of the City. It is altogether likely that a scheme for the drainage of the City, which will include the Glebe property, will be decided upon during the present year.

We also learn that the Public School Board intend to erect a school upon the lots purchased from the Trustees, on the west side of Bank street.

The Temporal Committee have reserved lots and have erected upon the Glebe a Sunday School Hall for the use of the people residing in that neighborhood, and a Sunday School has been opened there.

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The Glebe Trustees have to report with regret that the interest account does not balance by at least \$900.00, and they call the attention of the congregation to the fact that the debt would have been entirely extinguished by this time if it had not been for the large drafts upon the principal of the Glebe funds for congregational purposes.

### REPORT OF BUILDING COMMITTEE.

The Building Committee beg to report that since last Annual Meeting they have completed the few details of the Sunday School Hall left over from last year, such as fencing, sodding, granolithic pavement, etc., the total amount expended on the Hall being \$31,073.74 to date. They estimate that a further sum of about \$700 will be needed for curtains and seating, glass for skylight, etc.

The alterations of the vestibule and vestry have been completed and are by all considered a very great and much needed improvement. The total cost on these has amounted to \$5,131.15.

The Church heating has been changed from hot air to steam at a cost of \$1,037.59. By this change a considerable amount will be saved annually in repairs to hot air furnaces and fuel.

The organ has been so enlarged and renewed and remodelled that it is practically a new instrument, and is considered by competent judges one of the finest organs in the country. The cost, in addition to the bequest of \$2,000 of the late John Roberts, has amounted to \$1,900.

The new Sunday School on the Glebe property has been completed and was dedicated to Church purposes on 24th February. It is well adapted for the purposes of Sunday School and other Church work, and reflects credit on the architects, Messrs. Gregg & Gregg, and the contractors, Messrs. McKinnon & Richards. The cost so far has been \$2,200.82, and a further sum will be required for fencing, sodding, etc.

For the purposes of the Building Committee to complete all the matters under their charge, such as the completion of the Glebe Sunday School Hall, additional seating for Sunday School Hall, to replace seats sent to Glebe Sunday School Hall, curtains for gallery class-rooms, wired glass for skylight, unpaid balances due contractors, etc., a sum not exceeding \$2,000 will be required, for which we trust provision will be made by by-law of the Church.

We desire to express our thanks to the Ladies' Aid Society for their generous aid in the handsome furnishing of the Minister's vestry, and other valuable assistance in making the Church buildings comfortable and complete.

In presenting their report for the year ending on the 28th ultimo, the Ladies' Aid Society beg to state that during the past year nineteen meetings have been held, with an average attendance of sixteen. The largest number present at any one meeting having been 22, and the smallest, 10.

The meetings have been held in the Church parlors on Friday afternoons, at 3 o'clock, the Poor Relief Committee convening half an hour earlier.

The annual meeting was held on the 19th of October, and shortly after that date, on the 16th of November, a large gathering of members and friends met to celebrate the twenty-first anniversary of the Society.

After an address by the Rev. Mr. Herridge, in which he reviewed the work accomplished in the past 21 years, a very pleasing incident took place, namely, a presentation to the Treasurer, who has filled the office since the formation of the Society, as a token of appreciation of her valuable services for this long period. Of the original officers, she alone remains, still faithful to her figures, which "never lie." Two entertainments have been held during the season, an organ recital, November 27th, by Mr. Samuel Warren of New York, and a concert, Jan-

uary 15th, by Mr. Harold Jarvis and Miss Dunlop of Detroit, both excellent from a musical standpoint, but owing to many reasons, not as successful financially as could be desired.

The Anniversary Social held on the 7th of February brought out a gathering encouraging in its numbers, and the evening was spent agreeably by all present. The first part of the evening was devoted to music, furnished entirely by acceptable talent from our own Congregation, and much praise was given to the first appearance of our Sunday School Orchestra, in which our Society feels so great an interest.

