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FAIL TO MAKE PERSIA RED

Last of Communists Reach Baku Pursued by Troops of the Shah—Ambassador Dismissed. Baku, Azerbaijan, Feb. 24.—The last of the Russian Communists have arrived here from Persia, fleeing before the troops of the Shah, under the general direction of the Prime Minister, Ghasvoun Saltno, who demanded that the terms of the Anglo-Russian treaty for both nations, to let Persia work out her own destiny, be observed.

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UNEASY OVER THE IRISH SITUATION

Embarrassment and Uncertainty After Sinn Fein Convention.

Hold Up Action on the Irish Treaty Until Matter Cleared Up—Faith in Irish Leaders, Says Westminster Gazette; Post Criticizes.

(Canadian Press Cable) London, Feb. 24—The embarrassment and uncertainty into which the Anglo-Irish agreement has thrown the relations between England and Ireland are stressed by the morning newspapers.

The political writers, however, do not profess to shed any light on the situation, being seemingly content to take the attitude adopted yesterday by Secretary for Colonies Churchill in the House of Commons.

The Westminster Gazette's political correspondent says the British ministers have perfect trust in the good faith of the Irish leaders but wish particularly to ascertain whether the provisional government is going to present to the Irish people a new constitution which shall be in strict accordance with the treaty.

The Daily Telegraph says the far-reaching change in the arrangements contemplated by the treaty has given rise to a great deal of speculation and misgivings.

It attributes the whole position to operations of the Republican leaders carried on in the heart of the people, the bulk of whom it maintains would support the treaty if the polls given a chance.

**ONLY TWO ROUTES
MADE PROFITS FOR
GOVERNMENT SHIPS**

Canadian Government Merchant Marine Had Operating Loss of \$900,044.

(Special to Montreal Gazette.)
Ottawa, Feb. 20.—The Canadian Government Merchant Marine has a big deficit this year. When Mr. Ballantyne delivered his marine budget last spring he figured out that for the year 1920 the fleet had earned 2.85 per cent. on the cost

of the ships, but his critics complained that he reached this profit by such methods as allowing only two per cent. for depreciation, when the normal figure is five per cent. and that if the ships had been operated by a private firm and proper account kept, this result would have been a heavy loss.

This year there is no attempt to show profit. Information now available shows that there is an actual operating loss of \$1,761,844 for the calendar year ended December, 1921, while the actual amount the country is set back for the privilege of owning a merchant marine of its own is between eight and nine millions. The gross operating revenue for the year was \$10,916,248, and the gross operating expense \$11,816,292, or a deficit of \$900,044, to which must be added overhead charges, wharfage, etc., amounting to \$861,800, making the total deficit as given above.

Taking the actual investment, however, and making allowance for interest and depreciation, the loss is very much larger. The total investment in the ships at present is over seventy millions, and assuming that last year it was around \$68,000,000, interest at 5% per cent. and depreciation at five per cent. on that sum amounts to \$6,525,000, which, added to the deficit announced on operation, gives a total loss of \$8,086,000. So far as the actual value today of the ships is concerned, it may be noted that a few days ago Robert Dollar, the shipping man who conducts a line of steamers out of Vancouver, bought three ships from the United States Shipping Board. Their original cost was \$200 a ton. He paid about \$30 a ton.

Two Routes Paid.
Apparently the government ships made a loss on every route except two. On nine voyages on the Australian route they made a profit of \$201,190, and on three voyages on the Indian route a profit of \$31,642. The loss on the passenger service to the West Indies, conducted by the Canadian Fisher and Canadian Forester, which have accommodation for thirty passengers each and carry freight as well, was \$286,300. The government also subsidizes the Royal Mail line on this route to the extent of \$100,000 a year.

Figures on all the routes quoted, with the exception of those on the West India freight and passenger service, and including the Australian and Indian routes which showed a profit are for the eleven months, including November. For that period, on the line to the United Kingdom, there was a loss of \$202,112 on forty-four voyages. On the six voyages to South America there was a loss of \$189,205; on fifteen voyages to European ports a loss of \$188,000; on the British Columbia-California route a loss of \$61,778.

The loss on the entire West Indies service, including the freight ships and the combined freight and passenger, was \$241,945. On certain years additional losses ranging as high as \$21,000, and if it had not been for the passenger service attempted, the West India operations might have come out on the right side, always remembering that interest and depreciation must be provided for.

Snyder of Edmonton and Mrs. Graves, at home; one son G. C. Crawford of East Orange. Dr. G. R. J. Crawford and William Crawford of this city, are brothers and Miss Mary Crawford of St. John is a sister.

FURTHER COMMENT
OF MR. ROSS ON
THE MUSQUASH

Refers to Criticism of His Report in Letter to the Mayor—What He Says.

