Panama Canal Tenders.

Washington, Jan. 14.—Proposals opened by the Canal Commission Saturday for the entire construction of the Panama Canal show that the lowest proposal, that of William J. Oliver of Knoxville, Tenn., and Anson M. Bangs of New York City, who offered to do the work for \$6.75 per cent. of the estimated cost falls even lower than had been hoped. Granting that the estimate of \$140,000,000 for the construction of the canal is accurate, the remuneration of the Oliver-Bangs combination would be \$9.450,000 were it awarded the contract. The tenders ranged from 6.75 per cent. to 28 per cent. There were four bids. Mr. Bangs was the contracter for the Soe lock.

Imperial Defence Committee Has De-cided That Project Would Be Pre-judicial to British Security.

London, Jan. 14.—The extensive project for tunneling the English Channel, which is now awaiting Parliamentary approval, — id appear to have received a serious set-back in a report that the Imperial Defence Committee has decided such a tunnel would be prejudicial to the national security.

Enquiries made at the headquarters of the committee, however, failed of confirmation of this announcement. Nevertheless, there is a strong drift of sentiment among the most eminent British military and naval experts, headed by Field Marshal Lord Wolseley, which condemns this project as opening the possibility of continental invasion.

On the other hand the Rothschilds and the great railroads of England and France are prepared to make enormous investment of capital for the carrying out of this project. This makes trouble between strategists and capitalists and the indications are that the former will create sufficient pub-lic apprehension to endanger Parlia-mentary approval of the scheme.

### UNPLEASANT SUSPICIONS

Inquest Into The Cause Of Death Of Thomas Stonefish At Highgate

#### VERDICT IS NOT KNOWN

The inquest into the cause of the death of Thomas Stonefish, the Indian who was killed on the reserve near Highgate on Saturday last, was held last night at Highgate. It has not yet been learned in this city what verdict was brought in.

The evidence as given at the inquest went to show that the deceased with his brother, Daniel Stonefish, were out on the reserve shooting mink. They scared up a mink and the two of them were in pursuit of it when the deceased met his death. The brother claimed that Thomas was running along carrying a rifle when he fell and in some way the gun went off, and the bullet entered the back of his neck. It is possible that a man could shoot himself in the back of the neck, but the suspicion was aroused in the minds of some that it was also improbable. 





THE FORGOTTEN DEAD.

There Are Few English Tombston

Some years ago there was a corre-pondence in the papers, the main ar-ument being that there were very few tombstones in the open—that is, outside of a church—which could show a record of over 200 years. Doubtless there are many tombstones of a far greater age, but most of these are now undecipherable from the perishing material used or have sunk deep into the earth, in which case there can be small doubt as to the inscriptions having be-

come obliterated.

The oldest record I have come across was at Godshill churchyard, near Ventnor, where the visitor can see legibly inscribed, "Annie Garde, 1592," but probably some of your readers may know of tombstones bearing an earlier date. The most surprising number of old tombstones clustered together are possibly those grouped at Bonchurch, Isle of Wight, these ranging from 1616 to 1702. In all there are seven, having inscribed, "Annie Garde, 1592," these dates: 1616, 1619, 1620, 1627, 1646, 1687, 1702.

So far—that is, during a three years' search—I have found tombstones of the seventeenth century at Godshill, Bonchurch, Brading and St. Lawrence (Ventnor), in the Isle of Wight; at Wuteringbury, in Kent, where there are several in excellent order; at Tonbridge Bristol, Ipswich, Harwich, Southwold, Colwyn Bay (old parish churchyard), and at Millbrook, near Southampton.

"THE ARABIAN NIGHTS."

Sir Richard Burton's Translation of

the Tales.
"The Arabian Nights" was first introduced to Europe by a Frenchman named Galland, and the first English versions were simply translations of his. Then a Dr. Scott gave a very superior edition, "occasionally corrected from the Arabic." In 1839, however, appeared an English translation entirely from the Arabic, with copious notes and illustrations. It was Edward William Lane's, a gerst' man whose long residence in Egypt had fully qualified him for his work. This translation may be said to have held the field until the appearance of one by Sir Rich ard Burton. Sir Richard was a daring and successful traveler, who had a re-markable facility in acquiring eastern languages. Le performed a pilgrim-age to Mecca disguised as a pilgrim, a feat as difficult as it was daring. In 1872 he was appointed to the post of British consul at Triest. Here he applied his knowledge of Arabic to making a faithful translation of "The Arabian Nige's Entertainments," supplementing his work with copious notes and terminal essays which have been called a mine of curious and diverting information. Its publication caused a great sensation. Details were freely great sensation. Details were freely given that had previously been suppressed. But the accuracy of the translation as a whole was candidly acknowledged, and Burton may be credited with having made into the English language the finest translation of these wonderful Arabian tales.—London Augusts. don Answers.



### ATTACKED BY **RUSSIAN PRESS**

New Loan Necessary To Balance \$120,100,000 Deficit

RUSSIA'S BIG BUDGET

St. Petersburg, Jan. 15.—The previsional budget for 1907, showing that it will again be necessary to resort to credit operations to balance the deficit of \$120,100,000 between the estimated receipts and expenditures, is attacked by the Russian press on all sides. Only The Novoe Vremya is silent. Radical papers devote their attention to the political features.

The Bourse Gazette strongly criticizes the budget's figures, declaring that the deficit is almost \$250,000,000, adding that reliance on the old system of "debauching the people with alcohol instead of developing the economic resources of the country" is the chief characteristic of the new budget.

alcohol instead of developing the economic resources of the country" is the chief characteristic of the new budget.

Continuing, the newspaper points out that the only good showing made is in the increase of the revenue from the Vodka menopoly, from which \$52,000,000 more than in 1906 is expected, and contrasts this sum with the \$2,750,000 appropriated for the institution of universal education, appearing for the first time in a Russian budget. The slight excess of the ordinary income over the expenditures is unsatisfactory because of the always expectable unforeseen expenses.

"Provisions for the payment of the war expenses and famine relief," the newspaper adds, "cannot be avoided, but Parliament must use the pruning shears remorselessly on other items and cut every possible copeck in order to reduce the loan.

"The published statements include two distinct sets of figures: First, the yearly calculation of expenditures based on the preceding budget, in addition to the unavoidable new expenditures, for which temporary monthly credits are assigned until the convocation of Parliament; second, the preliminary estimates to regulate the budget of 1907, which will be effective after the approval of Parliament, with retroactive effect for the elapsed months. Parliament has the power to modify the various items. The Liberals certainly will attempt to cut the increased sums assigned for the mintenance of the police and other instruments of repression."

The statement regarding the necessity for a new loan caused surprise on account of the repeated semi-official declarations that a deficit was not contemplated in the new budget, but it is now explained that this referred to the regular and not to the extraordinary receipts and expenditure. The deficit is almost exactly half that foreseen in 1906, amounting to \$240,500,000.

Sunday night there were two affrays, in which the police had one man killed and a lieutenant, a sergeant and a patrolman wounded. Ten members of the fighting legion were captured.

The most serious affair occurred in the centre of the respectable residence quarter on Basil Island. A detachment of police, which attempted to storm a suspected dwelling, was met with continuous volleys from revolvers and rifles, and was finally compelled to withdraw with the loss of three men. A force of infantry was summoned, and after several volleys the revolutionists on St. Petersburg Island was repulsed. A policeman was wounded, and the garrison escaped in the darkness before the arrival of the troops, which had been summoned.