Tea followed in the newly equipped room in the basement, and here Their Excellencies, the Governor-General and Lady Aberdeen with their guests, the Rev. Dr. and Mrs. Lyman Abbott, of Brooklyn, gave their presence for an hour. A few happy remarks were given each by Lord Aberdeen and Dr. Abbott, adding greatly to the pleasure of the occasion.

The Society, after completing the furnishing of the S. S. Hall, Vestry, Choir gallery, Church vestibule, and Their Excellencies' pew, have also placed a much-needed telephone in one of the rooms adjoining the parlors. This has been found a great convenience to all.

While of necessity much has been expended for our own needs, we have not been unmindful of the claims of others upon us, and it has been our privilege to contribute \$275.00 towards work whose worthy object is recognized by all. Of this, \$25.00 was given to the Young People's Society, and \$50 to the Home Missionary Society as a thank offering for the occupation of rooms so long desired, \$100.00 to aid the furnishing of the Y. W. C. A., and \$100.00 also to the new Maternity Hospital.

Though the receipts have not been so large as in some years previous, encouragement is given us by the increasing attendance and interest of the members.

A few weeks since one of the original founders of the Society, Mrs. Andrew Drummond, passed from her earthly labors here to the higher life above. For many years she has been unable to attend the meetings of the Society, but always retained her interest in the work.

# SEVENTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE HOME MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

We would again wish to enlist the sympathy of our hearers by endeavoring to give them a short account of the growth and prosperity of our mission work at Lake Dauphin.

It is indeed gratifying to find our work steadily growing, both in interest here, as evidenced by increasing membership and larger funds, and by the reports of progress in the Dauphin field.

The meetings of this Society are held on the first Friday of every month, and, as in former years, the monthly letter of the Missionary, giving detailed accounts of his work, which of necessity is prosecuted under many difficulties, is the chief feature of the hour. We have also had papers read by different ladies bearing on Mission Work, one in particular being especially interesting, viz: that written by Mrs. Burgess on the Life and Work of Rev. Father Lacombe, a zealous Catholic priest of much culture and refinement, who had spent his life laboring among the Indians and half-breeds of the Northwest.

It was in 1890 that the efforts of the Society were first directed to Lake Dauphin, and since that time we have had the satisfaction of seeing it steadily grow, while, by means of direct communication with the Missionary, we have been able to follow and fully understand the trials and difficulties, as well as the successes, that attend pioneer missionary life. Mr. Jarvis, who had labored there for several seasons, was replaced in January last by Mr. Faryon, and he, in succession, in April, by the Rev. Wm. Gordon, a regularly ordained minister but recently arrived from Scotland, and who, being ordained, can administer the sacraments without being obliged to send to the nearest minister at Strathclair, as was the necessity in former years.

Mr. Gordon writes that he has overtaken all the appointments made by his predecessors, and finds more encouragement in his work as he becomes better acquainted with the people.

Through the kindness of many of the members of this Society, two large boxes of reading matter have been sent out during the year, and have been most gratefully acknowledged. The last one sent before 'Xmas contained numerous treats for the children, as well as much valuable literature, toys, school-books, and many pretty gifts and articles of warm clothing. These Mr. Gordon promised to distribute as wisely as possible. Four lamps for a dimly-lit school-house were also included, and most warmly appreciated. Their only light hitherto had been given by stable lanterns, or a lamp borrowed from the nearest neighbor, which only served to render the darkness more visible.

Mr. Gordon says that in one part of the outlying district along the main road to Neepawa, for over twenty miles and stretching across country for ten to twelve miles, there is no school at all, either Sabbath or week-day; there are many children of school age, and to these he will distribute some of the school books; he had held services at several points when he could spare the time.

At the Cumberland school-house a Christmas tree was provided for the children on Christmas eve, and was the great entertainment of the season for old as well as young. A programme of forty pieces was rendered by the children themselves; and it was quite refreshing to see how some of the very small children who had to be lifted to the platform gave their song or recitation. The school was filled to its utmost capacity, some of the young people having come a distance of twelve or fifteen miles, and would return after midnight with the thermometer 30° below zero.