The following letter from R. A. Ross, consulting engineer, has been received by Mayor Schofield:

Dear Sir:—I am indebted to you for a copy of The St. John Globe, dated February 17, containing a criticism of my report on the Musquash. I am glad to see that you have taken the trouble to read it, and I am sure that you will find it of interest.

In table I of his (Ross) report he states the static head on the east branch is 95 feet and on the west branch is 117 feet or an average of 106 feet. Our engineers compute the average between 95 and 117 to be 106. He goes on to state that with this head of 102 feet with a generator efficiency of 90 per cent, and a wheel efficiency of 60 per cent, "which seems fair when considering the fact that on the St. John demands will be for many hours 32 per cent or less, the number of cubic feet of water at the wheels necessary to generate one k.w.h. is 379 c.f.t. As a matter of fact at this assumed efficiency which is only 54 per cent, over all it would require 700 c.f.t. k.w.h. It might be pointed out that static head is the difference in elevation between tail water and head water and could not in any case be

GIRLS TOOK CHARGE OF HOTEL BILTMORE

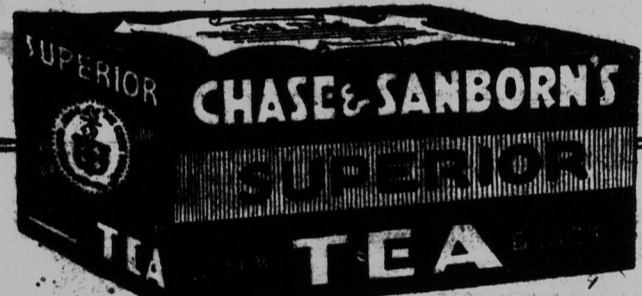
Debutantes Given Tips Up to \$75 and Newspapers Sold for \$1.

This ended at 3 o'clock and then the business of running the hotel was given back to the regular employees.

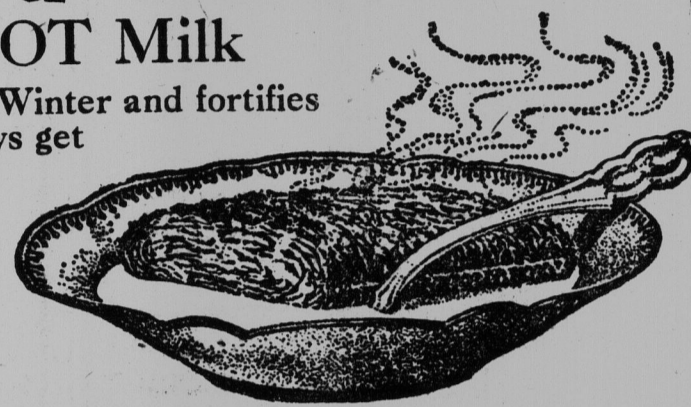

MARY PICKFORD IN COURT.

Mrs. Wilkenning, Theatrical Agent, is Suing Her for \$108,000.

Mary Pickford, accompanied by Douglas Fairbanks, appeared in the Federal court yesterday to defend the action brought against her by Mrs. Cora C. Wilkenning, a theatrical agent, to recover \$108,000 for services in arranging a contract with the Famous Players. This contract, it is alleged, netted Miss Pickford \$1,200,000. The suit was first tried in the Supreme court, where the agent won a verdict for the full amount. This verdict was set aside by the Appellate Division on the ground that it was not warranted by the evidence.

Counsel for Mrs. Wilkenning told the jury that Miss Pickford had asked her help to make a better contract with Adolph Zukor of the Famous Players, and that her efforts had resulted in an agreement by which Miss Pickford obtained a contract for 404 weeks at \$10,000 a week and an additional \$40,000 for reading manuscripts. This was in 1916.

Counsel for Miss Pickford said they would prove that Mrs. Wilkenning had nothing to do with the contract. Mrs. Wilkenning testified as to what she had done, and will resume the stand. A large crowd followed the two movie stars to the street and saw them speed away in their car.

