The tenor of these later remarks influenced the Czar's decision to send the Czarewitch as his representative to the marriage of the Princess Margaret. The revulsion of the friendly feeling entertained for the German Government will be intense unless Chancellor Von Caprivi officially explains his remarks regarding Russia and Denmark. The speech is hailed at Vienna and Buda-Pesth as establishing greater confidence on the part of the Austrian Government in Von Caprivi than was ever felt in Prince Bismarck.

The Opposition is now beginning to admit that the Army Bill has a fair chance of passing in the R-sichstag. It is generally conceded that Chancellor Von Caprivi's speech before the Reichstag committee was a most powerful and skillful plea for united action on the part of all the German parties on a matter that involves the safety of the Fatherland.

Disastrous Gale on the English Coast.

London, Jan. 15.—A heavy snow storm from the northeast is sweeping over England. Snow, sleet and a high wind prevail along the coast. Many small accidents to shipping along the coast are reported. The steamer Brighton, belonging to the Brighton Railway Company, and plying between Newhaven and Dieppe, left port in a gale this morning. She had a terribly rough passage. A deckhouse and the smokestack were washed away, and one of her boats was smashed. When she approached the pier at Dieppe the storm was so blinding that the pilot could not see beyond her bow. The wind was blowing 60 miles an hour and tho seas were breaking over her deck so rapidly that none of the 80 passengers were allowed on deck. Without any warning the steamship crashed into the pier. A large hole was stove in her bow, and for a minute she stuck fast. Ropes were got aboard and were made fast before she was driven more than twenty if feet from the pier. She began filling rapidly. A long gangway was improvised, and the passengers were hurried ashore. There was little panie. Half the baggage had been got off when the captain ordered the men to leave the ship, which was settling rapidly. He had hardly followed the last man to the pier when the vessel went under.



Why should not all the great nations unite to make the proposal that the military establishments of Euro-pean nations should be vastly reduced? proposition would bring many a continental home joy into that is now in constant dread least the father and sons—the breadwinners of the schold-be suddenly torn from those they love, and compelled to face the terrible ngines of war that have been devised by military experts. Disarmament on even a moderate scale would relieve the European nations of the enormous burdens that are crushing the workers to the earth, and making existence so wretched that in many thousands of cases temporary relief is sought in intoxicating drinks.

The trouble seems to be that even in this advanced and inteligent age, on the eve of the twentieth century, so much mutual distrust has engendered by selfish men the different nations that those who ought to be brothers, mutually anxious to mote each other's welfare, are kept far apart and made to believe that only by regarding their neighbors as enemies can they hope to live. This kind of teaching has had a most pernicious effect, but it has had the desired object of maintaining great military forces in every nation, and in providing the privileged classes with well-paid jobs that would not exist but for the cultivation of the trade of international animosity. Hence it is most difficult for the lovers of concord to promote those principles of peace and brotherly kindness hat should animate not only local communities but every Christian nation of the

After a preventive war, even if it should be successful, we would find our selves in a situation far more unbearable than that in which we are placed to-day; and consequently we do not propose to make such a war."

If Germany does not propose to enter or a war of this kind, and on the confession of Chancellor Von Caprivi, she would be very foolish and blameworthy if she did, why. instead of proposing to vastly increase her armaments, should her rulers not make an honest effort to promete a movement in favor of a general disarmament? Nothing would elevate the German people more in the eyes of the world than for her rulers to take the lead in a great movement of this kind. The peaceful country which minds its own business and refuses to crush its people beneath a burden of debt is the nation which will forge ahead in the days to come. War should be the occupation of no progressive people.

OIL IN BULK.

