UPPER SILESIA TO BE OCCUPIED BY THE ALLIED TROOPS

ALLIED TROOPS WILL OCCUPY UPPER SILESIA IN EFFORT TO QUELL POLISH-GERMAN RIOTS

Transfer of Forces to Territory in Dispute Will Be Carried Out Prior to Taking of Plebiscite—Action Is Urged by Entente Generals.

London, Sept. 9.—Upper Silesia, where serious conflicts have in progress between the Polish and German elements in anticipation of the proposed plebiscite over the transfer of the territory in Poland, will be occupied in the near future by Allied troops, according to a statement made by General Dupont, in Paris, representing the Entente Generals.

Fisher, Miloe Miller of Wardsville issued a writ in the supreme court here against Beatrice Wilson of this city, claiming damages for breach of promise of marriage.

11,616 DISABLED VETS. TAKING ADVANTAGE OF RETRAINING COURSE

Canada Continues To Lead In Important Work Among Returned Men. Ottawa, Sept. 9.—Canada continues to lead in the important work of the industrial retraining of disabled members of the forces. Today there are in Canada 11,616 disabled men undergoing industrial retraining under the direction of the vocational branch of the department of soldiers' civil re-establishment, while the number of disabled men in training in the United States is 6,671.

RAILROADERS WILL CALL A CONTINENT-WIDE STRIKE UNLESS DEMANDS GRANTED

Maintenance of Way Employees and Shop Laborers Are Determined Not to Accept Any Compromise; But Will Insist On Increases of Dollar Per Day Per Man. Detroit, Sept. 9.—Although the national committee of the United Brotherhood of Maintenance of Way Employees and Railway Shop Laborers has been empowered by the referendum strike vote of the membership to call a continent-wide strike if a wage increase, demanded by the union, is not granted, the committee members at a convention held here, if the rail administration submits its answer before the sessions close, this was announced by the brotherhood officers this morning.

FIVE STRIKERS ARE KILLED, 15 HURT IN FIGHT WITH POLICE

Fatalities Are Result of Trouble at Steel Car Plant at Hammond. Hammond, Ind., Sept. 9.—Five strikers were killed and fifteen wounded today in a battle between 1,000 former employees of the Standard Steel Car Company and the police.

DISEASE RESEMBLING SPANISH INFLUENZA PREVALENT IN QUEBEC

Quebec, Sept. 9.—Grippe and pneumonia cases are prevalent in Quebec. One medical man said last night that in lower town there are at present at least twenty cases that resemble the Spanish flu epidemic here last fall. The civic health bureau is taking extreme precautions to quell the possible recurrence of the flu.

MOB CAUSES HEAVY DAMAGE IN FERMOY CARDINAL MERCIER, BELGIAN PRIMATE, ARRIVES IN U. S.

High Dignitaries in the Roman Catholic Church Extend Welcome. London, Sept. 9.—Fermoy, a town in Ireland, 10 miles northwest of Cork, was terrorized by a mob for an hour last evening, according to a dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company. Fifty shops were damaged, one jewelry store being completely demolished. The loss is estimated at several thousand pounds sterling.

THOUSANDS OF VISITORS THROU FAIR GROUNDS PROMISING TO BREAK ALL SECOND-DAY RECORDS FOR ATTENDANCE; JUDGING OF LIVE STOCK AND PRODUCE CONTINUES TODAY

No Exact Account of Numbers Present Kept On Monday, But Estimates Say 16,000—Under the Present System Counting Is Difficult—Grand Stand Performance Is Attractive.

With prospects for another day of perfect weather, the Western Fair today set out to break all records for attendance on the second day of the exhibition. The Western Fair board did not know today how many people passed through the gates of the grounds Monday. Secretary A. M. Hunt said that the average attendance on opening days was from 8,000 to 10,000, and that he thought there might have been double that number there. There were no official figures forthcoming at the directors' meeting today to confirm the estimate.

VETERANS WILL ASK PREMIER TO RECONSIDER HIS DECISION SOLDIERS CONDUCTING STRENUOUS LOBBY CAMPAIGN AMONG MEMBERS. SENT CIRCULAR LETTERS

Maintenance of Way Employees and Shop Laborers Are Determined Not to Accept Any Compromise; But Will Insist On Increases of Dollar Per Day Per Man. Ottawa, Sept. 9.—There is no inclination whatever on the part of the G. W. V. A. as represented by the Dominion Executive here to take the refusal of Sir Robert Borden to have their claims for better terms submitted to an independent tribunal as final. Members of the executive, including President Furrey, Vice-President Maywell, Secretary MacNeil and others, have been in constant attendance in the corridors since yesterday morning, and are conducting a very strenuous lobby of the members.