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We have given these tew details to enable you to see more closely into the life there, and how all our efforts to promote happiness by adding to the creature comforts of the people are appreciated.

In April last it was decided to change the date of the Annual Meeting from October to February, in order that the yearly accounts might be entered in the Church reports, and thereby save much confusion.

It was also in April that, knowing the interest that Her Excellency takes in all good work, added to the fact of her being a member of this Church, it was decided to ask her to become our Honorary President, which request was most graciously acceded to.

At the usual Thank Offering Meeting, held in April, the large sum of \$204.70 was realized, the largest yet recorded.

The Ladies' Aid Society testified to their sympathy with this Society by donating the sum of \$50.00 for the work at Lake Dauphin, and this evidence of good will from a sister Society was much appreciated.

In June it was decided to send out the money then on hand instead of waiting until the close of the year, as it had been represented to the President how much the money was needed. The sum of \$250.00 was sent, the receipt of which was gratefully acknowledged, and at the close of the year \$70.00 more was sent, making in all \$320.00.

These figures show how much has been done during the last year, and we confidently look for increased zeal and energy on the part of the members in the year we are about to enter; and would call to your mind that beautiful verse of our dear Lord, when, in speaking to His disciples after His conversation with the woman of Samaria, He said: "Lift up your eyes and look on the fields, for they are white already to harvest."

Regular meetings have been held on the second Tuesday of each month, except in August, when a vacation was taken, and the November meeting was given up in favor of a Union meeting of all the Ottawa Auxiliaries, which was held in St. Paul's Church.

In September we united with the other Ottawa Auxiliaries to furnish a large box of warm clothing, sewing material, toys, books, stationery, etc., which was sent to the boarding school of Crowstand Mission in the Northwest, which gives shelter and education to twenty-six Indian children, since sending this box a pathetic letter in the December leaflet from the Bev. Hugh McKay of Round Lake, telling of the sufferings of some thirty poor old Indians from the intense cold and insufficient clothing, constrained some of our members to make up another bale of warm blankets and quilts, which were sent to these Round Lake Indians.

Our October meeting was also a Thank Offering Service, at which the offerings amounted to \$124 11. These offerings, with the membership fees and collections at our monthly meetings, are our only source of revenue.

As a branch of woman's work, this Society is affiliated with the National Woman's Council, and represented at its Board by our President, Miss Harmon.

The nucleus of thirteen has increased to a present membership of thirty-six, and after our Annual Meeting in January the sum of \$203.78 was forwarded by our Treasurer to Toronto to assist the work of Foreign Missions. At present there is a small balance on hand of \$25.20.

At our February meeting we had the pleasure of being addressed by the Rev. J. Fraser Campbell and Mrs. Campbell, Missionaries of Central India, who gave us many interesting and encouraging particulars of the work in that field.

And now we look forward prayerfully and hopefully to a new year of increased usefulness in this woman's work for women and children, especially those of our own Northwest, for we feel how feeble are our efforts in comparison with the great and immediate needs of the work of foreign missions.

The Young People's Society held its first Annual Meeting in November. The Society has a membership of ninety-one (91).

Social Committee.—There have been three social evenings, for which this Committee prepared refreshments.

Relief Committee.—One concert was held under the auspices of this Committee, and the money thus made is being used to procure flowers, fruit, and other things for those who are ill.

Temperance Committee.—This Committee arranged for one meeting in which the subject discussed was "Temperance."

Missionary Committee.—Five (5) meetings have been provided for, at which special Missionary topics have been taken up. For one of these Rev. J. H. McVicar of Honan was secured. The Sunday School Hall was crowded, so many were anxious to hear him. His address was most instructive and interesting. A collection was taken up which was handed over to the Committee for its work.

The Mission Band still continues its meetings every second Friday. The children are much interested in it and love to work for their little sisters and brothers in home and foreign lands.

