It will be seen from the following statistics that the whole number of Church Members is less by fifty-six than that of the previous year, while the additions by baptism and restoration, are in a very fair ratio to these of preceding years.

This may be accounted for, from the fact that many of the Churches having undertaken, and apparently perfected, a thorough revision of their lists; and presenting us with their real strength. It is to be hoped that these examples

will be imitated.

Circular Letter.

To the Delegates of the Central Nova Scotia Baptist Association assembled at Chester. DEAR BRETHREN. The Set bond on soring bath

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In our excellent circular of last year we were reminded of some things needed, of some things to be feared, and of some things to be expected, But there is one great blessing which includes all others, which realizes every hope, and banishes every fear. Let us therefore contemplate our need of the Holy Spirit, to aid us especially in premoting

In all things we are dependant upon the Divine power. We are indebted to it for the beginning and the cnd of our salvation, for comfort in sorrow, for the knowledge of the truth, and for guidance in the path of duty. But our happiness is connected with obedience. Privilege is inseparable from duty. There is no reward without labor, no prize without the race, no victory without warfare, no crown without the cross. And as we depend upon the durit for the blessings, so also for aid in the duties of religion.

But the field of duty is very large. It is our duty to live above the world, to keep heaven and eternal glory continually in view. But how can we do this without the We ought also to grow in holiness. To this end we require sanctifiying green. We are called upon to wage warfare against the powers of darkness. We need then divine strength to wield the sword of the Spirit.

We cannot now dwell upon all the considerations: but must on the present occasion direct our thoughts to a single

point wour need of the Holy Spirit in the great work of saving men. Since all men are under the same condemnation, and since there is but one Saviour for all, and since we are the appointed instruments for extending the gospel, we cannot be guiltless in the neglect of this duty. We are held responsible for the salvation of the world, while our power of securing it is in God. We have the means in our hands, and are commanded to lay held of Ommipotence to give those means efficiency. Without the Spirit we cannot even feel our obligations. We could neither see the greatness of the work on the one hand: nor the greatness of the encouragement on the other. We should not be prepared to commence the work, much less to succeed in it. But with the holy anointing we should be able to know and to do all things.

In the first place we need the Spirit to teach us our duty to perishing sinners. The moral degradation of man is the last thing we should know, without divide teaching. We might be skilled in all human wisdom, and yet remain ignorant of the awful deprayity and doom of the ungodly. But being taught of God we should clearly see the danger

of the unregenerate.

In the second place we require the influence of the Spirit to stimulate us in the work of saving sinners. It would only increase our guilt, to know without being willing to fulfil, our obligations. But having the love of God shed abroad in our hearts by the Holy Ghost, we should be constrained to seek the salvation of men. This would be the strongest desire of our heart, and the chief object of our life. If we have ourselves experienced the power of sovereign grace, our highest wish will be, that others may experience the same.

In the third place the Holy Spirit alone can teach us how to perform our duty. The warmest zeal may be misapplied for want of heavenly wisdom, and the good cause thereby hindered. The disciples were taught how, as thell as what they were to speak. Take no thought how or what ye shall speak. For it is not ye that speak, but the Holy Ghost or the Spirit of your Father that speaked in you. (Matt. x, 19. Mark xiii, 11. Matt. x, 20.) In the fourth place we need the Divine indwelling to enable us to accomplish the greatest results. Those who have done the most for God were men of strong faith. They may have had a small natural ability; yet they possessed a large measure of the Holy Chost. the power of Christ rested upon them. Hence they were Though weak : yet fitted to surmount every difficulty. Fully confident of sucsess: they were yet submissive to the divine will. While using every means, they relied entirely upon the divine power. Hence they could baffle the powers of hell on earth and in the human heart. Such were those "who through faith subdued kingdoms, wrought righteousness, obtained promises, stopped the mouths of lions, quenched the violence of fire, escaped the edge of the sword, out of weakness were made strong," (Heb. 11, 33-34.) How great would be the results if we all possessed these gifts of the Holy Ghost. What noble plans, and costly sacrifices would we make to accomplish those "greater works" of which our Saviour spoke, and which we now see going on in the wide diffusion of the gospel. How like the angels should we have occasion to rejoice over the conversion of sinners.