U. S. CROP FORECAST Has Been Issued by Agricultural Dept.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 8.—Forecast of crop production of the country's important crops, based on conditions existing Sept. 1, were announced today by the United States department of agriculture as follows: Winter wheat, 115,000,000 bushels; spring wheat, 205,000,000 bushels; corn, 858,000,000 bushels; oats, 1,223,000,000 bushels; barley, 195,000,000 bushels; flax, 10,200,000 bushels.

SASKATCHEWAN GOVT. TO CONSIDER LIQUOR ISSUE AT SESSION

Price Control To Be Discussed. Regina, Sept. 9.—In an interview yesterday Premier Martin stated that the provincial government had under advisement legislation affecting liquor sales to be introduced at the next sitting of the house. Price control and the taking over of the business by the government were being considered. He believed that no definite action would be taken before the Dominion Government's plan was announced.

GYPSIES TERRORIZE CAPE BRETON ISLAND

Several members of a band of gypsies, who have been terrorizing Cape Breton Island for the past two weeks, were captured by a police posse just outside the city yesterday and are now in the country jail awaiting trial on several charges. The most flagrant case with which they are charged is alleged to have happened 30 miles from Sydney on the road to Arichat, early yesterday morning.

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GERMANY WILL BE ORDERED TO REMOVE CLAUSE

Suppression of Article 61 To Be Demanded by Supreme Council. Paris, Sept. 9.—The supreme council of the peace conference will today draft a note to be sent to Germany demanding the suppression of Article 61 of the German constitution, providing for Austrian representation in the German parliament, according to newspapers here. It is said that the council considers the German answer to the council's note relative to Article 61, as insufficient.

AMERICAN AIRPLANE FALLS IN LAKE ERIE

Aviators Are Rescued a Few Miles Out From Kingsville. Detroit, Sept. 9.—An airplane bound from a southern flying field to Minneapolis fell into Lake Erie, near Kingsville, Ont., late yesterday, according to word received here late last night. Pilot Clay Greene, Detroit, and Gene Stanley of Cincinnati, his passenger, were rescued by a passing motorboat after clinging to the wrecked plane several hours. One of the men, who took place at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning.

RUMANIA REFUSES TO SIGN AUSTRIAN PEACE AGREEMENT

Delegation to Peace Conference Makes Definite Announcement. Paris, Sept. 9.—The Rumanian delegation to the peace conference announced today that it would not sign the Austrian peace treaty, the signing of which by Austria and various other powers is set to take place at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning.

4,000 COAL MINERS OBEY STRIKE ORDER

Men Walk Out As a Protest Against Discharge of Comrades. Scranton, Pa., Sept. 9.—Four thousand employees of the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Coal Company in its mines within Lackawanna County today obeyed the strike order of their grievance committee. They went on strike in support of the company's miners at Archibald, who are protesting against the discharge of those who refused to do emergency work at laborer's wage. The men have several grievances.

JUDGING OF HORSES, CATTLE AND DOGS DRAWS CROWDS

Some of the Finest Animals Ever Exhibited Here Are in Competition This Year—Come From Far and Near.

Hundreds of farmers and people interested in agriculture visited the Western Fair this morning and eagerly thronged the exhibition buildings devoted to live stock, fruit and flowers, poultry, dairy, dogs and the pure food show in the process building. Great interest was taken in the judging of the live stock and fruit and flowers continued from yesterday during the forenoon and half the dog show, which started at noon.

The judging of the Clydesdale class horses in the arena inside of the race track attracted a large number of horse fanciers. Their attention was well occupied until noon, when the judging of several other classes followed that of the heavy registered animals. These classes were standard bred, carriage and coach, English sires, heavy draught horses, and the various kinds of ponies. In the afternoon the judges will be busy with the thoroughbreds, hackneys, Percheron and agricultural horses.

