THE MUSCLES may be strengthened by a vigorous use of them; but not so the nerves; they are weakened by it. While exercising muscles in every way that is suitable, care should be taken to spare the nerves and senses as much as possible.

The eyes, for instance, should be protected from too strong a light; from strain in the dark; from the continued examination of minute objects; and the ears from too loud sounds.

Above all, the brain should never be forced, or used too much at the ears from too loud sounds, alignstion; for them the same vital energy which forms thoughts in the strength of the performance of its essential function, has led many people into foolish disregard of the first rule of good health—proper rest. It is most important to allow the brain the full measure of sleep which is necessary to restore it; for sleep is to a man's whole nature what winding is to a clock.

The sleepless tests performed on university students recently by professors resulted as any sensible person could have foretold; no one can use his brain properly who hasn't had sufficient sleep.

THREATS from Moncton that hockey leaders there intended bringing a court action against Vice-President W. E. Stirling, of Saint John, representing the M. P. B., to show cause why re-instatement should not be made in the case of Rod Bidlake, suspended Fredericton goalie now residing in Moncton, brought forth a reply this morning from Mr. Stirling that under the present rules, the M. P. B. did not have the power to re-instate a Class B man, such as Bidlake is, or even grant him a temporary card until a vote had been taken by the executive of the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada. "Bidlake's application did not come to hand until last week" said Mr. Stirling, "although these players were warned last summer that they should have their papers ready as the procedure required time."

"If they expect us to rush things and break rules, they are mistaken," said Mr. Stirling. "I am getting tired of this rushing in at the last minute, and am getting to the point where the strict letter of the law will be enforced. Under our procedure the application for reinstatement first goes to the chairman of the New Brunswick registration committees. It is in his hands now. The registration committee secures all the evidence on the matter possible and I may say we have a man in Fredericton checking that up today. If it is worthy of recommendation for reinstatement, it goes to the executive of the M. P. B., and if the M. P. Failure to have these cards for their games will be followed by suspension," said the vice-president. This ruling applies to all juniors, intermediates and seniors, and Mr. Stirling asks that this be done at once to save any last-minute rush.
