"EXTRANEUS MATTERS."

It is significant that the Nakusp & Slokan railway arrangement is looked on with suspicion by nearly all the papers in Kootenay, which must be taken as good authorities, since they are in the ground.

It begins to look as if the Nakusp & Slokan railway will not be completed to the forks of Carpenter creek this year. The track laying, which was discontinued last November on account of the fall in the Columbia river, will not be resumed before the latter part of May.

We need not dwell at any length on the want of honesty and honor shown by a paper that distorts a contemporary's words in order to get an occasion for fault-finding. Nor need we comment at length on the extract we have quoted from this morning's incubation; for its absurdity and stupidity become at once apparent when compared with the Ottawa correspondence noted above.

ON THE RUSSIAN SIDE. The seizure of Canadian sealing schooners by the Russians has been little talked of lately, probably for the reason that the near side of the ocean has presented subjects of greater interest in the sealing line.

ITS OLD HABIT. On Wednesday the Colonist had an Ottawa dispatch in which this statement appeared: "Although several days have elapsed since the Dominion government asked the Imperial authorities to send a man-of-war to notify the Canadian sealers that the regulations adopted by the Paris tribunal will be enforced May 1, no reply has been received from London."

It is evident that no man-of-war is to be sent north to convey a warning to the sealers that the Paris regulations will be enforced on May 1. There are only a few days left of this month, a period quite inadequate for the warning to be given; so the sealers found in prohibited waters after Monday next will run a very grave chance of seizure.

is admitted that when the vessels were taken they were twenty-one miles from shore, but says the Russian tribunal, they were caught in hot pursuit with some of their unlawful gains on board. This is disputed by the Canadian sealers.

The difference of opinion turns, therefore, upon the point of fact as to whether the sealers will be guilty of poaching, for Russia, it will be observed, sets up no such pretensions of jurisdiction over the seas as the United States politicians have vainly tried to establish.

We cannot see what good can result from representing matters with respect to the mode of dealing with British sealers in the worst possible light. 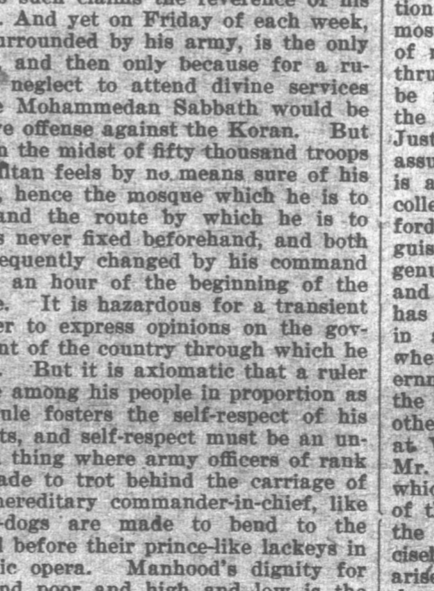

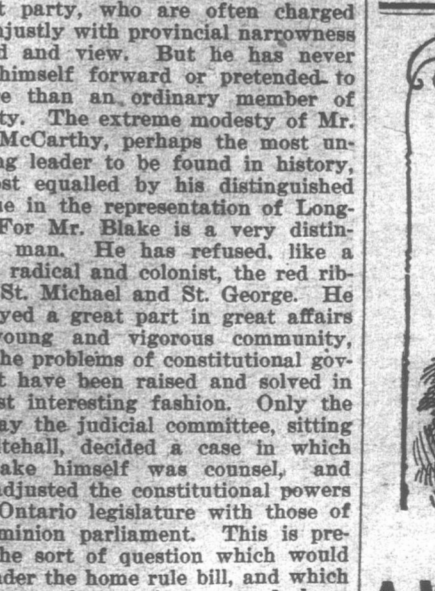

THE LOS ANGELES.

History and Description of the Ill-fated Steamer.

San Francisco, April 27.—The steamer Los Angeles built for the United States revenue service. She was launched in the year 1866 and was christened the Wyanda. SHUTTING OUT FARMERS.

Proposal to Exclude Them From Insolvency Bill. Ottawa, April 27.—A meeting of the insolvency committee to-day there was a big discussion as to shutting out farmers from the operation of the act. This was lost. An important amendment was made to the bill by placing farmers in the position of debtors (that is to say, a creditor can force a farmer into insolvency the same as he could traders).

A Burglar Shot Dead.

Portland, April 26.—About 1 o'clock this morning Policeman Austin discovered a burglar in a harness store at First and Jefferson street. He called upon the man to throw up his hands, but instead of doing so he started to run. The officer then shot him through the head, killing him instantly. Nothing was found on the burglar by which he could be identified.

Fairhaven Coal for the U. S. Fleet.

Fairhaven, April 25.—President Black of the board of trade received a telegram to-day from Senator Spire confirming the report that all the vessels of the Behring Sea fleet have been ordered to take sufficient coal at Bellingham Bay to reach Unalaska, whither a supply of Commodore H. G. coal has been sent for the use of the vessels when on patrol duty.

ROYALISTS RALLY.