In Cattle Ring. In the cattle exhibition ring, judging of the Herefords, Aberdeen Angus, fat cattle, pure bred, grade or cross, Ayrshires, Holstein-Friesians and the grade and mixed breeds commenced. Western Ontario's best cattle and several from the United States were led into the ring, and they presented such a beautiful appearance that the eyes of every cattle raiser in attendance must have turned green with envy. There has not been such a splendid exhibition of live stock, according to the judges, at any of the past years. High grade cattle in such large numbers make the task of judging a long and very arduous one. There is, in addition, the judging of the swine and sheep entries was continued today so it is probable whether or not the judging of all animals will be completed today.

Dogs Are Popular. A noisy mixture of loud barks and yelps, insistent pleading or scared in the dog show building when it was opened to the public at noon under the auspices of the London Canine Association. The building proved to be a centre of interest, especially to the ladies and children, for splendid specimens of every size, color and breed are being exhibited by fifty-five residents of the city, and many from Western Ontario, Detroit, Port Huron and several places as far away as Althburgh. There are bloodhounds, magnificent great danes, and Russian wolfhounds, American foxhounds, pointers, English and Irish setters, cocker spaniels, beagles, collies and Dalmatians. Next in order are the bulldogs, Alsatians, terriers, bull terriers, French bulldogs and Boston terriers; there are smooth and wire-haired foxterriers, Irish, Scotch, White West Highland, Yorkshire, Manchester and Maltese terriers. In smaller cages are shown the poodles, Pekinese spaniels and Pomeranians.

The dog show building was visited by the judges at 1 o'clock this afternoon.

JEW TO CELEBRATE THEIR NEW YEAR IN CITY, SEPTEMBER 25

Occasion Begins Ten Days of Penitence.

On Thursday, September 25, the Jews of this city will celebrate the festival of the New Year, or as called by the Jews, the festival of Rosh Hashana. Religious services will be held ushering in the year 5680 of the Jewish world. This day is proclaimed a holiday, the day commencing at sunset on Wednesday evening, September 24, and lasting till sunset the next day. Orthodox Jews, however, always observe two days at this festival.

The New Year is the beginning of the most sacred of Jewish holidays. It is the first of ten days of penitence, culminating in the Day of Atonement. On New Year's day worshippers at the religious service recall to mind the misdeeds of the past year with a view to consecrating themselves to a nobler life in the years to come.

Outside of the usual service held on this day the Jews of the city have they expect to make arrangements before the week of September 25.

Sweet Strains On Violin Produce An Unfortunate Result

Assault Alleged To Have Followed and Court Hears Case.

Some music is said to have a soothing effect, while other—well—as a result of Fred Haxco, a Russian, playing a few alleged melodies on his fiddle on Sunday, he was choked and bumped on the floor and a countryman, Samuel Soskow took a hurried trip to Victoria Hospital. The latter's head and face were so badly hurt that he was still holding the wounded parts when he arrived in police court this morning.

Fred, who has been charged with assaulting Soskow, declared that his opponent struck him first. Annie Haxco, his wife, has also been charged with assault. On the advice of their counsel, E. N. Weekes, both pleaded not guilty. On producing \$250 in cash as bail they were allowed to go until Thursday.

Fred was found guilty of participating in a drinking bout with Mike Delouise, Mike Shanak and Mike Bellows, and assessed \$10. Mr. Weekes, in defending his client, wondered how the police could tell that each individual man had been drinking. The policemen declared that they smelled the breath of each man immediately before putting him in the police auto.

Say They Copied Out Returns Provisions of All Kinds Given to Shelter.

Unintentionally Judge Talbot Macbeth let the cat out of the bag in county court this morning. He stated that city enumerators making up the list of voters on the Ontario temperance referendum act, had sent in their returns through Chief Engraver, Mr. C. Fitzgerald, for ten days' work, but upon Provincial Auditor, McLaurin's demand was held up owing to the fact that the enumerators claimed this was legitimate demand as they were busily engaged copying out their returns on the Sabbath.

On payment for Sunday being refused, general requested that as Talbot Macbeth this morning, he should intend to give it to the reporters. He would not mind making a statement, but there was no possible chance that they would get it right in the papers. All of which comes to show Judge Macbeth's expressed idea of reporters.

MANENTI CONTINUES TO EVADE CAPTURE

No Sign Yet of Escaped Prisoner.

Joseph Manenti, the Italian, held on a charge of forgery, who escaped from the county jail here, still at large. The county police are of the opinion that Manenti has not left London, having found shelter with local friends, and consequently they have not telegraphed news of the escape to other Ontario municipalities.