Prayer Meeting Committee. - Forty three (43) prayer meetings have been held, with an average attendance of twenty (20). More interest is being taken in these meetings, and consequently the attendance has been slowly but surely increasing. This year the "Life of St. Paul" is being studied, and lists of the topics of the meetings have been printed and distributed When this Committee first began its work it was the intention to hold our Devotional Meetings fortnightly. This plan was carried out for several months, and while the meetings were, on the whole, successful, it was felt that greater good would be accomplished if we assembled weekly, and accordingly after a conference with our Pastor the change was made, and results have proved that it was a wise one. Those who have helped in any way to make the meetings bright and interesting have learned many valuable lessons which will enable them to be more efficient workers in the Master's Vineyard.

It is with mingled feelings of joy and sorrow that we record the death of Miss Maggie Bryson, one of our most faithful and earnest workers; joy, because Our Father has called her from all the trials and temptations of this life to be with Himself; and sorrow, because we have lost one who had endeared herself to all by her loving ways. May the tender Father console every member of the bereaved family.

In reviewing the work of the past year, our hearts cannot but be filled with gratitude to God for His wonderful loving kindness to us, that, in spite of every hindrance, His work has prospered in our hands, and we have been steadily marching onward, knowing that God's armour is all for help only God for forward in opportuni

The number of teachers and scholars on the roll is slightly in excess of last year, namely, 267 scholars and 29 teachers and officers, the average attendance being 160 scholars and 22 teachers and officers. In the primary department the sexes are evenly balanced, but in the main school the girls far outnumber the boys. We lose the older boys, because we have been unable to get teachers for the senior boys' classes who could do the work continuously. We need a teacher at once for such a class, or there is risk of its being lost to the school.

We have great pleasure in stating that Mr. L. H. Alexander, M. A., of the Collegiate Institute, has consented to take the leadership of the Young Men's Bible Class, which has been reorganized, and will in future meet on Sunday afternoons at 3:15 in the Church parlour.

A large addition, about 400 volumes, has been made to the library. The cost, \$213.45, has been defrayed through the kindness of the Treasurer of the Temporal Committee, in using for this purpose his commission on the collection of pew rents, and we hereby return our cordial thanks to him for the same.

A large map of Palestine has been purchased from the fund contributed by the Ladies' Aid Society, and Miss Shortreed of Toronto kindly made and presented four Missionary maps for the use of the school.

Four candidates wrote for the Higher Religious Instruction examination held in January, and three pupils were presented with Bibles for correct repetition of the entire Shorter Catechism at one time.

The Annual Picnic was held in September, but the weather being unfavorable, it was not well attended. The Festival on the ninth February was as usual highly successful.

The Orchestra continues to do good service, and has increased in numbers and efficiency during the year.

A Special Temperance Service and a Special Christmas Service were held, at which latter a leading feature was the bringing of gifts of fruit, toys, books, etc., by the scholars, to be distributed to poor and sick children.

Missionary services were held three times during the year, at the last of which, addresses were delivered by Rev. J. A. Slimmon of Honan, and Mr. John McNicol, a former pupil of the school, now studying for

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the Ministry. Mr. McNicol, in his address, stated that he was ready to go to China as a Missionary as soon as St. Andrew's Church was ready to send him.

A delegate was sent to the Provincial S. S. Convention held in Belleville in October last, Miss S. McDonald, who brought us back an excellent report of the proceedings.

The collections in the school during the year amounted to \$187.25, an increase of \$39.84 over last year, which sum has been allocated as follows:—

It gives us pleasure to note the extension of the work by the opening of the Glebe Sunday School, with Mr. F. H. Chrysler as Superintendent, which we trust will have a prosperous career and prove a blessing to that growing neighbourhood.

The longer we are engaged in Sunday School work, the more we are impressed with its importance. We must supply the lack of service of our Common School education in Biblical instruction. Home training and the Sunday School must go hand in hand in this work if our children and youth are to know the Holy Scriptures, which are able to make them wise unto salvation through faith which is in Christ Jesus,
