The Home Rule Question

Just when the British Government should be giving all their attention to the prosecution of the war, it is again "to be distracted by internal feud and dissension," brought about by those who are attempting to establish Home Rule for Ireland.

Shortly after the war broke out it was agreed by all parties that the Home Rule Bill should not become operative until after the close of the war.

It was generally understood that an amending Bill would be passed excluding the six counties in Ulster from the Home Rule provisions. Ulster did not want the Union between England and Ireland to be broken.

The Sinn Fein Rebellion broke out, for the purpose, it is said, of making Ireland a Republic, but more probably for the purpose of forcing the Home Rule Question or to create "internal feud and dissension" so that England may be hampered, to some extent at least, in carrying on the successful prosecution of the war.

It looks now as if the Rebels succeeded, at least partly, in their designs, for England's statesmen who are mainly responsible for the prosecution of the war had their attention divided because of the revival of the Home Rule agitation.

The Nationalists, led by John Redmond, are inclined to throw away an opportunity of bringing the Home Rule Bill into immediate operation by the retention of the Parliament of Northern Ireland, and the exclusion of the six Ulster Counties.

It is stated that Lloyd George in view of the failure of the Irish negotiations, of which he was the chief agent, has offered to resign his office, and if this occurs Premier Asquith will consider himself obliged to resign also.

Meantime the Home Rule Bill will not be introduced until the Government is satisfied that it will meet substantially with the assent of all parties.



Ten Shots to One

French Army in the Argonne.—There is a couple of Stevenson's which haunts me. "There fell a war in a woody place—in a land beyond the sea." I have just come back from spending three wonderful days in that woody place. It lies with the open, bosky country of Verdun on its immediate right and the chalk downs of Champagne upon its left. It is a very undulating country of abrupt hills and dales.

It is this peculiarity which has made the war on this front different to any other, more picturesque and more secret. In front the fighting lines are half in the clay soil, half behind fallen trunks. Between the two the main bulk of the soldiers live like animals of the woodlands, burrowing on the hillsides and among the roots of the trees.

At three different points I have visited the front in this broad region wandering from the lines of one army corps to that of another. In all three I found the same conditions, and in all three I found also the same pleasing fact which I had discovered at Soissons, that the fire of the French was at least five, and very often ten, shots to one of the Germans.

It used not to be so. The Germans used to scrupulously return shot for shot. But whether they have moved their guns to the neighboring Verdun, or whether, as is more likely, all the munitions are going there, it is certain that they were very outclassed upon three days of June which I allude to.

There were signs that for some reason their spirits were at a low ebb. On the evening before our arrival the French had massed all their bands at the front, and in honor of the Russian victory, had played the Marseillaise and the Russian national hymn, winding up with general shoutings and objurgations culled to annoy.

Failing to stir up the Germans, they had ended by a salute from a hundred machine-guns. After trailing their coats up and down the line they had finally to give up the attempt to draw the enemy.

The French officers assured me that the prisoners and deserters made bitter complaints of their scale of rations. And yet it is hard to believe that the fine efforts of our enemy at Verdun are the work of half-starved or dispirited men.

A Brave Act

Single Gunner Hurls Back Entire German Charge

An episode of the battle for Verdun, illustrating the cool bravery of the famous Colonial divisions of France, is related by a French army doctor who witnessed the scene.

On a crest flanking the position of Doucoumont Lieut. S., belonging to an African artillery regiment, was stationed with his battery of "75's." At six o'clock in the morning, during a blizzard, an Austrian 130 shell burst dead on the foremost gun. A captain who was regulating the range was badly wounded. A doctor who hastened towards the wounded officer was killed.

The Germans had got the range of the battery, and for half an hour they rained shells on it, working terrible havoc among the men, horses and guns.

The situation was already desperate when Lieut. S., pushing his best gun into a crater, continued to fire as coolly as at practice. One by one the gunners were soon all killed. The officer now seated himself behind his gun, and acted as server.

At eight o'clock he had only four men left; at nine o'clock only two. Half an hour later he was alone.

The Germans decided to storm the position at the point of the bayonet. Lieut. S. watched them advance in serried ranks across the snow-covered ground until they were but 400 yards from him. Then, as calmly as ever, he started to work his "75" at top speed. His shells tore through the German masses, mowing down whole ranks and ploughing long furrows in the charging masses.

The Germans, unprepared for such a reception, wavered, hesitated, then turned back and regained their lines in disorder, without suspecting that such terrible losses were the work of one man!

Lieut. S.—took advantage of the respite to spike two of his guns, which were out of action, and harnessing the three remaining mules to a couple of caissons, still at most intact, brought them, together with the wounded captain and the body of the doctor, to the main position of his division.

For his exploit the lieutenant has been awarded the Legion of Honor and War Cross.

London, July 23.—British troops have captured a large part of the village of Posieres, says an official British statement. They also gained some ground near a high wood in the direction of Guillemont.

London, July 23.—According to a despatch from Petrograd, progress for the Russians is claimed on a front running from Riga to Hykul, a distance of more than 30 miles, the greatest advance being made along the coast lines.

London, July 23.—An official statement this afternoon says at midnight on July 22 while near the North Hinder light vessel, some of our light forces sighted three enemy destroyers, who retired before damage could be inflicted on them.



They Died For Us We Live For Them

When the great allied offensive started on the first of July, with the First Newfoundland Regiment well in the forefront of the hottest battle, our gallant boys, by their bravery, dash and coolness, made a name for themselves that won words of highest praise from the commander-in-chief of His Majesty's forces, the admiration of the nation, and filled our hearts with just pride.