City police officials denied late last night that the escape of J. Manenti, who had been reported to them immediately. They are searching for the Italian, who has been charged with counterfeiting bank notes. Questioned by newspapers Sunday night, the police asserted that as far as they knew Manenti had not escaped from the jail, and that no reported escape had been made to them.

Descriptions of Manenti have been sent broadcast by the local police before he loses himself across the border. Special efforts are being made in the direction of Hamilton where Manenti is known to have had confederates. He was given a court hearing in this city in which he was vindicated by witnesses as having been implicated in the hold-up and shooting of three foreigners near Hamilton before he was arrested on the counterfeiting charge.

PICTURE OF TURKISH LUST AND CRUELITIES GRIPS AT MAJESTIC

Aurora, Sole Survivor of Two-Year Nightmare in Armenia, Tells Screen Story.

Extermination, slow but sure—this, decreed the Turks, was to be Armenia's fate. So well was the plan executed that when two years had elapsed 500,000 Armenian girls, the flower of the one Christian nation in Allah's territory, were either corpses in the desert wastes of Asia Minor or soulless wrecks of the harems of the lustful, unrepentable Moslems. After witnessing all the horrors and being the victim of many atrocities, the Armenian, the one maiden of the race who lived to tell of the two years' nightmare, came to America to repeat her story. In motion picture form it has been given to the great sympathetic public.

Western Ontario spectators saw it for the first time at the Majestic on Monday. Although there were continuous performances at the standing room only was obtainable at many of the showings.

Although a few incidents, unfit for the civilized eye, were not included in the story, other scenes showing the heinous crimes and the death and passing of the brutal Ottoman leave nothing to be imagined. As the narrative is unfolded before one's eyes, the audience is involuntarily one's fists clench and unclench. From the screen, ravished Armenia seems to be calling for help.

Nestling beneath the shadows of ancient Mount Ararat was the home of Aurora Mardigian, daughter of a wealthy Armenian merchant. On the surrounding slopes the flocks of the kash, a well-to-do young shepherd, grazed. Armenia, although living in dread of its oppressor, Turkey, was a land of industry. Its 1,000,000 people were peace-loving and obedient to their masters. Armenia followed Christ; Turkey worshipped Allah. There was the great dividing line! Convert or exterminate—the Turk's creed was this.

War was declared. England was busy with Germany. Armenia was without a protector. At last the opportunity for which the powers at Constantinople, the city of mosques and minarets built to the glory of Mohammed, had waited, arrived. Under the excuse that Armenia was plotting to aid Russia to crush the Ottoman Empire the sultan and his high officials, approved by Germany, began the crusade against the Christians.

Armenian soldiers were disarmed, forced to dig their own graves, into which they were thrown after their massacre. The children were drowned and bayoneted. Torture, beatings, and heart-breaking, hundreds of thousands of maidens were taken to the harems of desert sands. By day they marched under the lash and taunts of their brutal masters. At night they were ravished by the drunken soldiery. Revolt meant death; submission, worse than death.

Those who were strong in their denial of the Mohammedan faith were crucified and their smelted bodies left as food for the vultures.

Among the sufferers were Aurora and her teacher, Miss Graham, a beautiful English girl. Although they did not suffer this last-mentioned fate, they suffered worse. Roving Kurds captured them and sold them into the harem of a Turkish governor. Here Aurora's sister was stripped and beaten to death before the eyes of her friends, as a warning to all others who would not renounce the Christian faith. The other two girls escaped, but were recaptured. For 50 cents they were offered on the public auction block.

Dressed as an Arab sheik, the shepherd bought them. After stealing horses for the flight, he helped the girls to escape to Pithul, the headquarters of the American mission. Miss Graham and the shepherd remained to take care of refugees who might arrive. Aurora came to America to tell the tale.

A few months ago she appeared in person in Detroit and gave her message to the people.

