



The offering of a \$2,500,000 bond issue of the Province of Nova Scotia at a price of 100 to yield the investor 5 per cent., was the most significant development in the Canadian bond market during the past week. As this is the highest price quoted on any Canadian issue in a number of years, and, in fact, since the beginning of the war, the interest of the financial community can be appreciated. The Canadian bond market on the whole continues to display a strong technical position with a tendency to advancing prices. Just how far or how long this position can be maintained cannot be determined, but bond dealers at least see nothing on the horizon to indicate that the trend shall be other than forward for the succeeding months, and, in fact, years. At the moment the floating supply of bonds is abnormally small, new financing has declined in more recent months, and many dealers have been following the practice of supplementing their Timkens.

In fact there has been a steady inflow of securities from London since the embargo on the importation of Canadian issues was lifted at the beginnning of 1921. The decline in value of bonds in New York, together with the fact that Canadian funds have moved in close proximity to par, have been able to import bonds from that centre profitably. At the moment Canadians are absorbing their own bonds formerly held in outside markets at a substantial rate, and thus are helping to create a strong financial foundation, which is of the utmost value to the Dominion as a whole.



Pittsburg, May 2—A cure for pulmonary tuberculosis by the use of purcarbon and calcium was claimed by Dr. Walter P. Nolan, of Jeanette,
Pa., it was learned today.

Dr. Nolan has informed members of the Westmarland County Medical Society that the cure is possible through the "inhalation of practically pure carbon in an amorphous form and calcium in the form of carbonate, phosphate, chloride and lactate.

Seventy-two cases, mostly far advanced, he said, had responded to the treatment so well that they could be pronounced cured. He said, he had been assisted in reaching his conclusions by Dr. Oskar Klotz, of the Rockefeller Foundation. Dr. Klotz is reported to be in Ottawa.
