THIRTEENTH ANNUAL MEETING.

The Thirteenth Annual Meeting of the Toronto Infants' Home and Infirmary was held at the Home, St. Mary's Street, on Thursday, October 25th, at 3 P.M.

There was a large attendance of ladies and gentlemen interested in the well-being of the Home.

Ex-Mayor McMurrich read a letter from Mayor Clarke, regretting that a very pressing engagement prevented his attending the meeting.

Alderman John McMillan then took the Chair.

The Meeting was opened with prayer by the Rev. John Pearson.

The Secretary's Report was read by ex-Mayor McMurrich.

Mr. Wm. Mulock, M.P., read the Report of the Treasurer, also expressing the thanks of the ladies of the Board to Sir Wm. Howland for his many years of kindness to the Home as Treasurer of the Building Fund.

After the various reports were moved and adopted, several of the gentlemen present spoke in favour of the work done in the Home, and the chairman, Alderman McMillan, expressed himself as in favour of an increase in the present grant of the City Council to the Home.

The Rev. Dr. Parsons pronounced the Benediction, after which, the Cottage Hospital and Home were inspected by the visitors, and refreshments served to their guests by the ladies of the Board.

SECRETARY'S REPORT,

OCTOBER, 1888.

The Thirteenth Annual Report of the Infants' Home and Infirmary is presented to the public, with the feeling on the part of the Managers, that there is great cause for thankfulness that no serious epidemic has visited the Home during the year now passed, and that an Almighty Providence has watched over them, and given help in time of their greatest need. More than once their funds were almost exhausted, and assistance came to them from most unexpected sources. At the Annual Meeting of last year, 1887, we had hoped to show you our Cottage Hospital in a completed state. This year we can report it as finished, while thanks to the generosity of friends, more particularly Mrs. Nordheimer and Lady Macpherson, the furnishing of some rooms is quite completed.

We are most thankful to be able to say that for hospital purposes, the building has not been in use, but during the Spring, when we were overcrowded, we found it of great benefit. Being practically isolated from the main building, to use it constantly, would necessitate engaging a special Matron in charge, an extra expense we could ill afford. We reported last year having received \$155 from Morse's Soap Company, which sum was to be expended upon the erection of a Summer shelter for the children; owing to the

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increased price of labour and material, tenders for this building demanded double the amount of money set apart for the purpose, but here some young ladies came to our assistance, and to the "Busy Bee" Club we return many thanks for their handsome donation of \$140.20 towards the shelter. The work was at once taken in hand, and a large open shed, also much needed fence and gates 12 feet in height are erected, the result of these two donations. This shelter has already proved a great benefit, but still requires a good floor, with low tables and forms, so that when the little ones are out at play on fine days, their meals may be taken to them. With so many inmates to feed, and clothe, extras must of necessity wait for the chance gifts of an ever generous public. While mentioning gifts, we may here, I think, notice with much gratitude, two legacies, each of \$500. One of these sums was left by Mrs. Mary Pollard, (always a steady friend of the Home), in the hands of trustees, the interest on this sum to be paid yearly to the Managers. The second legacy from the venerable Andrew Heron, will be paid to the Home by the executors when the estate is wound up. \$500 may not appear a large sum to wealthy people, but if our business and professional men would only realize, even in a partial manner, the great relief to those in charge of the expenses of this, or other of our charitable institutions, when such bequests are made, they would, in arranging their worldly affairs, more often bequeath a sum in such a manner as to cause their names to be remembered by means of such bequests. When public acts and even private worth have been long forgotten by a busy world, the good derived from such legacies, will be the source of a never ending gratitude.

In connection with this subject this Board desires to set forth the statement that the sum of \$1000 will, properly invested, endow and maintain a cot or cradle in the Home in perpetuity, such cot or cradle to be called by the name chosen by the donor, while the benefactor is entitled (should such gift take place during life) to nominate a child to such cot or cradle at any time that it may be vacant. We have one cot in the Home endowed in this manner, a perpetual reminder of one of our late Managers, who was also a constantly interested worker, the late Mrs. Mulock. We have also one cradle called "The Maurice Mason" Cradle, to be kept if possible for the use of a deserted baby boy.

