THE BAPTIST CONVENTION.

Most of the Day Devoted to Home Missions—A Scarcity of Preachers.

Toronto, Oct. 20.—After an hour's devotional exercises led by Rev. E. D. Sherman, of Eden. Rev. Dr. Thomas, president, took the chair, and the Baptist Convention went into session for its second day's work. There were more than 300 present.

Rev. T. P. McEwen, secretary of the home missions, submitted the annual report in connection with that branch of the work. Touching references were made to the deaths of Thomas Lailey and Wm. Craig, sen. The report stated that it is now the policy of the board that no church shall be erected until two-thirds of the cost is provided for by cash or bona fide subscriptions. This, it is hoped, will do away with the endless debt and constant appeals, of which they had had so much recently. During the year chapels had been built as Moore Ceater, Bay Yiew, Drummond, Bellerica and Bancroft, and others are in course of construction at Claremont and Doe Lake. Parsonages had been built at Almonte, Windsor and Fullarton. A dozen places could be mentioned where organization was either desired or considered, but the board would not recommend such organization when such a step meant a hopeless search for another pastor or the outlay of hundreds of dollars from the mission churches that for weeks and months have prayed for a pastor, but none has come. Only three churches had been organized, Wendecker, Weidman and Dempsey. Barrie, Mount Forest, Parkhill and McGillivray have declared themselves self-supporting, and Fenelon Falls has almost reached that point. Over 170 churches are now receiving aid from the mission fund, and of these only four have falled to respond to the call for help. The contributions of mission churches had advanced 32 per cent. over 1890. Contributions from the Sunday schools have been greater than in other years. The baptisms reported in connection with the mission churches number about 900. The women's societies east and west have rendered generous help. The board is impressed

Mr. John Stark, treasurer of the home mission fund, read the financial statement. The total amount expended during the year in spreading the gospel had been \$21,730 and the amount received \$19,271.

Rev. G. B. Davis of Windsor, read a paper on "The perils and prospects of home mission work." The great thing that they wanted was men. While a great deal had been done by the intermittent service of students on the field, and this was the practical part of their training, there should be more permanency on the field. There was a danger of doing too little evangelization. There was a peril in the kind of men they were to employ. 





In all probability, the Dominion voters' lists, now in course of preparation, will be used in the next election. In last contest, hundreds of good citizens found they were disfranchised because their names had been lived and paid taxes in London for many years were omitted. The same will be the case this year unless every man examines the list, and makes certain that he is not deprived of his rights.

It is necessary, at the same time, that the names of those who are disqualified, by reason of having left the city or from any other cause, shall be removed from the lists.

All necessary information as to procedure will be cheerfully afforded by the secretary at the Liberal rooms, Oddfellows' block, the corry afternoon and evening till the 27th October, which is the last day for giving notice of objections to the list.

Lawyers' and Sheriffs' Fees.

Lawyers' and Shortffs' Fccs.

To the Editor of the ADVERTISER:
Sir, I ask the privilege of publishing through the columns of your able and widely-circulated public journal a concist statement of the sheriffs' cause of complaint against the legislation of the Mowat Government in 1874 and 1881. Since 1882 lawyers and sheriffs have been paid by fees:

1. The first session of the first Parliament of Upper Canada met at Niagara on Sept. 17, 1792, and prorogued on Oct. 15 following.

From 1792 to 1822 sheriffs served all-process and were paid by salary.

The second session of the cighth Parliament of Upper Canada met at York, now Toronto, on the 21st day of November, 1821, and prorogued on the 17th of January, 1822. During this session it was enacted that it shall and may be lawful for the persons heroinafter named to demand and receive the following fees. Then follows a table of fees for judge, commissioner, attorney, sheriff, clerk and crier.

The sheriffs did the serving of writs and other process from 1792 to 1853, a period of 61 years. In 1853 the act 16th Vic., chap. 175, was enacted, sec. 14 of which practically gave the services to lawyers. It was so unjust to sheriffs and litigants that after six years' trial it was laid aside in 1859. From 1859 to 1874, a period of fifteen years, the sheriffs did the serving again. From 1792 to 1874 the sheriffs did the serving during 76 years. In 1874 the Hon. O. Mowat enacted 37 Vic., chap. 7, and for reasons which I hope he will explain to the public he transferred sec. 14, which had been laid aside fifteen years ago, and inserted it in the 37th Vic., chap. 7, as secs. 83 and 84. Sec. 84 provides for punishing the sheriff if he fails to do his duty. In 1876, the third year sec. 83 was in force, 20,380 writs were issued, of which 9,314 ishing the sheriff if he fails to do his duty. In 1876, the third year sec. 83 was in force, 20,380 writs were issued, of which 9,314 were served by lawyers, who said they made the services for nothing, at a tariff of fees that gave them \$19,959 belonging to the sheriffs, and \$29,535 02 belonging to the persons served, in all \$49,494 02. The loss of the \$19,959 was an average loss of \$539 43 to each one of the 37 sheriffs then in Ontario. In 1876 my office was worth \$4,143 21, but the loss of \$539 43, my share of the \$19,959, reduced my net income to \$3,618 19, and it was the same in '77.'78,'79 and '80. My loss of the \$\$59 43 five years S3,618 19, and it was the same in '77, '78, '79 and '80. My loss of the \$539 43 five years was \$2,997 15; that was my loss under sec. 83. Now comes the heavy loss to sheriffs. In 1881 Mr. Mowat handed all the sheriffs over to the judges of the High Court of Justice. During the past ten years under the judges patronage my average yearly income has been \$2,293 15, being \$1,325 04 less yearly than it was in 1876 after \$539 43 was deducted, leaving \$3,618 19—ten years loss of \$325 04 is \$13,250 04 add \$2,697 15 loss under Sec. 83. Total loss in fifteen years \$15,947 59—all caused by Hon. O. Mowat; and other sheriffs are suffering also.


