Produce was very scarce, as none could come in, on account of the whole population being under arms according to a proclamation from the Governor, compelling all male persons to unite in driving off the insurgents. There was no prospect of the siege being raised, as Urquiza, the instigator of the insurrection, has immense influence with the country people.—Boston paper.

**EXPEDITION TO PARAGUAY.**—The steamer "El Paraguay" left New York on Monday morning for Montevideo. She is under command of Lieut. Baldwin, U. S. N., and is destined to explore the Paraguay river. She is to be refitted at Montevideo, to make a river navigation, and is then to take on board an assorted cargo, which she awaits here, and commence the ascent of the Paraguay, a river of some 1000 miles in length. She is partly equipped with an exploring vessel of the upper waters of the Paraguay, where there are several ferocious establishments. The steamer has on board a number of gentlemen who intend to open commercial relations, or to enter into mining or other operations in that region, and to introduce machinery, manufactures, &c., into the popular and fertile regions of the upper Paraguay and its tributaries.—lb.
