ENGLAND AND FRANCE LOSE MILITARY POWER

French Editor Points Out What He Terms the Great Folly of Disarmament.

PARIS, Aug. 10—A powerful article on "The Dupery of Disarmament," by M. de Lanessan, appears in the Siecle. M. de Lanessan points out that the false beliefs and insincere arguments which prevail on this subject are made use of chiefly in Great Britain and France, the two most highly sivilized and well-to-do countries in the world, and that the result is the gradual but steady decay of their national virility and military power.

He says that France is disarming at such a rate that in a short time people will be asking whether she has an army, for during six months of every year her whole force will be represented by 200,000 moderately trained men scattered over the length and breadth of her territory. The decadence in the payy is more pronunced.

M. de Lanessan declares that the effect of the propagation of pacificist ideas has been the same in England. There are signs that the standard of naval strength to which the British admiralty is pledged—that of equality, if not superiority to any two powers—is no longer kept up.




The Western Farmers are Not Worrying.

Will be Larger than Last Year

OTTAWA, Aug. 9.—The chief ware-house commissioner of Canada, C. C. Castle sends to the Department of Trade and Commerce, from Winnipeg, a report on the crop in the three prairie provinces. Mr. Castle discredits unfavorable reports and says that present prospects our farmers will realize two dollars more per acre than last year. In his report he says:"I am pleased to be able to advise that from all parts Manitoba, Alberta and Saskatchewan, reports as to crop conditions are most favorable, in fact during the last four or five weeks the conditions have been almost ideal. Crops which looked poor before that time have recovered wonderfully, and should the present favorable weather continues, it looks as if harvesting in the three provinces will be general toward the end of the month.