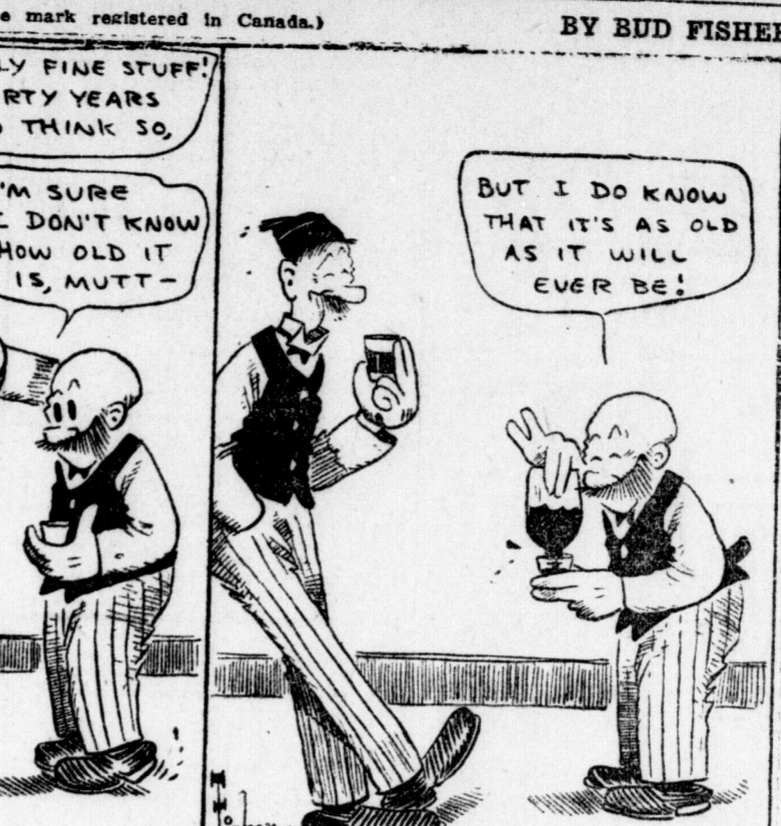

NEW OVERLAND MODEL IS GIVEN DEMONSTRATION ON LONDON STREETS MONDAY

Proves Claims To Roadability—What Is Back of the New Light Car in the Matter of Road and Other Tests—'Fours' Arrive For the Western Fair.

The Overland Four is here. This new model for which so many people have been looking for so long is on exhibition in the automobile building at the Western Fair, the first cars having arrived early yesterday morning, consigned to the local representatives of the Willis-Overland, Limited.

The first demonstration of the car in London was made yesterday and proved a great success. The car used was one in which Mr. F. M. Bethune, Western Ontario representative, drove from Toronto to London on Sunday making a mileage of 23 per gallon of gasoline.

During the extensive road tests of the Overland Four the various points stood out so prominently as to create the highest enthusiasm for the car was its unusual riding quality. Those who participated in the demonstrations declared that they had never enjoyed as much comfort in a light car before.

On the opening day at the Western Fair this new spring suspension was the centre of interest, the crowds that inspected the new models asking Mr. F. D. McLachlin and his staff numerous questions as to the working of this principle.

The pleasing appearance of the cars naturally had much to do with attracting attention to the exhibit, which occupies the southwestern corner of the building, but it was the constructional features that held the interest. And while there are other radical improvements that give the Overland Four what manufacturers call "protected accessibility," the spring suspension with its three-point principle means the most thorough inspection.

FAIR CROWDS OVERFLOW LONDON; GET ST. THOMAS QUARTERS

LIBERALS, HEADED BY M'KENZIE, CRITICIZE VETS; RIDES TO FAIR LEAGUE COVENANT 'MID CHEERING CROWD SOON RELIEVED

City and Officials Turn Out To Welcome Greatest Canadian Soldier.

Opposition House Leader Takes View Issue Needs Careful Consideration Before Signing.

General Says Same Determination That Won War Needed To Win Peace.

OTTAWA, Sept. 8.—Strong Opposition criticism of the league of nations was voiced in the House of Commons today. Generally, as was expected, the criticism centred around the tenth article and the obligations thereunder placed on members of the league to preserve against external aggression the territorial integrity of all members of the league.

"Are we bound henceforth to take part in outside affairs?" queried the acting leader of the Opposition, Canada, Dr. Borden, who is not holding more international obligations without increasing her international responsibilities. "The council of the league of nations is given the right to quelling of disorders in any of the five continents."

Mr. McKenzie took the view, too, that Canada has not yet reached the full status of nationality. "We are not, he argued, "able to declare war and peace." If Canada, as a separate nation, bound herself to the league of nations, she might have to fight even the mother country. Nor would Canada's action in the treaty alter in the slightest degree, submitting it to the Dominion parliament merely "ticked the boxes" of some members and made them feel more important.

