PRINCIPAL GRANT: You ask me why may not an organic union of Protestantism in Canada take place by the year 1900, and I answer by saying that I would prefer not to fix a date. Some aanguine people might ask, why may such a union not take place at once? Others might wish to postpone it for a century, and others are satisfied with the present condition of things in which they see the spirit of union gaining victories notwithstanding, it may be partly because of, outward disunion.

If you refer to the difficulties in the way, it is evident that these are different, not only in different countries, but as regards different denominations. They cannot be ignored, and it seems to me, therefore, that it would be best to divide them; that is, that the union cause should be satisfied with taking one step at a time, and that it should move along the line of least resistance. According to this view, the duty that lies mearest us is to unjite the Methodist and Presbyterian churches. In these the spirit of union is strongest, because both have already tried the experiment and found it a success, and their differences are of least consequence. In polity, in ritual, and in discipline they are substantially at one, and as regards doctrine both are evangelical, and that is the heart of the matter. Each church has special excellencies, and these would be combit of in the united church. The union of these two denominations would at once greated all over the land that we should very soon see fresh triumphs. It would be hased on the spirit of Christ and not with a view to the aggrandizement of a sect. It would be accomplished not in an attitude of hostility to any other church, but in the

Adverse to Lotteries.

Washingtons, July 25.—The House Postoffice Committee to-day agreed upon a substitute bill in lieu of a number of pending bills adverse to lotteries, and ordered it to be reported to the House. The bill prohibits lottery circulars and tickets, lists of drawings, money on drafts for purchase of lottery tickets, or newspapers containing lottery advertisements or drawings, from being carried in the mails or delivered by carriers, and a penalty not exceeding \$500 fine and imprisonment not exceeding one year is to be imposed upon any person depositing such matter in the mails. The Postmaster-General is also to be authorized upon evidence of the existence of a lottery or gift enterprise to cause registered letters directed to the company to be stamped "fraudulent" and returned to the senders, and he may also forbid the psyment of money orders addressed to a lottery or gift enterprise.