"Importer," writing to the Montreal Sazette, directs attention to some features n the law governing coal oil, the effect of which is not generally understood. Practically the regulations referred to largely increase the protection, in the first place very great, which the Canadian tariff affords to petroleum producers. For the sake of economy in transport tank cars have been adopted for use between the great producing points and consuming depots. They greatly reduce the cost of carriage and avoid the waste that occurs through leakage when oil is conveyed long distances in barrels. A Canadian importer cannot use them. As a result, it is said, dealers at United States border points are able to undersell the Canadian mporter in his own market. They have less freight to pay on the bulk oil than when it is carried in barrels, which the law compels the Canadian to import in, and they avoid the considerable loss by waste the Canadian is subject to. Altogether, the difference, with the inspection fee, amounts, it is claimed, to some 3 cents a gallon, an item considerable enough to seriously affect the Canadian wholesalers' trade, without improving the demand for

Canadian oil. Another serious charge against the oil duties, as now collect the compulsory importation of oil in barrels discriminates against the Canadian cooper. By law, the oil must be imported in barrels. These are made in the United States. If the oil could be imported in bulk, Canadian coopers would have the making of the barrels. Why should they

Under the better system, too, when the Cieveland Syndicate takes hold of the London and Port Studey Railway, it would be possible to make London the headquarters for the distribution of imported coal oil, as the cars with the fluid could be loaded on the boats at Cleveland and carried to this city without breaking bulk. as it is intended that coal and iron shall be carried. The change would bring a boom in the oil trade and in the barrel-making industry of this city, and would add to London's importance as a Western center of trade and point of distribution.



A YOUNG FIEND.

Fatally Shoots His Father, Mother and

CHESTER, Pa., Jan. 15.—A tragedy was enacted here yesterday afternoon which will result in the loss of two lives and in all probability the conviction of Thos, Rodgers

enacted here yesterday alternoon which will result in the loss of two lives and in all probability the conviction of Thos. Rodgers as a double parricide. Rodgers is a youth of 24 years, and the victims are his father, Thos. Rodgers, 60 years old; his mother, Martha Ann Rodgers, of about the same age; and his married sister, Mrs. William Kildeyt

Thomas sat back of the stove in the kitchen of his parents' home just after the noonday meal and his father reprimanded him for his laziness, declairing he must go to work. Thomas answered: "You can't put me out," and going up stairs secured his brother-in-law's revolver. The wife and daughter attempted to save Mr. Rodgers, but the young villain pushed them aside and deliberately fired two bullets into his father at short range. The first shot entered the thigh and the second lodged in the heart, while the powder secorched the old man's clothing. After his father had fallen to the floor young Rodgers kicked him in the face. The mother attempted to escape by the cellar door, but a bullet from the son's revolver struck her in the back and penetrated the left lung. The sister, Mrs. Kildey, fled from the house by the rout door, and her brother, whose blood-thirsty passions had been thoroughly acoused, pursued her to the street, and, standing on the doorstep, shot her while she ran, in almost the same place that he had wounded his mother. The bullet glanced on the shoulder-blade and this saved the young woman's life. The revolver now empty, the would-be murderer ran up the street to an alderman's office two blocks away, and entering locked the door against a large crowd which had followed. The police were notified and Rodgers was locked up.

The three victims were taken to the hospital, where the physicians announced that the wounded father and mother could not live until merring. The mayor took

The mayor took the ante-mortem statement of the dying couple. Mr. Rodgers said that his son had had frequently threatened his life when he had pressed the young man to go to work. On several occasions the father had secured his arrest, but withdrew the charges on promises of good behavior. Both parents believe that Thomas intended to kill his father and say he had not been drinking. Young Rodgers said the attack was the result of a family row and that he intended to kill the old man. He gave no reason, however, for the assault on his mother and sister.



Down in the street thousands pressed forward when they saw the doors open. All the afternoon a steady stream of people poured in, but the crowds that wanted to get in did not diminish. Late in the afternoon the doors were closed and the officers had an hour's rest. It was designed to close the shall at 5 o'clock until to-morrow morning, but at 6 o'clock they were opened again. This time the people were beaten into line, and more order was maintained up to 11 o'clock, when the final closing was made. To-night the police were increased and 40 fremen assisted.