We are promised a yearly sum from "The Little Maids'" Society, all of whom are under twelve years of age, for the purpose of keeping up a cradle. The first yearly payment was made about a month ago, and the Managers feel sure that if other little girls would occupy part of their spare time in some similar way, they would soon find how much more blessed it is to give than to receive.

The Treasurers' Report which will follow this, deals with bare facts, and consequently cannot enter into details as to special wants or expenses, so a few words here may not be out of place.

When the Building Fund to erect this Home was first canvassed for, subscriptions were given extending over a term of five years, these are now all paid up, making it a necessity for the Board to provide for two half-yearly payments of interest, on the \$7,500 mortgage upon the Infants' Home. This interest at 6 per cent. makes a large sum for the managers to provide in addition to the running expenses of such a Home as this, where so large a proportion of the inmates are

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unable to take care of themselves. Can you wonder then that at times the energies of the management are taxed to the utmost, and that not long since our funds being very low, the relief was proportionately great, when after anxious consultation over the means of meeting a heavy interest over-due, a cheque was sent in for \$500, from a generous friend who desires to remain unnamed, which opportune help tided the Managers over their most pressing care, causing all to feel that surely this work, maintaining the helpless little ones, is guided by a Higher Hand than our own. Still, as all business men know, interest has to be met half-yearly, and subscriptions to the Building Fund would be indeed a great boon. In spite of the greatest economy our running expenses are necessarily heavy; these delicate infants requiring more warmth and more careful feeding than older children in other Homes. The public in general do not realize that this Institution is an Infirmary as well as a Home, no child if friendless is refused admittance, even if brought to the Home, as is often the case, in a dying state. Rather than swell our death rate we might decline to take such cases in, but this charity is for Infants, and aims at easing, if needs be, the passage to the grave of these frail atoms of humanity.

Many a working man, whose wife has been taken from him by death, comes to us asking that his motherless infant or tiny children, may be sheltered in our care; the poor father having in some cases first tried his own skill in washing and caring for the wee baby, before he is told by some compassionate friend of the Infants' Home. Can you wonder that so often the lamp of life flickers and dies?

But we have a bright and cheering side to our story in the healthy and cheerful look of our Home children

proper, especially in the Ward known as the Susan Howland Ward. It is from this room that our children are usually chosen for adoption by those childless or bereaved parents, who come to us asking to be allowed to take one of our babies for their very own. Should any parent in the Home with her child, or any person who has left a child in our care, desire to give such child for adoption, the responsibility of so doing rests with the parent or guardian. Our aim is to place deserted or orphan children in homes where they will be brought up in an atmosphere of love, and judging by the letters constantly received from those who have adopted children from this Institution, we have cause to be most thankful that our Home has been the means of placing nearly ninety such children under parental care. One curious fact remains that almost invariably the yearly, or semi-yearly letter to the Managers, from the adoptors, describes the particular child as either most intellectual, or unusually bright for its age, a very satisfactory proof of our early care, and their affectionate partiality.

Suppose the Infants' Home did not exist, how many lives would be lost, that will now in all probability take their part in the future welfare of this young and rapidly growing country. Moreover, the benefit is not to the children alone. Many a girl who but for the care and shelter of this Home would possibly swell the sad number of outcasts from society, leaves here with hope in her heart for the future, and a fixed determination to lead a higher life, the grateful letters received from them, and from many sorrowful and anxious parents, are to the Managers and officers of this Home, "an exceeding great reward."

Many of our applications have been for the admission of deserted wives with infants, or little children,

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Of this class we have sheltered a large number, "want of work," or "gone in search of work," is the usual answer to enquiries as to why these wives are so deserted.

The Infants' Home has now completed its thirteenth year, and during that period has cared for 1,866 children, and 909 women. From October 1887, to September 1888, we have provided for and sheltered 187 children, the largest number yet received in one year. Of these the record is as follows:

Of this number 187 in all, 51 were admitted as Infirmary patients taken in with the knowledge that they could not survive to suffer long, children of drunken, or careless parents, neglect but too quickly does its work.