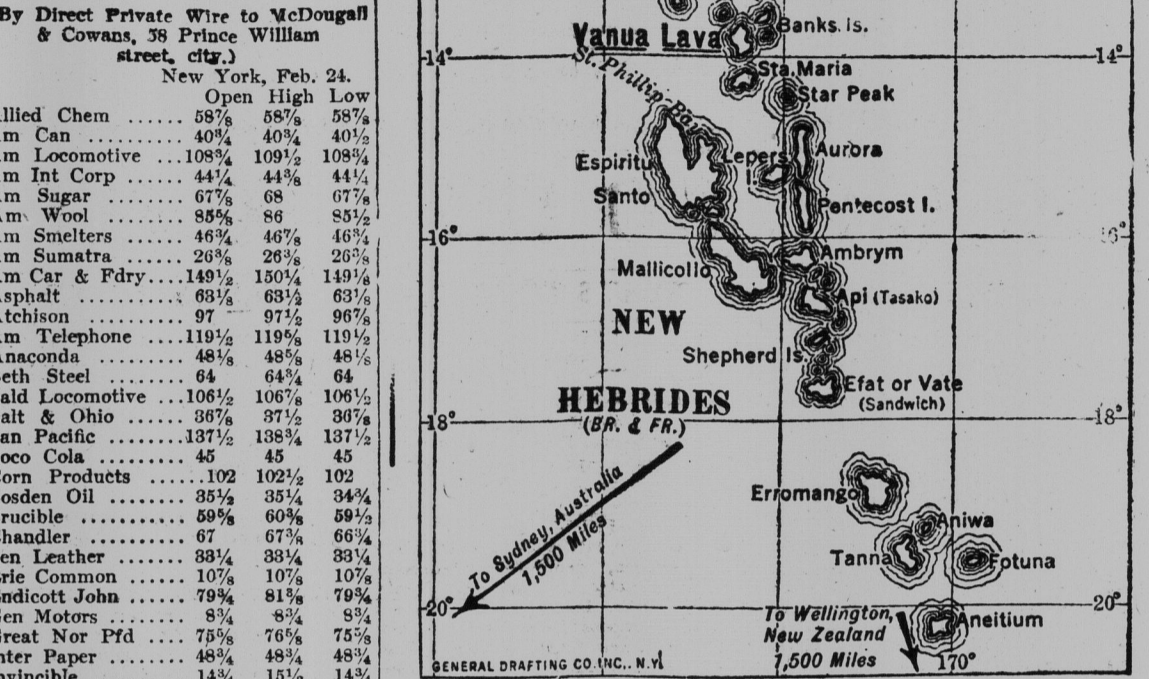

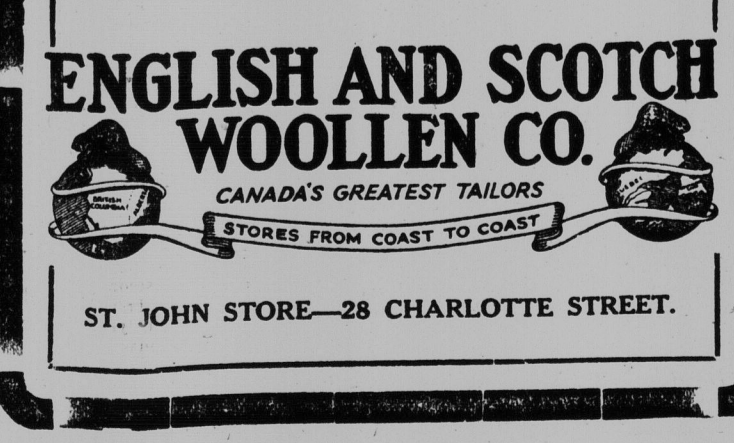
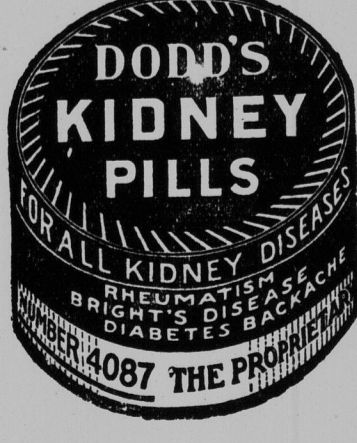

He claimed absolute innocence of the theft and said he had heard members of the St. John Window Cleaning Company on various occasions threaten to "put him on the hop" by some means. One man, named Cashwell, he said, had taken several parcels home with him on the dates near which the theft is alleged to have taken place. He had told his wife these were chamois for cleaning windows.

Three witnesses were heard in the case. Mike Small and William Cruikshank testified that they were present when Police Constable Saunders found the cloths in the defendant's bed. They had nothing to do with putting them there, they said. Fred Cashwell also said he had nothing to do with putting these pieces in the bed. He said he had taken no parcels home on the day before the theft was alleged to have taken place or on the day it occurred.

The magistrate told the defendant that he would have to send him up for trial on the evidence given. R. Mersereau appeared for the defence.

CASE OF INTEREST IN COURT HERE

An interesting non jury case was heard yesterday in the Supreme court, King's Bench division, a claim for commissions amounting to \$2,400 brought by Wm. C. Pugsley of Ottawa against Harry Garson. The matter dates back to 1918 and has to do with certain sales of "scraps" formerly Ross rifles and Ross rifle equipment.

