A NOVELTY IN LIQUOR RAIDS.

According to the Bangor News, Governor Eberbart of Minnesota is at present in Washington, in relation to one of the most remarkable prohibition campaigns ever undertaken anywhere. It appears that last August there suddently descended upon the towns of Northern Minnesota a band of special government agents with instructions and warrants from the Interior Department, and they proceeded to order licensed saloons to close up. The saloons were all operating under regular State licenses. Their protests were in vain and the saloons which refused to close speedily found the contents of the various liquor receptacles emptied into the gutters.

The raiding in this now celebrated "firewater campaigm" was done by Chief Agent "Pussyfeot" Johnson, ably assisted by many others, including in particular, Mr. C. C. Brannon, who in that country is known as "Winchester" Brannon, the "fighting parson," on account of his expertness with the rifle and his known and proved readiness to use the same. The warrant for this raid, which now almost has Northern Minnesota in the throes of revolt, is to be found in the old Indian treaties, which have been long forgotten.

The treaties were made during the period from 1850 to 1860 between the Government and the Indian tribes, under the terms of which about nine-tenths of what is now the State of Minnesota was ceded to the Federal Government. In these treaties there were clauses which made the granted land prohibition territory. 
