As predicted Mr. W. S. Montgomery was not only defeated, but lost his deposit, in the election of Tuesday. The day was fair and an average vote was polled. Montgomery received a majority in only two polls, Flatlands 12 and Eldon 4. In his home town, Dalhousie he was beaten by 181 votes.

BROUGHT HERE ON FORGERY CHARGE

Philip Revard Arrested At Quebec And Now Awaits Trial Here.

On the morning of Monday, the 21st of last month, the Revard family of Upper Restigouche, were surprised when Philip Revard, charged with uttering a forged check, appeared before Judge Matheson for the preliminary hearing of his case.

The evidence submitted at the morning session tells the following story.

On August 19th last, a young man whose general sales suggested him to be an alert young traveling salesman little over the quarter century mark in age, registered at the Florence Hotel here under the name of Antoine La Fortun. During his short visit in town Mr. La Fortun lost no time in furnishing proof that he was not only alert but "pretty smooth" as well. He was kind enough to leave the proof behind but took "the other" with him.

MACKENZIE KING SPEAKS OF VICTORY

People Showed themselves Sick of Coalitions—Gouin Speaks.

Ottawa, Ont. Dec. 7.—"The people, by their defeat of the Meighen administration, have shown that they agree with the attitude which the Liberals have been taking in the house and in the country during the last couple of years," declared Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, leader of the Liberal party, on receipt of approximately complete returns from the election at an early hour this morning.

"The people of Canada," Mr. King declared, "have shown by their overwhelming defeat of the Meighen administration that they realized the truth of the charges of autocracy and usurpation which I have been making against the Meighen government since Right Hon. Mr. Meighen took control of the affairs of the country."

"When the total Liberals and Progressives elected are considered, it must be admitted that the Meighen administration has been ignominiously defeated.

"The people have also shown that they are heartily sick of coalitions, and it is a matter of great satisfaction to me to find that the Liberal party is returned with a clear majority over both other groups in the House of Commons. It can carry on without any thought of coalition or log rolling with either group.

"The fact that three provinces, Quebec, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island, have voted solidly for Liberals is in itself evidence that the Liberal policy has appealed not only to one class or group or race, but to all classes."

During the late night and early morning hours a flood of congratulatory telegrams poured into the office of the new premier-elect from all parts of the dominion. There were also a great many callers from among Ottawa Liberals, who desired to pay their respects and extend congratulation.

Sir Lomer Gouin.

Montreal, Dec. 7.—Sir Lomer Gouin, speaking last night after the announcement of his victory in Laurier-Ontremont division, this city said: "I have fought the best fight I could, and I am deeply grateful to you electors and to the many who helped me in the campaign. I am more especially honored to be elected with such a majority in this, one of the largest divisions in Canada."

FORGETS NAMES OF HUSBANDS

Woman Has Fifteen Names But Remembers Name Only Eleven.

Chicago, Dec. 7.—Helen Ferguson Drexler of Waukegan, Ill., daughter of a Brooklyn family, who admits that she is a "nut on soldiers and sailors, but doesn't like marines," is in the county jail trying to recall the names of eleven of her fifteen husbands.

The government alleges that Mrs. Drexler, who has one child, has collected as high as \$400 a month in soldiers' allotment checks from the government for three years. The baby was listed as the child of each successive husband and drew an allotment, too.

In 1917, she says, she married Wilfred Taylor a soldier, and they had a son, now three years old. Next she married Paul Moler, a soldier; then Thomas Meehan, a sailor at Great Lakes and next Albert Drexler, a soldier at Camp Grant.

Although she has retained Drexler's name, there have been at least eleven husbands since, she figures. She never obtained a divorce from any of them, she says.

IRISH AGREEMENT NOW REACHED
Good News in Reference to Irish Question—Will Trust Country.
London, Dec. 2.—British and Ireland have reached a preliminary agreement on the Irish question, a development which has been hailed as a sensational and wholly unexpected agreement reached between the British and Irish conference in today's small hours. The negotiations for settlement were considered yesterday to have definitely collapsed, and the compromise achieved in Lloyd George's sombre little home in Downing Street, after a night long struggle, seems likely to be chronicled as the most momentous event in the history of Anglo-Irish relations.

While the agreement must still be submitted to the Dail Eireann and the British parliament for ratification, there was a disposition in all quarters in London, this morning, to regard the outlook as of the brightest. Although the terms of the agreement had not officially been made known up to this afternoon, some of the principal points are unofficially understood to be:
Recognition of Ireland as an independent state with a formula on the question of allegiance satisfactory to both sides.
Inclusion of Ulster within the scope of the new Irish government, with the option of withdrawing within one month, reverting in that case to the present status within territory fixed by a boundary commission.
Freedom for Ireland regarding customs tariffs.
Satisfactory arrangements regarding control of Irish ports by the navy.
Withdrawal of military forces from Ireland under safeguards insuring peaceful conditions.
The agreement binds both sides to recommend it to their parliaments. It is formal, detailed and conclusive document, and its terms prevent the necessity for further negotiations. Should the Dail Eireann agree to the document—and a disagreement is not looked for, as it meets satisfactorily the points raised by the Sinn Fein—it will be embodied in a bill and submitted to the British parliament, which is expected to be called in special session to consider it.
Meanwhile a provisional government will be formed in South Ireland. The agreement does not require Ulster's assent to make it effective. Ulster is given the option of contracting out within one month after the passage of the act, but if she exercises that option she must submit to a boundary commission and receive no more powers, financial or otherwise, than she has at present. (While the agreement has been sent to Sir James Craig, the Ulster premier, an unfavorable decision from him will not prevent the scheme for maturing.)
On the question of allegiance a form of words was found which satisfied both the government and the Sinn Fein. The recognition of Ireland as an independent state is said to be clear. The principal act laid adopted by the government is said to have been that of trusting to the Sinn Fein giving her full power of decision without hampering her by conditions.
It is also understood that an arrangement satisfactory to the Sinn Fein was reached regarding control of Irish ports by the navy.
The agreement was signed on behalf of the government by Lloyd George, Austen Chamberlain, Lord Birkenhead and Winston Spencer Churchill, and on behalf of the Sinn Fein by Arthur Griffith, Michael Collins and Robert C. Barton.
The condition previously insisted upon that there must be free trade between Great Britain and Ireland is said to have been dropped by the government, and Ireland is given the option of trading with Great Britain on a basis of free trade.

