Thirteen months is a long time to spend in the preparation and publication of such a report, and the facts contained in it are ancient history. This is shown by the fact that there were fifty-five references resulting in the appointment of for ty-line boards. In the other six cases the disputes were settled before the boards were appointed, but the department claims that the settlements were "in any were settled before the boards were appointed, but the department claims that the settlements were "in any "case as a direct result, it may be confidently stated, of "the influence of the act." Only two strikes occurred in the fifty-nine cases. It is true that the recommenda-tions of the boards were in some cases disregarded, and of course there would have been no strike in nine cases out of ten had there been no reference. Before there was a department of labor there were scores of dis-agreements between labor and capital, which were not followed by strikes. These are still about the same proportion. But all the strikes that do not happen are now credited by the Labor Department to itself. Had the adoption of these two acts been followed by a great diminution in the loss of time through labor disputes, we should have had this fact quoted as indis-putable proof of the beneficent effect of these laws, and of the clever work of the department.
