It is believed that the Bahaced crater in the Windward district of the island has also erupted.

CAPPED BY DARK CLOUDS. La Soufriere, though less violent, still wears a cap of dark clouds, which is illuminated every now and then by flashes of red light.

RUSSIAN QUARREL WITH KOREA. The Cologne Gazette publishes a telegram from St. Petersburg stating that difficulties have arisen between Russia and Korea.

LAVA DUST FLIES 1,200 MILES. The Daily Mail's dispatch from Kingston, Jamaica, says lava dust is falling in fairly large quantities on the highest points of the island, and less on the plains.

DECORATIONS FOR ALFONSO. Madrid, May 16.-King Alfonso was invested with a number of foreign decorations this morning.

MUTINY AND BREAD RIOTS. Constantinople, May 16.-The Turkish garrison at Monastir, Macedonia, has mutinied, and the soldiers have started serious rioting.

ASH-COVERED AREA IS WIDE. Man Killed by a Stone That Fell Nine Miles From Crater-Soufriere at Present in Repose.

Kingston, Island of St. Vincent, Thursday, May 15.-Afternoon.-A correspondent of the Associated Press has just returned here from a visit on horseback to the devastated district of this island, during which he traveled 50 miles and penetrated to within five miles of the Soufriere crater.

SEVENTEEN HUNDRED DEAD. The most conservative estimate of the death rate here now places the number at 1,700. About 1,300 bodies have been already interred.

STONE TRAVELED NINE MILES. The injured persons were horribly burned by the hot grit, which was driven along with tremendous velocity.

GREAT DISTRESS. From Chateau Belaire comes word that the distress was great. Word was sent to a clergyman and one was taken up by the wear.

ANOTHER ERUPTION PREDICTED. Kingston, Island of St. Vincent, W. I., May 15.-Scientists who have come here from Trinidad predict another volcanic eruption on St. Vincent within a short time.

THE NEGROES ARE INDIFFERENT to all that is happening and as to what has occurred. They expect to receive government rations, but there have been instances where they have refused to bury their own relatives.

SEA ENCLOSED TEN MILES. It is estimated that the sea has encroached on ten feet to two miles along the coast, near Georgetown, and that a section on the north of the island has dropped into the sea.

HELP FROM U. S. A. Lieut. Benjamin B. McCormick, commanding the United States steamer Potomac, now at Georgetown, has called on Governor-General Heath for the sympathy of the United States and any assistance within his power to render.

NEGROES STARVING. The negroes who have remained on estates are half starving, and the Carib survivors are leaving their caves and pillaging abandoned dwelling houses and shops.

AMBULANCE CORPS ARRIVES. The arrival here of the first detachment of the ambulance corps, which brought sufferers from Georgetown, caused quite a sensation.

HOPETOUN HAS RESIGNED. Governor-General of Australia Did Not Get Enough Salary. Melbourne, Australia, May 16.-It was announced in the senate Wednesday that the Earl of Hopetoun had decided to resign the governor-generalship of the Australian Commonwealth.

SOUFFRIERE IN REPOSE. Since midnight Tuesday the subterranean detonations have ceased and the Soufriere, on Wednesday, re-lapsed apparently into perfect repose.

SOUFFRIERE HAS DISAPPEARED. The stunted vegetation that formerly adorned the slopes of the mountain has disappeared, having given place to gray-colored lava, which meets the eye on every side.

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FISSURES IN THE MOUNTAIN SIDE

Soufriere Still Showing Signs of Activity. ISLANDERS NOT OUT OF DANGER

No One Able to Go Within Eight Miles of the Volcano's Mouth-Race of Natives Wiped Out.

Kingston, Island of St. Vincent, Tuesday, May 15. The numerous fissures in the Soufriere Mountain's sides continue to throw out vapor, and the subterranean murmurings and tremblings indicate continued unrest.

SICKNESS SPREADS. The inhalation of noxious vapors here is increasing the spread of sickness. An ambulance corps from the island of Barbados has arrived here.

THE LOCAL GOVERNMENT is feeding and sheltering about 3,000 refugees. Subscriptions for the relief of the sufferers are being raised in all the British West Indian Islands.

VEILED IN FIRE. Fort-de-France, May 15.-The situation on St. Vincent is veiled behind a wall of fire. Nobody can approach the neighborhood of the volcano of Soufriere, and it is certain that all within a radius of several miles of the first erupting mountain are dead.

NUNS MET AWFUL DEATH THE STRIKE TO CONTINUE

Building Surrounded by Sea of Molten Lava. Coal Miners Decide to Carry on the Struggle.