London, Dec. 2.—The British cabinet at its meeting today unanimously approved the draft agreement with the Sinn Fein and congratulated Mr. Lloyd George and the members of the delegation in the Irish conference on the success of the negotiations.

The following letter is from this week's issue of the Tribune.
Dec. 5th, 1921.
To the Editor of the Tribune, Town.
Dear Sir:
As you have given space to Mr. Belle-lale and an anonymous writer about some uncomplimentary things say to me, I ask your kind indulgence that you will not print the article, as I am sure you will have both sides of the case.
First of all, naturally your readers will be interested to know what started the storm, and for this purpose I will ask you to reprint the article from the Graphic of Nov. 24th, which was as follows:
"CAMPBELLTON'S ONLY HOPE.

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The voice of the Canadian people has been heard, and heard in an uncertain way. The Liberal party have received the vote of confidence and cast now, with no misgivings, proceed to assume the reins of government. The defeat of the government is none the less welcome that the electorates has so long and eagerly awaited the opportunity.

In the east the Liberal one is a sweeping one. Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island and Quebec have certainly made a record. New Brunswick has done at least what was expected of her although it was hoped Royal would elect McAllister, St. John-Albert disappoints no one. In fact the rest of the province has come to look upon St. John as always voting the wrong way on a popular change. Its representatives will have an opportunity of sitting in the cool shades of opposition, while Halifax has her representatives upon the right side of the house. This is unfortunate for St. John which expects and needs much from a change.

According to Conservative spellbinders "our smokstacks will be smokeless and our voters jobless." But just watch and see if we mistake not Canada is on the eve of better times. At least we hope so.

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About three weeks ago a male resident of this county lost his power of reason. Insanity was induced by excessive "worry of hard times" and the alarming possibilities of a dull winter. The original impetus for this man's anxiety is probably due some grief, for it manifests admirable love and faithfulness on his part; but on the other hand there is no necessity for such somber brooding over the present condition of affairs. True, unmitigated optimism cannot be prescribed as a tonic which will restore the former health of his industries, but we must nourish our strained nerves and faltering wills with the pure food of hopefulness if we are to "carry on."

If we cast a retrospective eye over the events of the past seven years we will readily realize what a perfect right we have to be hopeful. After surviving four years of epochal horror with all their attendant poignant memories, it is only logical to believe that we can with-stand the reactionary tide which is a natural overflow from that terrific conflict.

If we look about us we can already feel in the more important events of the day, the quickening pulse-beat of principles and ideals which are even now casting upon the sky of the future an effulgence which bids us, keep our heads and take fresh courage. A new government of which we can expect much has been placed in command of our home affairs; the church is still unshaken laboring with the faithful diligence for which she is renowned; and the great conference at Washington not only gives promise of the abolition of war, but is opening to world statesmen a new and broader vista of universal affairs, and heralding the birth of a "previously unrealized fraternity between the nations of the world. The future looks anything but dark. This is not a time for men to faint.

Coblentz, Nov. 26.—Reduction in the United States expeditionary force along the Rhine began yesterday, when eleven officers and six hundred enlisted men left here for Antwerp to sail today for home.

Long-Continued Fires.
Near Fort Norman, not far south of the Arctic circle, fires have been burning continuously for more than one hundred and thirty years. It did not light them, nor does it seem to have any effect on the immense seams of lignite that, like some coal seams, have lighted spontaneously. Alexander Mackenzie, the explorer, first reported them in 1789, and at the same time he noticed that the heat from an underground fire had burned to a brick-red the shales that outcrop along the banks of the river that he named after himself. In fact the shale beds had been converted into massive red bricks. It is likely, then, that the fires had been burning many years before Mackenzie saw them. Virtually all of the explorers who have visited that part of the Mackenzie river basin have made themselves known by huge periodic bursts of smoke. It is reasonable to suppose, therefore, that the fires have been burning continuously since Mackenzie first saw them.

Yellow Jack.
A new chapter in the history of the world's most dreaded disease is now being written. It is the penultimate chapter of a romance, every page of which thrills with courage and self-sacrifice and mystery. For 'Yellow Jack' has been one of the greatest scourges of the world since the days of Christopher Columbus on the island of Hispaniola in 1492. A great American bacteriologist, has prepared a serum, and has, says the London Times, tested it on guinea-pigs. The surprising result has been obtained that, if the vaccine is injected three small doses within 48 hours of the onset of the disease, it is completely prevented. Employed at a later stage, however, when the disease has been raging for several days, the serum has failed.