Replying for the Government Mr. Sifton, minister of public works, declared that Canada was fully entitled to sit in the peace councils. He described Mr. McKenzie's arguments as "agreeing absolutely with the most conservative representative of the Government of Great Britain, and that the representatives of the conservative people in Great Britain generally are better able to look after this matter than the people of Canada."

The debate was adjourned by Mr. LaPointe of Kamouraska. "The making of war had not been brought about by the Government of Canada, and Canada had no responsibility for the trouble or for the making of the treaty," said Mr. McKenzie, the Opposition leader. "While a Canadian plenipotentiary had no doubt assented, it had not been said that the treaty was a product of the league of the Canadian Government, and whether it was good or bad, it was unnecessary to say that the Government must fall if it was not ratified."

The prime minister, said Mr. McKenzie, had been anxious to make a distinction of a matter which should be considered entirely apart from party feelings.

It was important to consider Canada's status and whether it had been affected in any way either now or in the future. McKenzie stated that in the past had been satisfied with Canada's position without having her take part in the making of the treaty. McKenzie said that the next occasion was at the outbreak of the great war, when on these occasions Canada had acted on their own initiative and of their own free will.

Does It Change Status? One of the questions to be considered in regard to this treaty, said Mr. McKenzie, was whether we were by implication or otherwise giving assent to a document which materially changed our position.

Mr. McKenzie quoted international law and sections of the B. E. A. act to show that Canada would still be regarded in international law as a colony of Britain, and said further that any legislation passed in Canada could be vetoed at any time within two years by the King-in-council.

"We are not in a position to declare war or peace, and therefore cannot be a member of the league of nations," said Mr. McKenzie.

Article eight of the peace treaty, dealing with reduction of armaments, involved a standing army, navy and air force, and this, said Mr. McKenzie, was not the desire of the Canadian people.

In any case, said Mr. McKenzie, the treaty had already been ratified, and there was no need of calling upon the Canadian Government for ratification.

Mr. McKenzie added that Premier Lloyd George, speaking in the British House on July 7, had declared that the peace treaty did not require ratification. Ratification, save in one or two particulars, was for the King.

Turning to the league of nations Mr. McKenzie said it was conceivable that Canada would be brought into a position where she might even have to fight the mother country. If Canada, as a separate nation, bound herself to observe the league covenant and Great Britain, without receiving authority from the league, started a war, Canada would be bound to take part against her.

Depends On Canada. Hon. A. L. Sifton said that he must disagree with the leader of the Opposition on certain constitutional points. As far as the ratification of the treaty was concerned, he had no knowledge of it had yet been ratified by the British Parliament. Sir Robert Borden had promised that the treaty would be submitted to Parliament and ratification for the Dominion of Canada by the King would have to depend upon whether the Canadian Parliament approved or disapproved the treaty.

E. P. Devlin, Wright, asked what nations in particular had objected to Canada taking part in the deliberation. "All five powers," replied Mr. Sifton. "It is necessary that the names be kept secret," asked Mr. Devlin.

Let Us Have Peace. Mr. Sifton said it was not, but giving the names might cause trouble between some of the nations. There was laughter among the Liberal members. Mr. Devlin ended the incident by saying, "Then let us have peace."

Referring to Mr. McKenzie's argument that Canada had no right in the league of nations, Mr. Sifton read a letter signed by Premier Clemenceau of France, Premier George of Great Britain and President Wilson, taking the directly opposite stand.

VILLA'S AGENTS FOMENT INSURRECTION IN SOUTH Thirty Mexican Soldiers Kill Commander of Algodones Garrison.

Yuma, Ariz., Sept. 9.—Discontent among forces of Governor Esteban Cantu, at Algodones, culminated yesterday when officers loyal to the governor declared was a small insurrection. Thirty Mexican soldiers killed Capt. Jose Torres, commander of the Algodones garrison, and Lieut. Cortes, second in command, looted a saloon, stole 32 horses and deserted, according to a report received here last night.

Loyal officers declare the discontent among the men was fomented by agents of Francisco Villa, and that the outbreak is the forerunner of efforts toward a general insurrection throughout Lower California, the Americans said.

SAM GOMPERS FATHER DIES. Boston, Sept. 8.—Solomon Gompers, father of Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, died at his home in the Dorchester district last night.

