TWENTY-FIVE CENTS A TON ON COAL PRICE

Consumer Has to Pay it; Dealers and Railways Will Split it Between Them

Toronto, May 1.—Commencing today the consumer in Ontario will be paying the price of anthracite coal to the domestic twenty-five cents a ton. There will be no increase in the cost of the commodity to the dealers. Of the additional twenty-five cents a ton which the consumer will be called upon to pay, ten cents will go to the railways as an increase in their tariff, and fifteen cents will go to the pockets of the dealers as additional profits.

SENDING TWO HINDU WOMEN OUT OF CAN.

Ottawa Orders Deportation Wives of Two Sikhs in British Columbia

OPINION IS DIVIDED

There Has Been Quite a Stir Over it, and it is Believed Resident East Indians Will Strongly Resist Government Action

(Canadian Press)

Vancouver, May 1.—Two Hindu women and two children, who have been the subject of much discussion since their arrival here on January 21, are being deported today. When Inspector McGill was examining passengers on the S.S. Montague when she reached here on January 21 last from the Orient, he found two Sikhs, who had previously resided in Canada, and who had brought their wives with them. They were Bhag Singh, secretary of the Gurmukh Mission, and his wife, and Balwant Singh, president of the Sikh temple here. There was great excitement among the local Singh community, and many white people took up the cudgels in behalf of the oriental women. It was their opinion that the immigration authorities, of course, were wrong and that they were being deported on a dangerous principle and that their wives should be rigidly excluded. The stand of the immigration authorities, of course, was based on the regulation that all immigrants must come to Canada direct from the land of their birth or citizenship. ABOUT SIXTY MILLIONS TO YOUNG ASTOR

Disposition of Eighty Per Cent. of Original Estate Provided for by First Grandfather's Will

New York, April 29.—In spite of many rumors two facts in my possession through a reliable source stand out supreme: First, Colonel Astor made no will which is known of in this country since his second marriage; second, whatever will he did leave and the terms of that will are not known.

EXPERT DISCUSSES HYGIENE OF TEETH
 Dr. Johnson of Chicago Explains Importance for Health

(Toronto News)

Not for some time has a more interesting or instructive address on hygiene been delivered in the city than that given by Professor C. A. Johnson, chairman of the Public Dental Service Board, Chicago, in the St. Mary's School last evening on the use and care of the teeth.

No problem, he declared, was of such primary importance to parents and school teachers as the care of the teeth of the children under their control. Yet this problem was largely one of latest date, for a great veil of ignorance was being lifted.

In the United States there is some advantage in being born a Jew, declared the speaker, in showing that a farmer with sick stock could obtain governmental relief, but a widow mother with ill children received no assistance. "Thank God, no such conditions exist in Ontario," he declared amid applause. "The government appreciates that the loss to an individual is a loss to the state. The new health regulations and plans will prove wonderfully efficacious. The government appreciates the health of the people."

"It has but lately become known that the teeth are receptacles of disease germs," he continued. "A healthy child may have teeth loaded with germs of infection. This had happened in the Chicago public schools where the quarantining of scarlet fever schoolers had yet failed to check the disease."

Traceable to Bad Teeth

"The yearly toll of tuberculosis is appalling and yet almost entirely unnecessary. Ninety per cent of the cases, said an authority, were traceable to faulty mouths. Unhealthy mouths invariably mean unhealthy systems."

"It is time that we stopped this decay in the mouths of our children."

"Efficiency, he pointed out, was the aim of all education and teaching. Faulty mouth-conditions developed terrible habits. Drunkards in the street, the victims of faulty nourishment. An authority had said that the large percentage of drunkards was caused by poor cooking. Nature takes her toll every time. Every tooth neglected, or lost, will be paid for, he declared.

"Mr. Horace Fletcher, a layman scientist," continued the speaker, had performed no small service for the world in emphasizing mastication. Good mastication means a great deal to the individual.

Eight thousand children out of the host attending Chicago schools, had missed their grades through defective teeth. This meant an enormous expense for the civil authorities and a life handicap for the child.

"Chicago was merely waking to the fact. Wealthy men were endowing and supporting dental dispensaries and dental clinics for the children."

"It is a state duty. Experiment had shown what traceable would do. Physical, mental and moral improvement was gained."

"How to feed teeth handicap a child?" he asked and illustrated this question by a reference to a splendid and popular teacher whose eyesight was ruined and discounted by a defect of protruding teeth and loose jaw that might have been remedied in youth.

