HAIG TAKES NEW SLICE FROM FOE IN BELGIAN WAR

British Advance Lines 2,000 Yards, Getting Astride St. Julien Road—Throw Back Attempt To Retake Inverness Copse-French Penetrate Trenches.

London, Aug. 28.—As the result of a British attack on the Flanders front yesterday, the British lines have been advanced along a front of more than 2,000 yards, astride the St. Julien Poelcapelle road, the war office

German attempts last night to drive back the British from their positions in the Inverness copse on the Ypres-Menin road were frustrated, and prisoners were taken from the attacking forces.

The text of the statement reads: As the result of our attack yesterday we have advanced our line, after heavy fighting, on a front of more than 2,000 yards astride the St. Julien-Poelcapelle road, and are established in further positions of the German third system in this

RUSS ARMIES DEMORALIZED: ONLY DISCIPLINE OF IRON SAVE NATION, SAYS KORNILOFF

LIBERTY WITH ORDER.

Vladimir Naboukoff, a prominent Social Democrat, speaking in the name of the first Duma, declared the country aimed at the establishment of a strong and independent power, uninfluenced by political parties; a power which, based on democratic principles, would establish obedience to the law, civil liberty and personal security. The speaker emphasized the absolute necessity of the independence of the high common of the army from every private influence. NO SEPARATE PEACE.

M. Naboukoff said the members of the first Duma repudlated with indignation all thoughts of a separate peace, and that if they were to have peace they did not desire it to be the result of German victory but the consequence of the triumphs of Russia and her allies. Nothing except an order to exterminate the entire regiment availed to cause it to return to its position.







A single meatless day in Canada would probably save at least a half million pounds of meat. That would feed, not theoretically, but actually, at least a million persons across the ocean. In six months it would save 6,000 tons of meat. The same regulation applied to other foodstuffs, such as bread, cake, pastry, potatoes, would mean that Canada would supply thousand upon thousands of tons of food that could not otherwise be supplied. Another system would be to measure meat by ounces. This could be supplementary to meatless days, and there is no doubt that, especially in restaurants and hotels, a great wastage would be stopped.

The Allies need millions of bushels of wheat from Canada and the United States. The North American continent is practically the only source of supply for the fighting nations of the west front. The food question is of tre-

PULP, PULP WOOD AND PAPER

A GREAT AND STEADILY GROWING CANADIAN INDUSTRY. That the production of the pulp mills of Canada has reached enormous proportions is well evidenced by the following, taken from the Canadian Bank of Commerce Monthly Letter: The value of the exports of pulp, pulpwood and paper for the twelve months ending 31st March, was \$52.975,457, or 31.9 per cent more than in the previous twelve months. The increase is due partly to the advance in price and partly to the increased output. In 1916, 2.833,119 cords of pulpwood were produced, as compared with 2.355,550 cords in 1915. A noteworthy development of the past decade has been the steady gain in the quantity of wood manufactured into pulp, while the quantity of rath, wood exported tity of wood manufactured into pulp, while the quantity of pulp wood export has remained stationery.

THE PRICE OF INDEPENDENCE.

With interest added this amount now aggregates \$4,800,000, and the owner offered to turn over his holdings to the policyholders for approximately \$2,800,000.-Exchange

And, since corn is the bulk of its raw material the Government price fixing will not unlikely enable the company to buy at much lower prices than it is now paying, thereby increasing its net earnings. There is altogether too much stress laid upon effects that have not yet developed. The stock market is always sensitive and money more timid than is warranted by conditions as they obtain. We still contend that there is little to fear from further depreciation of good sound securities and industrials should improve on a parity with rails. The crops are big all over the continent. In a statement accompanying his proclamation the president said one of the first intentions of the Government will be to see that no American products are made "the occasion of benefit to the enemy, either directly or indirectly." Officials interpreted the order as forecasting order as forecasting a vigorous use of the export control as a war weapon and a policy of the strictest rationing of countries contiguous to Germany.