Of the 89 mothers in the Home from October 1887, to September 30th, 1888, 70 were Protestant, 19 were Roman Catholic, and their record is as follows:

These figures speak for themselves as to what the needs and wants of this large family must be. The item of bedding is a serious one, and blankets are always a most acceptable gift, and one very much required at the present time, for although the ladies of the workroom are most industrious, as their report will show, blankets are on too large a scale for them to undertake the making at present. For the steady

kindness which prompts these ladies to work so patiently at clothing for our infants and nurses, the Managers can find no adequate thanks.

So long as babies need clothes, so long must we ask for helpers in this department of our work, and volunteers for the work room will be gladly welcomed on Mondays, from 10 until 1 P.M. Embodied in this report, when printed, will be found a list of the articles made in the Home by the women, 1510 articles representing a good deal of industry on their part. This work is cut out, or prepared by the officers of the Home, and each inmate takes her share of the work of sewing or knitting. Partly worn infants' clothing is often sent to us, this is also placed in order and kept in repair by our nurses, and of the womanly occupation of needlework they are usually very fond.

The moral and religious aspect of our work has been and is most carefully taken in charge. At any hour, day or night, when needed the Rev. John Langtry responds to the call. The Rev. R. C. Caswall has also proved our warm and steady friend. During the Summer the Home lost a most earnest worker by the death of the Rev. O. P. Ford, who took charge of the Tuesday evening Bible Class. Baptism is administered the first Monday in each month by the Rev. J. Pearson.

The Thursday evening class continues to be taught by Miss Saunders and Miss Donaldson. The Misses Alice and Bessie Kemp undertake the musical part of the Sunday morning and Tuesday evening services. Miss Jarvis, who for so long and so faithfully has conducted the Sunday evening Bible Class, still continues her interest in the Home by this good work. During Miss Jarvis's absence for some months this Summer, Mrs. H. C. Dixon most kindly took her place.

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Of the gratuitous services of our Medical staff, we can only say it is difficult to find words fully expressing the appreciation on the part of the Managers, of the gift they so freely bestow upon the inmates of this Home, of their valuable time and skill. The orders of the Physicians are carefully attended to, and carried out by our energetic Lady Superintendent, Miss Boulton, with her able assistant Mrs. Jordan. To their unflagging efforts the Managers feel that the working success of the Home is due. To the Clergy and all other warm-hearted friends and helpers in this Institution, the Board of Managers desire to offer their most sincere thanks. All visitors to the Home are welcomed by the officers at any hour during the day before 5 P.M.

Ministers of the Gospel who will visit the Home are gladly received, also friends desiring to read to, or leave books with the inmates.

In conclusion, the Managers would most earnestly ask the kind hearted people who entertain an erroneous impression regarding the work done by the Home, that they would send for, and read a Report, then come to the Home to judge for themselves, ending, as is often the case, in becoming some of our warmest supporters.

PHYSICIANS' REPORT.

To the President and Ladies of the Directorate.

Ladies, I have the honour to report on behalf of the Medical Staff of the Home, as follows:—

That of the 187 children admitted during the year ending Sept. 30th, 1888, there were 61 deaths in all, or 32 per cent., if we are to calculate the deaths on the supposition that the number of children in the Home at the end of Sept., 1888 was the same as on Oct. 1st, 1887.

From the greater number, however, admitted, there being 60 at the end of Sept., 1888, as compared with 47 on Oct. 1st, 1887, it is apparent that the percentage of deaths for 1887 to 1888 is larger than ought fairly to be calculated. Of the 187 admitted there were sent to the Infirmary on admission 51, and entered on the Infirmary register as dying children. We thus have but 10 children, or only a little more than 5 per cent. of deaths, or 20 per cent. less than the average of deaths in the city of Toronto, of children under one year of age, it averaging about 25 per cent. of all births.