When the news of their grand achievements reached us here in our sea-girt home, where each and all of those brave fellows are bound to us by ties of blood, relationship or individual friendship, we felt, in a greater degree than ever before, proud of the land that gave us birth.

When the terrible casualty list was announced, that told of the frightful mortality amongst the officers of the regiment, and the great number of wounded in the rank and file, our hearts overflowed with sympathy for those who mourned the loved ones lying in "a soldier's grave," while our prayers ascended to the Throne of Grace in ceaseless intercession for the comfort and relief of the wounded.

And now, after many days of waiting and suspense, when the ever-increasing list of those who have made the supreme sacrifice is coming to us in its unvarnished plainness, how should we act? We should honor our heroic and hallowed dead. They fought the good fight for us. They died that we might live and the downtrodden and oppressed be delivered from the heel of the tyrant. Their sacrifice must not be made in vain.

Many of them have left father, mother, sisters and brothers, and some, perhaps, a wife and little children to mourn for them. When the first agonizing pangs of grief have passed away, the mourners will point with righteous pride to the fame and glory their sons, brothers, husbands or fathers achieved. But now their heads are bowed with woe, and their hearts torn with sorrow, because they will see those they nurtured and loved, even better than life itself, "no more, till the sea gives up its dead."

Our duty is plain before us. Let us, one and all, visit, comfort, sympathize with and pray for those who mourn their loved ones. Sympathy with our fellowmen is a bond of love, and true love is the peace of God, which alone can heal the wounded and broken heart.

For the Cot Fund

The committee in charge of the fund to provide cots for our wounded soldiers, held a meeting in the Public Building on Saturday night last to finalize arrangements for making a house to house collection. On Monday morning some of the collectors started work in their various wards and, we learn, the response has been fairly generous for the season of the year and the conditions existing. The members of the committee are enthusiastic, and the collectors are very solicitous in their endeavors to swell the fund to the largest proportions possible. It, thus, only remains for those who intend to contribute (and we do not anticipate any slackers) to dig down deep into their pockets, as the largest coin, like the largest fish, is generally found nearest the bottom, to raise a sum of which Bay Roberts and vicinity may well be proud. Dig, fellow citizens, dig!

Max Mercer Killed in Action

Bay Roberts is again called upon to mourn the loss of one of her most popular and favorite sons in the person of James Maxwell Mercer, the sad news having been received by his parents on Wednesday evening last that he had been "Killed in Action" on the 1st of July.

Max, by which name he was familiarly known, was the youngest child and son of Mr. Isaac and Mrs. Anastasia Mercer, and but 19 years of age. He enlisted in the Newfoundland Regiment in April, 1915, left St. John's for England, in June, and was sent to the front in February of this year. He was attached to the signal corps.

As in the other cases, no particulars as to how he met death have been received, but we know he died gloriously in the brilliant charge of our regiment on that memorable 1st of July.

He leaves, besides a father and mother, two brothers and three sisters to mourn the loss of a loving son and brother, to whom the heartfelt sympathy of all will go out in large measure, and in which the Guardian is not the least sincere.

I want to draw you to Christ. Oh, that God may help me to carry Christ into your lives.

Mr. Bennett left a very favorable impression upon the members of the various congregations on this circuit.

Death of Mr. E. M. Jackman

Mr. E. M. Jackman, of St. John's, well known in political and business circles, died at the Homeopathic Hospital, Montreal, Thursday, July 20th. Deceased was born in St. John's Feb. 29, 1868, and was thus 47 years of age at the time of his demise. He learned the tailoring trade in Boston, Mass., and in 1899 started business in St. John's and built up a large trade.

In 1900 he went into politics with the Liberal Party, was elected for Piacetta and St. Mary's, and given a seat in the Executive as Minister of Finance. He was re-elected for a second time, and held the same office until 1909 when the Bond Ministry was defeated. He was a member of, and held prominent positions in, various societies of St. John's. He leaves a widow, five sons and one daughter, besides a mother to mourn their loss. One of his sons, Edward, is with the Canadian regiment at the front, and another, George, a member of "Ours," is in hospital at Liverpool, having been wounded in the battle of the first of July. The body was brought home for interment and the funeral took place at St. John's yesterday.

Private William Barrett, son of Wm. John Barrett, of French Cove, is still officially reported missing by both the Canadian and British authorities.

Meantime, his brother, John Barrett, who is also with the Canadian Expeditionary Force, in writing to his brother Joseph, on June 30th states that his brother William was killed in action about the first week in June. Continuing, his brother said: "He was ready to die at any time, and that is a great thing. I never saw a happier man in my life. He did not fear death because he was a soldier for God, King and Country."

Labrador News

The S. S. Meigle arrived at St. John's from Labrador on Friday last having been as far north as Hopedale. From her report we glean the following facts:—

During the two weeks prior to her return the trap fishing on the coast had been poor, with the exception of Iron Bound Islands, and Ragged Islands, at which places good work was being done by "floaters."

Several vessels were at Cape Harrison, and all were doing well. One schooner hauled for 500 qtls., one for 400 qtls., and one for 300 qtls. The hook and line men were doing well all along the coast, and when they fished in deep water were successful in getting boat loads daily.

It was thought that the fish, which, as we have before stated, struck in much earlier than usual this season, had gone into the bays, and that many of the "floaters" had probably followed it, and may have been successful in securing good fares.

We have now to wait for the return of the S. S. Sagona, when it is thought, that more favorable reports will be received. We sincerely trust these hopes will be realized.