The plaintiff claims to have put Mr. Garson in touch with the transaction, and had written to the defendant that he would expect a quarter of a cent a pound as commission; subsequently that the defendant met the plaintiff and J. A. Bernier of Montreal in Ottawa and there it was disclosed that Don Fisher was the third party who had the goods for sale. The defendant claimed to have known about the goods previously and did not think the influence of Mr. Pugsley and Mr. Bernier necessary for him to secure them. Both said they wanted the commission for putting him in touch with Mr. Fisher. Mr. Bernier brought an action in Montreal but dropped it and assigned his claim to Mr. Pugsley who brought the action in this province. It was asserted that Mr. Fisher had not received any commission in connection with any such sale—in fact he was very indignant that his name had been used in connection with the matter.

The defence quoted an order-in-council which forbids the giving of such commissions on sales of war goods, passed in October 1916. The plaintiff's solicitor contended that there was no power to pass such an order.

The case was argued before Mr. Justice Crockett yesterday and judgment reserved. Mr. Fisher was heard in reference to the sale and denied any attention to outside influence except on the merits of the transaction. Dr. P. R. Taylor, K. C., appeared for the plaintiff and J. H. A. L. Fairweather for the defendant.

FEAR SON OF J. ROY THOMSON HAS LOST LIFE

Missing Since Yesterday Afternoon at School Near Toronto—Thought He Has Been Drowned.

Fears that his eleven-year old son, Archie, has been drowned were conveyed to J. Roy Thomson this morning in a telegram received from his eldest son. The older boy, who is attending the University of Toronto, wired that Archie who is a student at the Attleborough, Ont., was last seen at 4.55 o'clock yesterday afternoon on the far side of the creek near the school and it was feared that he was swept away by the creek current while crossing and was drowned. He had been searched for everywhere but no trace could be found.

Mr. Thomson said this morning that Jack had left Toronto for Oakville to get further information if possible, but that he had no more news from him. Oakville is about thirty miles from Toronto. Besides his parents, who reside at Rothsay, and his brother Jack, the young lad has one sister. His two grandmothers are now in Toronto. Mrs. J. D. Chipman making her home there and Mrs. John Thomson visiting. Naturally the family and friends are greatly distressed over the sad news.

EXPERT THINKS SIGNATURE IS NOT GENUINE

Outstanding Development today in Charles T. Nevins Will Case.

Before his honor Judge McInerney this morning the Charles T. Nevins will case was continued, evidence being given by Frederick Bryden identifying the signature on several checks as that of the testator. The most outstanding feature of the case today was the evidence of Charles R. Hazen, of Montreal, consulting chemist and handwriting specialist who after a microscopic examination of photographs of the check signatures and the signature on the will, said he would conclude that the signature on the will was forged. The photographs had been sent to him in Montreal.

He found that the general pattern of the letters in the will signature was similar to that of those on the checks but differed in many details. There was no loop, for instance in the "C" of Charles in the signature on the will; there was a difference in the slant of the letters and it would appear that the signature on the will was made by one not accustomed to write it, having been very carefully drawn out. Mr. Nevins' ordinary signature showed a light touch but that on the will was of a heavy and so much so in fact that the ink had gone through the paper as if it had been a most laborious effort.

The case is not yet finished.

THEFT AT DANCE CHARGE IN COURT

Allegation That \$45.55 of Committee Money was Taken Last Night.

Two witnesses were heard this morning in the police court, in the preliminary hearing of a case against Edward Ritchie, charged with the theft of \$45.55 from a woman at the Studio Dancing Academy last night. The woman testified that she was a member of the committee in charge of a dance being held by the Grand Bay Quing Association and had about \$46 belonging to the association, which she had received for tickets. This was in a hanging which she left in the kitchen of the Studio about 9 o'clock. About 9.45 o'clock she went into the kitchen, found the safe on the bag open and only \$2.45 change in the bag. She had seen the defendant at the dance. A ticket bearing the name of Ned Furlong was produced, and the witness said she had received this from the taker of the tickets. The latter told of the defendant last night, where he was taking tickets for the dance, telling him he had left his ticket home. He said Ritchie promised to bring the ticket the next morning and gave him the name of Ned Furlong, Germain street. This name the witness wrote on another ticket. This was the only evidence given this morning.

BRAVE SCOUT TO BE HONORED

John Peacock to Receive Silver Cross for Saving of Life.

An event of interest to every Boy Scout in the city will take place in Trinity school room next Monday evening when John Peacock, of the eighth St. John Mission Troop will be made the recipient of a silver cross for life saving. The cross is the third highest award given to Boy Scouts for life saving. It will be presented by A. C. Skelton, Provincial Commissioner of the Boy Scouts Association, on behalf of the governor general, chairman of the dominion medal board.

Some months ago Scout Peacock plunged into the water in Marble Cove and rescued a little chap who fell overboard while trying to board a motor launch. Following the presentation the troops will be addressed by C. C. Kirby, divisional engineer of the C. P. R., who will speak on Boy Scout work and bridge building.