It is interesting to note the great variations in the deaths in different seasons of the year. Thus in the

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| Autumn quarter there were 11 deaths. | | | |

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This is all the more noticeable inasmuch as the number of infants entered in the different quarters as dying, did not account for the quarterly mortality. Thus there were entered :

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| In Autumn quarter | 27 | and 7 | dying |

The Home has been fortunate in having no outbreak of contagious disease to report during the year ; we must assign in some degree to this fact the small death rate, but to have still further to congratulate ourselves on the fact that, even though such an outbreak had taken place, the facilities for isolating such disease in the new annex opened during the year, would doubtless have prevented any serious increase in the death rate due to epidemic causes.

The condition of the house plumbing and drainage has, on several occasions during the year been the cause of anxiety, but we understand that since the extensive repairs and alterations have been completed, it is now in a fairly satisfactory condition.

We must congratulate the Board upon the auspicious circumstances under which a new year is begun.

RULES FOR THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT.

I.

Regular meetings of the Board shall be held on the first Tuesday of every month, at 11 a. m.

Special meetings may be called upon an order from the President, or at the request of any three members.

II.

All meetings shall be opened with prayer as soon after the appointed hour as a quorum shall be present (five to constitute a quorum), including one of the Officers.

The following order shall be observed:—The Secretary shall read minutes of preceding meeting, which shall be signed by the President; inform the meeting of any correspondence that has taken place, and read a general report of the condition of the Institution.

The Treasurer shall present her account of all moneys received and expended during the past month, to be audited and signed by the President; or, in her absence, by one of the Vice-Presidents.

III.

The Treasurer shall receive and take charge of all moneys belonging to the Institution, as well as the children's fees, keeping accounts of the same. All accounts shall be brought by her, before the meeting of the Managers, to be signed by the President.

IV.

A Committee of five shall meet every Monday morning, at 11 a. m., consisting of the President (or a Vice-President), Treasurer, and Secretary, the Visitor of the previous week, and the Visitor of the current week, when the said Visitor shall report her experience. The Committee shall be called the Committee of Admission and Investigation, and every application for admission, both of children and nurses, shall be referred to them. This Committee shall arrange about the adoption of children from the Home, and shall report to the General Committee once a month. On these occasions three shall form a quorum. A Visitor shall be appointed by the Secretary to visit the Home daily each week, each Manager taking this duty

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in turn. The Visitor shall ascertain from the Lady Superintendent all about the health of the children, and the conduct of the Nurses, and shall report the same to the weekly Committee.

V.

When the Board shall have been called to order, all conversation shall cease.

VI.

One member only of the Board shall be allowed to speak at a time, and then only on the business of the meeting. The Manager having the floor shall address herself to the Chair.

RULES FOR ADMISSION OF CHILDREN.

Applications for admission of children must be made to the Weekly Committee, which meets at the Home, St. Mary Street, every Morning at 11 o'clock.

No child over two years of age will be admitted, unless by special permission of the Committee.

Infants pay \$5 per month, children who can walk \$4, unless remitted by the Committee of Admission.

Every child admitted must be examined by a physician.

RULES FOR ADMISSION OF MOTHER NURSES.

1. Each woman admitted must nurse and feed a child in addition to her own, unless otherwise ordered by a physician.

2. Each woman admitted must give her services for at least six months, to the Institution (or as much longer as the necessities of her own child, or her charge may require, to be determined by the Board) in return for board, lodging, and clothing for herself and child.

3. Her good conduct during her residence in the Home will secure her the assistance and recommendation of the Lady Managers in obtaining, when she leaves, a desirable situation.

4. Each applicant (whether child or woman) who shall have received a permit to enter the Institution from the Committee shall be referred to the visiting physician, who, if he concur in the admission shall order the Lady Superintendent to have the name, age, condition, &c., of the applicant entered on the record, and registered as an inmate.

5. No unmarried woman admitted, except with her first born.

PARTIES WISHING TO ADOPT BABIES

Must send to the Home certificates stating that they have the means of bringing up a child, and that they can give the child a Christian education. Inquiries will be made at once relative to the parties applying, and those recommending, and if the result of these inquiries is satisfactory, the applicants will be notified that they can come and make their selection.