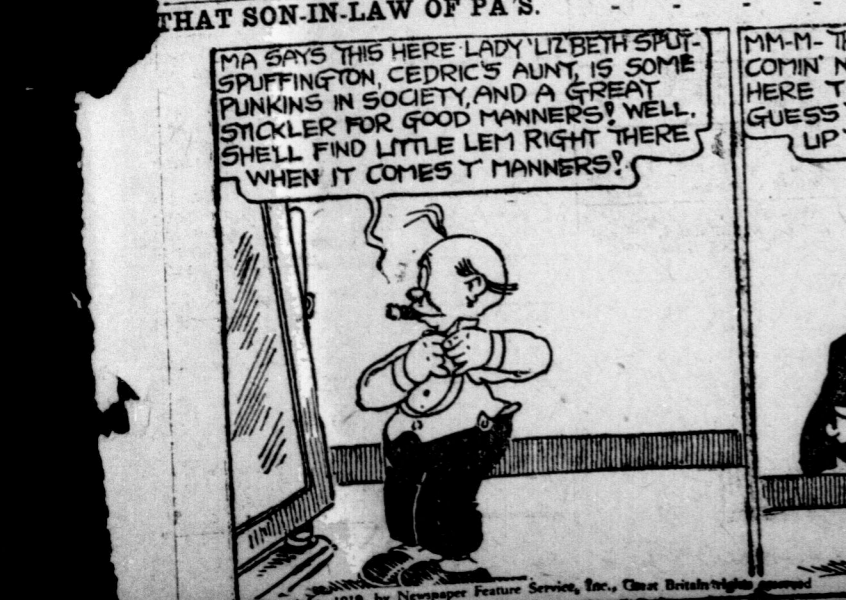

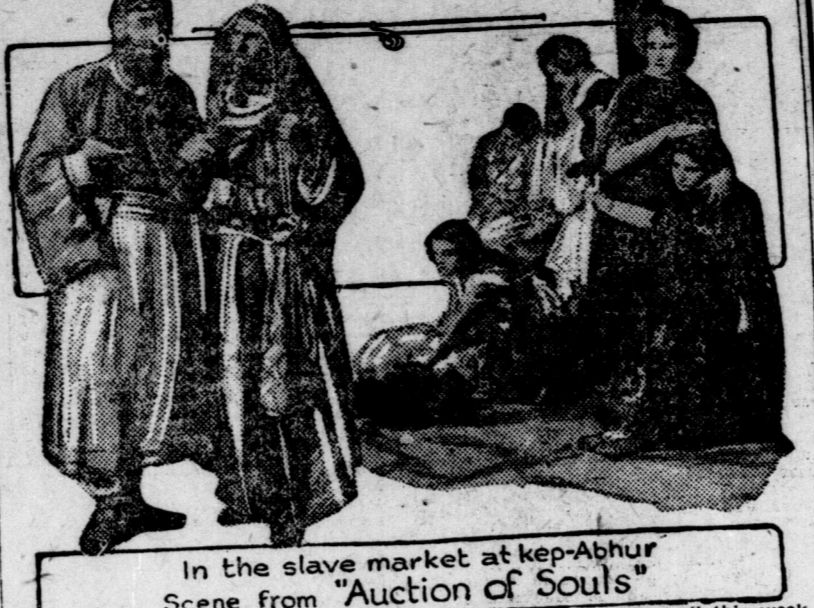

PRINCESS PATS REFUSED TO LEAVE LINE BEFORE MONS; THEY WANTED TO BE IN AT THE FINISH
General Currie Again Justifies Last Hours of Fighting — Leader Greeted With Thunders of Applause at Canadian Club Luncheon—Believes Canada Should Control Her Foreign Policy.

Canada's part in the last hundred days of the war was graciously told by Gen. Sir Arthur Currie to members of the Canadian Club at a luncheon in the Mission Temple Monday.

The luncheon was one of the most largely-attended in the history of the club, more than three hundred members and prominent citizens and military authorities being present to hear the brilliant orator.

"I regard your welcome as a tribute to our fighting men," said Gen. Currie as soon as he could make himself heard. "It is pleasing to me as a Middlesex man to see so many prominent men in the county's capital."

"The Canadians were chosen as the spearhead in this battle of the Somme," he said. "The Germans had driven a strong salient into the allied lines."

"Our objective in this battle was the old trench line, which was 8 to 10 miles long and 1,000 yards wide. The enemy lines were in a great state of confusion."

"The general conduct of the campaign changed our whole campaign," he said. "We were no longer necessary to wait for the Americans. The following day we moved ahead 10,000 yards."

General Currie Retiree Memory.
