Repulsed After Two Days' Fighting On the Yalu.

Shanghai, April 29, 2 p.m.-It is reported here that the Russians have suffered a disastrous repulse after two days' fighting on the Yalu River. The Japanese forces crossed the river and the Russians retreated. BACK AT VLADIVOSTOCK.

Vladivostock, April 29. - The squadron commanded by Rear-Admiral Yes zen has returned here from its recent operations off the Korean coast. Tokio, April 28. — Seventy-three Ja-panese were killed or drowned as a result of the sinking of the Japanes transport Kinshiu-Maru, which was torpedoed by the Russian armed cruiser Rossia, at midnight, Monday last. On April 25 it was announced authortatively from St. Petersburg that the talk of mediation in the Russo-Japanese war was founded upon the personal desires of King Edward and King Christian of Denmark to end the war, and avoid further bloodshed, but that the opening moves had failed utterly. No details of the scheme of mediation were made public beyond the positive statement that whatever had occurred to that end was above the level of cabinets and chancellories and had originated in the personal solicitude of the Emperor's uncle and grandfather. 



One of the submarine boats which were put in commission April 24 was received in sections at Port Arthur before the war began. At the first opportunity it is intended that the sub-marine vessel shall be employed against the heavy ships of the enemy.

AN OPIMISTIC JAP. Liao Yang, April 28. - Major Togo Tatzozera, a member of the general staff of the Japanese army, who is a prisoner here, having been catpured at Wiju, where he had lived since Jan-uary last, said today: "The Russians will be driven as far as Baikal. Fur-ther than that we do not wish to go, but we will return to Manchuria and open it to the trade of the world. Our people are certain that they can beat the Russians, but I think we began hostilities fifty years too soon. We were not prepared for such a serious war. Japan wishes above everything else to command the sea, and she will then be free from fear of invasion and loss of territory. With the complete destruction of the Russian fleet we believe the war will end. Japan's alliance with Great Britain was a stupid act, and will be of no service to us We know perfectly well that the Americans were never our friends, because in the far east they were always our opponents. We are afraid that if Ja-pan is victorious the British and Americans only will benefit. It would be foolish for Japan to ally herself with the United States, because the Americans do not intend to help us, but rather wish to exploit us.
