London, March 28 .- This morning the enemy opened a heavy bombardment on the British defences east of Arras. An attack is developing in this section.

Repeated attacks were made by the enemy along the valley of the Somme, in the neighborhood of Beaumont-Hamel, Puisieux and Moyenneville. They were repulsed.





The potato is a native of the mountain regions of South America, and should be planted in a light sandy soil which is well drained and will warm

Avoid keeping them in the dark, for in that case the sprouts will become very long. They are planted out in the best garden soil, with the stem end up and covered with about two inches of earth, being set ten inches apart, with the rows 24 to 30 inches between them. By this method a large crop of early potatoes may be obtained.

# DRASTIC FOOD

Restaurants Must Cut Portions MATERIAL TURN to Patrons.

### WILL EXTEND TO HOMES

Meat and Bread Doled Out by the Ounce, and Only for Certain Meals.

CITAWA, March 27.—A radical change in restaurant regulations has been ordered by the Canada food board, and, except certain clauses, goes into force at once. They apply to public eating-houses of all kinds, including hotels, restaurants eating-houses of all kinds, including hotels, restaurants, cafeterias, clubs, dining cars and steamships, or any places whatsoever where meals or refreshments to the number of 24 or more per day are sold or served to persons other than members of the family or household of the proprietor.

After these regulations have become familiar to the public as, applied to public eating-houses, it is the intention of the board to have similar regulations, in so far as they are applicable, put into effect for private householders. Heavy Penalties.

Penalties are provided for violation of the provisions of the order. Upon summary conviction before a police magistrate or two justices of the peace restaurant keepers or others found guilty may be fined sums ranging from \$1,000 to \$100, be imprisoned for periods up to three months, or be both fined and imprisoned. The fines go to municipalities if municipal officers institute proceedings, to the provincial treasurer if a provincial officer secures the conviction.

The board also gives notice that on and after the 1st of June, 1918, no person shall operate a public eating-place without first having obtained a license from the Canada food board. The regulations do not apply to military, logging, lumber, mining, instruction and fish-curing camps and hospitals.