We might dwell upon our need of grace to enable us to commend the religion of Christ by a holy example. This is all-important. But our present state as a denomination justifies us perhaps in now limiting our thoughts to the actual dissemination of the word of life. If our hearts had been touched with the finger of divine love we could not close our ears to the Macedonian cry of perishing men. We should at least show as much enterprise in saving men, as, in worldly business. Each individual would be a missionary. Every talent would be consecrated. Every light would be brought from its dark concealment. Each church would be a missionary society. It would have something

That they met at Wolfville soon after the meeting of the Association, and made such appropriations as the state of their funds would admit. The missions appointed were with one exception fully performed, and from the report of the Missionaries themselves, as well as from other sources, we learn with much satisfaction, that the word was gladly received, and good has been done by the presching of Christ. Demands have been made for continued labour. The Maccedonian cry is often heard. Our funds hewever constrain as to remain silent and comparatively inactive amid pressing calls, and wide and destitute fields.

As a Board we are assured that the contributions of our Home Mission, from the churches of this association, are by far too small. And that some system should be induced by which this mest important work may be more effectively accomplished. And we trust that this association in its wickens, will present to the churches and urge upon them a plan, becoming men redeemed by the blood of Christ. We are more and more convinced that healthful filme Missionary operations will impart a new and much desired impulse to all our interests. In watering others we cared our shall be watered. The Board have also to report that they have devoted £83 8s. 8d. of the mentes paid in last year, to the Gaelic Missionary for one third part of his service. During the

5th That this important object be hereby earnestly recommended to the benevolence and zeal of our denomination in every part of this province.

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CONSTITUTION OF THE CENTRAL BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

ART. 1.—This Association shall be composed of Ministers and other Delegates, who shall be members of the churches which they represent, together with Delegates from corresponding Associations and such other brethren present as the Association shall see fit to invite to sit in council.

ART. 2.—The Association shall meet at such time and place as may be agreed upon by the body.

ART. 3.—Each Church shall have the privilege of sending one Delegate or more, but no church shall be entitled to send more than five in addition to their Pastor.

ART. 4.—At each meeting of the Association, the Moderator of the preceding year shall call for a vote for a Moderator, which vote shall be given by ballot; no brother shall be chosen. Moderator two years in succession. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to preside in all the transactions, nominate Committees, unless ordered by the Association, and maintain due order. A Secretary shall be chosen, whose duty it shall be to record the transactions of the Association, and furnish a correct copy of the same for the Press.

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ART. 5th.—It shall be the duty of each Church to send by its Messengers a letter to the Association, giving an account of its state, particularly of its additions and diminutions within the last year, and generally of whatever relates to its peace and prosperity.

ART. 6th.—When any Church shall desire admittance into this Body, application must be made by letter, and satisfactory evidence furnished of its faith and order; this being done and a vote of acceptance taken, the Moderator shall in behalf of the Association give to one of its Messengers present the right hand of fellowship.

ART. 7th.—When any Church shall neglect to make communica-tions for three years successively, it shall be considered as having withdrawn from us, and shall be dropped from the Minutes, unless two or more members shall request its continuance and shall engage to inquire into its standing, and report at the next meeting of the

ART. 8th.—Although as an Association all power over the Churches is disclaimed, so far as respects any interference with their independence and discipline; yet it is deemed a privilege belonging to the Association for itself to judge of the propriety of receiving or

ART. 9th—The religious sentiments of this body are those expressed in the "Articles of the faith and practice of the Baptist Churches in Nova Scotia."

ART. 10th.—Alterations or Amendments may be made to this Constitution by a vote of two-thirds of the members present at any of its regular meetings.

RULES OF ORDER.

RULE 1 .- At every sitting, business shall be opened and closed with prayer.

RULE 2.—No member of the Association shall leave the session before the business is concluded, without permission of the Associa-

Rule 3.—No subject shall be discussed without a motion first made and seconded.

RULE 4 .- No person shall speak oftener than twice on the same subject, unless by permission of the body.

RULE 5 .- All Resolutions shall be presented in writing.

RULE 6. - Motions made and lost shall not be recorded on the Minutes, except so ordered at the time.

Rule 7.—These rules shall be distinctly read from the chair at the opening of the session.

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
