
Highly Successful School Entertain

Topics of Today.

Sir Richard Cartwright announces that four sets of the Oliver, Merrian and Lewis military equipments are now being tested as to their general suitability for the Canadian militia, and will, in due course, be reported upon to the general officer commanding the forces by the permanent corps at Halifax. London and Toronto.

How the development of Western Canada is proceeding is shown in a dispatch from Revelstoke, B. C. It chronicles the departure of a train of eight cars loaded with copper bullion and matte from the Hall mines for Montreal for shipment to England. This is the first copper made in British Columbia, and goes high in silver and gold. Its value is about \$500 per

Dr. Montague, M.P., has returned from British Columbia.

After his elevation to the bench, it was charged that Judge Prendergast, of Manitoba, had paid for rigs in a local election-an illegal act. In reply to a question Sir Oliver Mowat said it was a question whether there was power under the statute to inquire into charges made against a judge with reference to his conduct before appointnent; in that case proceedings could only be taken by an address of both houses. Common sense suggested that there were offences against the law for which no one would propose the removal of a judge, and it was a question where to draw the line. The employment of hack drivers during elections was not made in any case an illegal act in England till 1854, and not in all eases until 1883. Neither in the English the Canadian statute was it called a corrupt act; simply an illegal act. There were judges of the superior ourts who had been charged with breaches of the election law. Sir Oliver Mowat mentioned the case of Judge Fitzgerald, of Thunder Bay, who was found guilty by an election court of a corrupt practice in giving a vote to an alien whom he knew had no right to vote. But his position on the bench was not disturbed. The minister of justice concluded by speaking in high terms of Judge Prendergast's character and abilities, and said that on taking his seat on the bench he was warmly congratulated by the leading members of the bar, including many who were his political opponents. Judge Ferguson, a Conservative leader, agreed that the minister of justice treated this subject in a judicial manner.