Chicago, May 15.—A Fort-de-France special in the Chronicle says: Pierre Bachers, a prisoner who was found semi-suffocated but still alive in the dungeons of the city prison of St. Pierre Tuesday, recovered sufficiently Wednesday to describe what he could of the eruption and the destruction of the town from the small grated window in his cell. "I was just eating my breakfast that morning," he said, "when the rumbling which I had heard beneath my cell for three or four days previously stopped suddenly. I do not know why, but I felt frightened, as though something fearful were about to happen. Then the whole place became black and I heard screams all through the prison. "I screamed to the jailers to come and unlock my cell, but I could not make anyone hear. "The darkness grew blacker and blacker until it was almost as dark as though it were night, and then suddenly the whole place was lighted up with a curious glow, sometimes red, sometimes green, generally red. "While I looked out a huge red-hot stone crashed down just in front of my window, right on the top of the wall, knocking it down. The heat from this stone was most intense, and made my post at the window fearful to endure. "I was in front of me where the brick wall had stood I saw the large convent, and I could see that molten matter had come down the hill and had run into the grounds, around the convent with its first rush, and that all the girls and sisters who were in the convent were doomed. "While I looked I saw another stone, even larger than the one which had fallen near my cell window and broken down the wall, strike on the convent roof and crash through it. Three stories, evidently plunging through to the ground. "Scarcely a minute passed by after this huge stone crashed through the roof, I saw the poor girls flocking out in the utmost terror. "A pit had been dug on the inside of the wall that none of the girls should be able to climb up from the inside, and this acted as a sort of moat, in which the lava floated, and thus made a complete circle around the convent, rendering escape impossible, even if it had been possible to live in the rain of stones from the mountain. "The lava gradually rose and rose, and I could see the huddled group of girls growing smaller and smaller, as first one and then others succumbed to the poisonous fumes and the fearful heat of the lava. And as the group got smaller the lava rose and rose. "Then, with one great burst, it seemed to me a fresh stream of lava flowed into the moat and overspread the building and the little island on which the girls were standing a moment before. I turned away my eyes in horror, and when next I looked nothing was to be seen of the convent but a heap of stones, and here and there a blackened corpse of a girl who but a few moments before had been full of life and hope. "While I was looking from my cell window my eyes almost burst from my head by the heat pouring through the narrow orifice, I noticed a thin, blue smoke curl along the ground, and caught by some eddying current, the fumes struck straight into my cell window, and I remember no more."

BURNED TO DEATH Five Persons Criminated in a Virginia Hotel. Two Men Crushed to Death by the Fall of an Elevator.

FIVE MEN KILLED. Point Pleasant, W. Va., May 15.—Five persons perished in the burning of the American Hotel here last night, and three others were injured, one fatally. Two residences also were burned. The total loss amounts to \$20,000.

CRUSHED TO DEATH. Philadelphia, Pa., May 15.—Two men were killed and two others seriously injured last night at the Bala-hain locomotive works by the fall of an elevator containing an engine tender weighing 5,400 pounds.

RESULTED IN DEATH. Hamilton, May 15.—Hugh Brown, the G. T. R. car repairer who had both feet amputated on Saturday last, died at the hospital as a result of his injuries.

HAD BULLET IN HIS HEAD. Montreal, May 15.—Dr. J. A. Bouchard, of Pawtucket, R. I., was found dead this morning in the Jacques Cartier Hotel, with a bullet wound in his head and a revolver in his hand. Bouchard had been drinking heavily and he is believed to have shot himself while in a condition bordering on delirium tremens.

TO BE HANGED. Winnipeg, May 15.—Tom Lenac has been found guilty of the willful murder of Josiah Matoney, near File Hills, Sept. 15, 1894. He will be hanged June 27.

TREASURER IN TROUBLE. Toronto, May 16.—Charged with stealing upwards of \$1500 of the moneys of the Toronto Opera House, James Alexander, the trusted treasurer of that popular amusement resort, was taken into custody yesterday. Alexander is about 30 years of age, and married, and has been treasurer of the Toronto Opera House for the past two seasons. Prior to that time he was assistant treasurer and usher.

Oiling the Streets. [Honolulu Star.] Boiling oil was sprinkled on Richard street this morning from Hotel to King, and then a coat of quarry sand was spread over it. Now the street is ready for use, and it will be carefully watched for results. It is hoped that the oil will make a solid surface, on which there will be no dust. The oil was distributed from an ordinary street sprinkler. It was first heated to 112 degrees and a heated coil was placed in the sprinkler to keep it hot, so that it would readily run from the pipes. When cool, crude petroleum is quite thick, and it would not run from the sprinkler. The hot oil this morning ran like water, covering the street with a coating of black. Only a very light spray was given, care being exercised to avoid making oily mud, that would cause trouble to pedestrians, vehicles and bicycles. It is expected that the oil and the sand will combine and form a sort of paste or coating that will give out no dust.

THE STRIKE TO CONTINUE. Hazelton, Pa., May 15.—The anthracite mine workers, in convention late this afternoon, decided to continue the strike of the 145,000 men against the mine owners, and to fight it out to the bitter end. The matter of calling out the engineers, firemen and pump-runners will be decided by the delegates tomorrow. The vote to continue the suspension was 511; for strike, 461; against strike, 234—majority for strike 117. President Mitchell, however, in compliance with the rules of the United Mine Workers, announced to the public that the action of the convention was unanimous.

STRIKE AT STOCKHOLM. Stockholm, Sweden, May 15.—The general strike decreed by the official labor union in support of the suffrage bill, the debate on which began in parliament today, was carried out as arranged, and the tie-up of business has been practically complete since this morning. The street cars, trams, and the street railways are suspended. The street cars, cabs, vans, cars and steamers are not running, and no work is going on in any of the factories or shops. The printers have also joined the strike, which will last throughout the parliamentary debate. Fully 15,000 persons here went out on strike and their ranks will be getting stronger, but the strike shops are closed. Only a partial strike occurred at Gothenburg and Malmo, where the printers, gasworkers and employees of the street railways are proceeding with their usual tasks. The tie-up at Helsingborg is complete.

Guatemala's Earthquake Belt.

Extending across the western part of Guatemala from northwest to southeast are the volcanic peaks of the Sierra Madre Mountains. Still nearer the Pacific, and only 20 or 30 miles distant from the belt of volcanoes, are the high, jagged cones of the volcanoes rise in a long, broken row, nearly all of them plainly visible from the sea. The volcanoes along a part of this line are still active, but the eastern volcanoes are now extinct.
