CANADA IS NOT **SO GENEROUS TO MEN AS BRITAIN**

Returned Men Feel Hurt at the Great Discrepancy in Allowances.

SYSTEM IN MOTHERLAND

Pleases the Dominion Fighters Much Better Than the One Here.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Ottawa, Dec. 4.—The discrepancy between the allowance granted to mem-Force at the expiry of their terms of service and those granted to officers and men of the British army is a subject of comment by returning men. Canada provides for an allowance of three months' pay after discharge. The officer man who has been at the front since commencement gets just the same no more than the man who joined and no more than the man who joined up just before the armistice ceased.

In England service in France is recognized. The man who has seen one year's service in France receives 124 days' pay after discharge with 62 days' extra pay for every year or portion thereafter. In Canada no distinction is made between the man who has been in France and the man who has not.

Canadian returned men object not only Canadian returned men object not only to this fact, but to the fact that the three months' allowance after discharge will scarcely serve to put them into civilian clothes at present high costs.

MONTENEGRIN KING HAS BEEN DEPOSED

Skupshtina Is Claimed To Have No Constitutional Existence.

Paris, Dec. 4.—The Royal Montenegrin Government has issued a statement denying that King Nicholas has been denosed.

denying that King Nicholas has been deposed.

The statement points out that the Skupshtina has no constitutional exisence, and that the only body having authority of making any pronouncement as to the sovereignty of the state is the national parliament. This body, it is said, cannot meet at present, many members being confined in Austrian prisons or living abroad.

"My deposition was but a straw cast to see which way the wind blows," said King Nicholas of Montenegro to a Matin representative yesterday.

"If a meeting was held at Podgoritza (where the Montenegrin national assembly is reported to have met), I have not the slightest news of it. A meeting such as that one could have been held only under the shadow of bayonets. A legal plebiscite is not carried out by armed force. That is why I consider what has passed down there as being without importance."







WILSON'S DECISION A GOOD ONE.

XCEPT on the grounds of party politics it is not easy to understand the hostility in Congress and in some sections of the American press to the president's attending the peace conference. One of the objections is that the chief executive should remain at home to attend to domestic problems. To Canadians this criticism seems trifling and childish. At longest the president will be absent but a few weeks, and will hourly be in the closest touch by cable and wireless with affairs at Washington. The great republic should be able to struggle along for a short period without Mr. Wilson's immediate presence. There doesn't appear to be anything in the wind

at the moment that would lead to disaster, be cause of his absence for a few weeks.

On the other hand the president's presence at the Paris meeting should be a distinct advantage to the Allied nations and to the United States itself. It will accentuate the harmony that exists amongst the Allied governments and Washington and will discourage the attempts of the Prussian to introduce discord. Above all there must be no misunderstanding or misreading of the president's Fourteen Terms. Too much of the world's progress and happiness depends on just how these principles are to be interpreted and applied, and with their author on hand to explain, or if necessary to introduce modifications, there will be less danger of the Entente flivvering to the enemy's advantage. The far-sighted Lloyd George and Clemenceau had much more in mind than the mere honoring of the American president when they asked for his personal attendance at the opening of the peace conference. In accepting the invitation Woodrow Wilson again displays the excellent judgment that has marked his actions throughout America's participation in the war.
