TORIES IN A TANGLE

Ottawa, March 11.—It is said here now that the minister of justice and some other minister of the crown will visit Winnipeg shortly to confer with the provincial authorities in regard to the school case.

The whole affair is viewed here as a gigantic farce to get the Conservatives to vote for the second reading of the bill.

A REASONABLE DEMAND.

The opposition last season in the building of the Red Mountain railway from Trail to a point in Washington was put on the high ground of patriotism. It was said that a line having one end in a foreign country would divert the trade of the new mining camp into the hands of Americans.

Strange though it may seem, the patriots who sought to defeat that scheme by such a cry are among those who oppose the request of the Canadian farmers of Okanagan valley for speedy connection with the large consuming population of the Kootenay mining centres.

The Times believes in railway construction wherever there is need of a railway, and would give a charter—the interests of the country being properly safeguarded—to any company not asking for aid to construct a road where none at present exists.

The Canadian Republican Committee is the high-sounding name of an organization—more probably of one or two cranks—in the city of Toronto, which has issued a manifesto to the people of Canada in favor of Canadian independence.

The names of the committee are not published, but the man who wrote the "manifesto" is likely to be a recent importation from a foreign and alien country.

Our correspondent "A Victorian," refers to the British Pacific Railway as Mr. Armstrong's scheme, while the Journal editorially mentions only Mr. Bodwell as the party who submitted the proposition to the government.

THE COERCION BILL

Sir Richard Cartwright Delivers a Characteristically Able Speech in the Commons.

Col. O'Brien Says the Ministers Were a Babyish Blundering Lot.

Ottawa, March 12.—Sir Richard Cartwright treated the house yesterday to another characteristic and able oratorical effort, discussing the remedial bill. He took up several points to show the extreme inexpediency of passing the bill at the present time and under the existing conditions.

It was against equity and contrary to the constitution. Parliament represented but half of the existing electorate, and therefore had no right to make any such law as the one proposed for Manitoba. There were men in the house who never intended to face their constituents' again, and who intended to vote for the bill because they had promised to office—men who were practically the paid servants of the government and would therefore be violating their oaths of office.

Col. O'Brien, independent Conservative, denounced both the bill and the administration. He said the ministers were a babyish, blundering lot. Davin called the attention of the government to the dispatch regarding the proposal to make the British cattle embargo perpetual and asked if steps were being taken to protest.