Meeting of Provisional Government Opponents ON PALACE SQUARE AT HONOLULU

All the Speakers Coupled Peaceableness and Moderation. Adherence of the Cause Advised Not to Vote. Resolutions Adopted Declining Allegiance to the Present Government. San Francisco, April 27.—Advices have just been received by the barkentine W. H. Diamond from the United Press correspondent at Honolulu, under date of April 11th, to the effect that the announced mass meeting of the royalists took place on the evening of the 10th inst., at Palace square. There might have been one thousand present, possibly one half natives and the rest Chinese and whites.

THE WELSH CHURCH

The Bill to Emancipate Wales from an Intolerable Burden.

London, April 27.—Right Hon. Herbert H. Asquith, home secretary, in the house of commons last evening, introduced the bill for the disestablishment of the church in Wales. For more than a century, he said, the vast majority of Welshmen had regarded the Church of England in Wales as an aggressive and sectarian power. To them it had been a symbol of national discord.

Evicted Irish Tenants.

London, April 27.—The evicted tenants bill, introduced in the house of commons on Thursday last by Sir Charles Harcourt, provides that where a tenant's holding in Ireland has been terminated since May, 1879, the former tenant may, within a year after the beginning of the present act, petition the board of arbitration for re-instatement. The board may make a conditional order of re-instatement, and unless the landlords within the prescribed time show cause against the order, the board of arbitration may make the award absolute.

General News.

Vienna, April 27.—The fourteen thousand strikers in this city will be joined on Monday by forty thousand men from the building trades. These forty thousand men have demanded higher wages, but the employers and contractors have refused to grant their demands. The extreme and moderate socialists have combined to make a great demonstration on May day. The meetings will be attended by the strikers and violence is feared.

DESTITUTE ORIENTALS.

Washington, April 27.—Secretary Carlisle has received the following telegram from Collector Saunders at Port Townsend, Wash: "Nineteen pauper Japanese, brought over by steamer Mogul, were landed in Victoria. They were kept out of the United States at Port Townsend. At Blaine they were examined by Immigration Inspector and sent across the line into British Columbia. Soon afterwards they returned and are now held in Seattle. The matter was brought to the attention of the United States by simply returning them to British Columbia. Should they be sent back to Japan at the government's expense?"

CANADIAN NEWS.

The News of Eastern Canada in Short. Donald McClellan, one of the oldest residents of Plympton, died recently at his home on the 12th inst., aged 65 years. He was a native of Applin, Argylshire, Scotland, and came to Canada with his parents in 1849.

Cash for the Rebels.

Montevideo, via Galveston, April 26.—The ex-minister of foreign affairs of Uruguay declares that the River Plate Committee for the Brazilian revolution received \$200,000 from Europeans and Brazilians for the revolutionary cause. Six hundred and forty-seven Brazilian refugees landed here to-day. They declared that their downfall was caused by Admiral Mello. Several, however, say the blame rests upon General Salgado. The Brazilian minister, in an official communication to the Uruguayan government, guarantees life and liberty to all rebel soldiers who wish to return to Brazil. This guaranty has been accepted by 230 men, who will be carried to Brazil at the expense of the government. Those who remain are provided with lodgings by the Uruguayan Charity Society, and 400 more are expected to join them to-morrow. The condition of the refugees is pitiful.

CANADIAN PACIFIC "CHIEF."

Knowing the Canadian Pacific authorities as they do, the people of Victoria will be in no great measure surprised by a practical declaration that they regard the slightest impediment to their traffic as a much greater evil than the introduction of infectious diseases into this country.

Such a declaration in effect is conveyed in the following dispatch from Vancouver which appears in the Colonist this morning:

Dissatisfaction having been expressed to the treatment accorded Chinese and Japanese passengers disembarking at Victoria, it is understood that steps are being taken to prevent repetition of these alleged indignities on the arrival of the Empress due to-morrow. If necessary the assistance of the courts will be invoked, for it is claimed that the city of Victoria has in this matter gone farther than the law will sanction.

For several months past, after the Oriental passengers have been duly inspected by the Dominion quarantine officer and allowed to land, they have been taken charge of by the health officer of the city of Victoria and subjected to a process of thorough fumigation at the Ross Bay suspect station.

NEW ZEALAND TAXATION

New Zealand's exemption from the depression that has caused so much trouble in other countries has of late been the subject of much comment. It is commonly attributed to the system of taxation adopted by the colony some time ago, which system does not differ materially in principle from the single tax scheme.

Attention has been called anew to the New Zealand plan by a report sent to Washington by United States Consul Connolly at Auckland, who gives an elaborate description of the system and its workings.

The present direct taxes of New Zealand consist of a land tax and an income tax. Of these, the land tax brought in one million and a half dollars last year and the income tax three hundred and thirty-four thousand dollars.

The results of the new system of taxation have been so favorable that at the late general election, held November 29, 1893, the voters, to quote Mr. Connolly, "in the most pronounced manner demonstrated their appreciation of what has been done for them by electing those to whom they owe so much with the largest majority ever given in New Zealand."