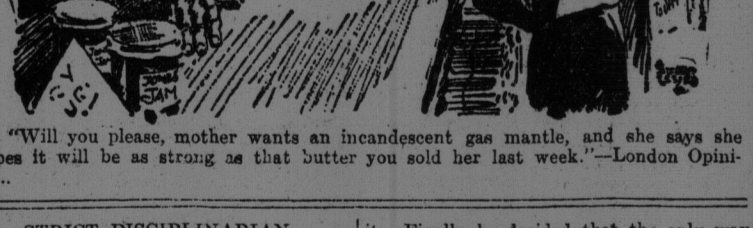

LIMESTONE AND IRON ORE SHIPMENTS TO BE LARGER

IS GLACE BAY REPORT (Glace Bay Gazette.) The seasons' work at the limestone area of the Dominion Steel Corporation, Marble Mountain, has commenced and the busiest summer in the history of the company's work there is predicted. At the present time the company has some 400 men engaged in crushing and as the season advances this number will be increased to 500 or 600. An output of 500,000 tons is looked for this season, which will be approximately 100,000 tons in excess of last year's output.

The only steamer which will be engaged in the limestone trade this year will be the Hestice, which carries a cargo of 400 tons and the officials are confident that she will be capable of handling all the limestone required. She is now at Sydney having her hoppers installed and is expected to arrive at the pier with the first cargo on May 1st.

The company does not expect to ship any great quantity this summer from their recently acquired area at Port au Port, Nfld. Development work and the erection of the necessary machinery will require considerable time before shipments can be started, and it will be well towards the end of the summer before any limestone will be sent to Sydney from there.

The first shipment of iron ore from the Wabana mines will be made about May 1st. The steamer Sandford and Stortz, each of 10,000 tons carrying capacity, will be chartered in the trade again this season. Surface mining will be started early in May. At present two slopes provide the output. With the addition of an additional blast furnace at the Steel plant a large quantity of ore will be required this summer, and an output of between six hundred and fifty and seven hundred thousand tons will be produced.

In order to transport this large quantity the two boats will have the big task of carrying 140,000 tons per month during the next five months. The number of men employed at present is about 900. In order to handle this large quantity of ore, the docking facilities at the Sydney pier have been improved and also the stock yard has been enlarged.

Five of Titanic Dead Transported Through St. John to States This Morning

Five bodies of the Titanic disaster were taken through the city this morning on the early Halifax express and taken to the states on the Boston train. The private car "Constitution" had one body, while three of the other bodies were those of F. D. Millet, of Washington, M. C. Long, of Worcester, Mass., and E. O. Oshby, of New York. The body of Colonel Astor is to be taken through this evening in the private car "Osmo," as well as the body of J. Straus, which will be in car No. 700 of the T. C. R. The bodies will be taken from here to the Boston express which leaves here at 6:40 o'clock.

RED FLAG OF SOCIALISM IN MONTREAL STREETS

A Parade to Champ De Mars For May Day Celebration

Montreal, May 1.—Borne by a girl clad in flaming scarlet, the red flag of socialism will be carried through the streets of Montreal tonight, heading a band of 1,000 of its followers who will parade to the Champ De Mars, the historic down town square, to hear the May day speeches. Sergeant ready to see that no insult is offered. This was decided last night at a meeting of the Young Socialists Club of Montreal.
Early this afternoon women members of the socialist order were out in the streets, wearing red caps, the socialist button, and also socialist newspapers. It was decided that no further action would be taken for those. Whatever those willing to help the cause felt like contributing should be accepted.

TODAY'S POLICE COURT

A Theft Charge—Sheffield Street Case is Defended

In the police court this morning, four prisoners charged with drunkenness were fined \$4 or two months in jail each. One prisoner, also charged with drunkenness, was sent for a term to the Good Shepherd's Home.
William Allen, charged with assaulting Henry Carr in the latter's house in Duke street, pleaded not guilty to the charge. Carr testified that the prisoner, in company with several other young men, went to his house last night and tried to get into a party which was being held there. He, the witness, put Carr out and said that Allen tried several times to kick him, and that another one struck him in the face. Allen denied the charge and the case was adjourned until tomorrow morning to secure witnesses.

Frederick Secord, arrested on charge of assaulting his father, Abner Secord, pleaded not guilty. The father said that his son had been drinking and wanted to beat him. He tried to get him home but the son refused. He then had him arrested. Policeman Henry said that when he arrived on the scene, people were shouting "murder," "police," and that he arrested the prisoner because of what Mr. Secord had told him. He was remanded until tomorrow.

The case against Sarah Morris, charged with keeping a house of ill-repute in Sheffield street, and Gertrude Ebbett, Kathleen McLennan and Frederick Martin, charged with being inmates, was continued this morning. All went on the stand and denied the charges made against them. The Morris woman said that she kept a boarding house and that the prisoners boarded with her. The case was adjourned until two o'clock this afternoon.
Frederick McDowell, charged with stealing \$7 worth of butter from Thomas E. Robinson, proprietor of a dairy in Main street, pleaded not guilty. He was arrested in St. Stephen several days ago.
Mr. Robinson said that McDowell had been in his employ as a driver for two months, and that after his departure for St. Stephen he missed the butter. He suspected McDowell. The witness identified a hymn book which was found on the prisoner when arrested, as one that belonged to his wife.
Carl A. Nelson, also in the employ of Mr. Robinson, told of missing a white coat on the day the prisoner went away. The case was adjourned until this afternoon.
