## Agricultural.

Manure, the key to successful farming over the larger part of the country, demands attention. Perhaps in no one item of farm practice has there been a greater change than in that of the management of manure.

Formerly it was thought that manure should only be brought to the field just as it is to be used. Now it is taken out when carting or sledding is good, and the hands and teams are not pressed with other work. By hauling it in winter, and placing it in heaps near to where it will be needed in spring, it gets the benefit of an extra turning, and, if desirable, these heaps may be again turned before they are spread. Of course some forethought must be taken to put the manure in the most convenient place for the after labour of distributing it.

Whatever else is done with manure, let it be kept in compact heaps; to scatter over the whole barn-yard which should only cover an area of a few square yards is sheer waste. After the winter rains have washed out the soluble matter from the scattered manure (often it runs to the nearest creek), what remains is of little value. It would be far better, were the manure upon the field where its washings would be utilized. The quality of the manure depends upon the quality of the food. The animal adds nothing to what is fed on it; it takes out something, but leaves the refuse, which it does not want, but the soil does, in an available form. The old adage "out of nothing comes" is commended to those who think they can make a large quantity of rich manure out of a little poor food.

## Deferred Matter.

## Archbishop Crooke and his Speeches.

London, May 20.—The *News* says the passage in Archbishop Crooke's speech at Ballinagarry, on Saturday in which he said he had done some things for the people and is ready to do more, has attracted attention at Rome and all bishops have been commended on the subject.

The speech which, it is alleged, has attracted attention at Rome, is thus referred to in a London despatch of the 10th: "Archbishop Crooke of Cashel is making an Episcopal visitation in his diocese, and is everywhere receiving tributes of popular enthusiasm. At Ballinagarry he received an address from the Land League, and in reply expressed warmest sympathy for the people and respect for the political associations of the place, for the party which made its stand there in 1848. At Mullinahone the streets were decorated with triumphal arches and evergreens, the houses were illuminated and bands played national airs. Replying to an address, the Archbishop referred to Mullinahone as the birthplace of many true Irishmen, which allusion was received by the people with cheers for 'Kickham.' The Archbishop urged the people, while standing firmly by their rights, not to violate the laws and not to molest the police or soldiers, who were only doing their duty. Nothing, he said, could resist united people, and, thank God, they were united. The bishops, priests and people were all of one mind. He was proud of Tipperary, but especially proud of Tipperary's imprisoned member of Parliament, John Dillon. The moment the government expelled a man in prison, even if he knew nothing of him before, he concluded there was something sound in him and that the government believe there was something dangerous in him. By means of the present agitation, he said, Ireland would become a prosperous and contented country."

Dublin, May 21.—The priest, Father Sheehy, arrested at Kilmallock, under the coercion act, has been a prominent member of the Land League since its foundation, and was one of its original organizers, having attended its first meeting in this city.

Father Sheehy and his fellow prisoners, arrested yesterday, were conveyed to Naas Jail under a strong escort.

New York, May 21.—A London despatch says that the debate in the House of Commons on Father Sheehy's arrest, continued till midnight, and revealed a remarkable agreement among various sections of the Irish Liberal members in condemning the action of the government, in refusing to give the cause which led to the arrest on reasonable suspicion. The moderate members predicted worse results would follow from an arrest which might be regarded as an insult to the religious sentiment of the Irish nation in classing the priest as a village ruffian. The Government's offer to hold a morning sitting on Tuesday to discuss the arrest, is considered as illusive and worthless, because the Ministers would not pledge themselves to give full information of the specific act on which the warrant for the arrest was based.

Dublin, May 21.—Great excitement prevails at New Pallas. A flying column, with two guns left Limerick to assist the sheriff in making seizures

for rent in the district. This is the first active service undertaken by one of the five flying columns at present organized in Ireland.

## Affairs in Ireland.

LIMERICK PEOPLE OPPOSED TO EVICTION.

Limerick, May 20.—A large force of military and police proceeded under command of Major Vandellin, of the 9th Regiment, and Major Rolleston, of the Royal Marines, yesterday, to New Pallas, County Limerick, to aid the Sheriff in evictions upon an estate.

On the march a large body of people followed them yelling, shouting and pelting them with stones. Amid a shower of missiles the Sheriff succeeded, after much difficulty, in evicting a few families. He then proceeded to disperse the mob, and a few men and people had left their homes and taken possession of a large castle upon the estate which they had looped and rendered so impregnable that executing writs was abandoned for the day.

Stones showered upon the police and military. So threatening was the aspect that Major Rolleston ordered the police to load their rifles and the military to fix bayonets, and warned the people if they persisted in their conduct he would read the Riot Act, and if they did not disperse within a short time he should feel it his duty to order the constabulary to charge the soldiers to charge. The warning had the desired effect and the people dispersed, but not before Lieut. Gowan shot a bullet through a window from a cudge. Four persons were arrested, including Gowan's assailant. To-day a flying column with four pieces of artillery will proceed with the Sheriff to execute the writs upon people in the castle.

TREASURE TROVE.—An interesting discovery of ancient coins has been recently made in Ireland. Two men digging a drain near Lisycasey, between Kilrush and Ennis, came upon an iron clasped chest of large dimensions, lying on which was a large sword. The men assumed it to be a coffin, and conveyed the intelligence of the discovery to the police of Lisycasey. The box was opened by the police, and they found it full of gold coins of an ancient date. The men claimed it as treasure trove, but the police sent to Ennis for a horse and ear, and to that station the box was conveyed and sealed. On the sword was engraved the name "O'Neill."

Locusts continue their ravages throughout the island of New Caledonia, aided by the long and severe drought. Over 6,000 kine (over six and one-half tons) of young locusts have been bagged, delivered to and paid for at a rate of one franc a kilo by the government. It is estimated that this 51,000,000 have been destroyed.

The strange spectacle of a church floating down a river was seen during the prevalence of the recent floods in Dakota. It was constructed of strong timbers securely fastened, and as it floated down the Missouri the bell in its steeple could be heard above the roar of the flood and crashing of the ice.

The dowry of Whitelaw Reid's bride, as given in the published accounts of the wedding, is greater than that of the Princess Stephanie, who married the Crown Prince of Austria, the latter being \$450,000, while Mr. O. D. M.'s made his daughter a wedding gift of a check for \$500,000.

On the 30th ult., 10,000 Indians made a raid on the city of Matagalpa, Nicaragua, but were repulsed, and subsequently surrendered. A large number of young men of Matagalpa were killed and many wounded. Many Indians were also killed.

A Minnesota Paper says that a young man in Wright county, that State, had a dream drawn from a snake, and upon the cavity being filled to prevent the flow of blood, he commenced bleeding at the nose and mouth and continued to do so until he bled to death.

The Indian tea crop of the season now beginning is estimated at from \$1,000,000 lb. to \$3,000,000 lb. The indigo prospects have been improved by the partial rain, but more is wanted in all districts.

Governor Overton, of Chikassaw, has gathered together an army of 800, and issued an order that Texas cattle raisers and white men generally must leave the country before June 1st, or force will be used.

The transience of the Princess Stephanie is worth \$400,000, but the received by the crown for the future Empress of Austria does not exceed \$50,000.

The English Palestine exploration party have discovered the site of Kadesh, the sacred city of the Hittites, on the left bank of the Orontes.

Locusts have destroyed the crops in the State of Bolivia, and great destitution and misery prevails.
