

PROVINCE OF CANADA.

That portion of the continent of America which is now called Canada was discovered seven years after the discovery of America, by John and Sebastian Cabot. It subsequently came into the possession of the French, who governed the country by Commanders, Governors and Presidents till the year 1759. In that year, under Mr. Pitt's administration, the French territories in America were attacked by the British, and the attempt to conquer Canada was at last successful. It was in this struggle that General Wolfe lost his life and gained for his country the American Gibraltar—Quebec—which has ever since remained in its possession.

On the 8th September, 1760, the capitulation which transferred Canada, from the Gulf of St. Lawrence to the unknown west, was signed. The Treaty of Paris, by which Canada was formally ceded to the British Crown, was signed on the tenth of February, 1763. From the overthrow of the French dominion in Canada to the division of the Province into upper and lower sections, the colony experienced many vicissitudes. Many petty quarrels arose between the old French colonists and the new settlers of British origin. In 1774 a new order of things was instituted by the British Government, having for its object the tranquilization of the French and encouragement of British emigration. In the same year an Act was passed by which the limits of the Province were greatly extended, and made to include a large portion of what is now the United States, as far as the Mississippi. All this was lost during the revolutionary war between Britain and her thirteen colonies.

During this struggle Canada refused to co-operate with the insurgents. Consequent upon this refusal the revolutionists determined upon a double invasion of Canada, by way of Lake Champlain and the Kennebec River. In 1776 the Province was evacuated, and no further attempt was commenced against Canada. The war between Britain and her colonies was brought to a close in February, 1783, at which time the treaty of Verseilles was signed, recognizing the independence of that section. From that time Canada began to prosper, retarded only by the difference of British and French customs, religion and notions of government, which at last became so serious as to lead to the passing of the "Constitutional Act of 1791," by which Act the Province of Quebec was divided into Upper and Lower Canada.

Canada now found itself in possession of the fourth form of government within the short space of thirty-two years. From 1770 to 1773 it was ruled by

martial law; from 1773 to 1774 a tyrannical military government prevailed; from 1774 to 1791 a civil government of the most despotic caste was established, and in 1792 a new constitution was introduced, establishing freedom of

election and responsibility to the people.

On the 17th of December, 1792, the first Upper Canadian parliament was convened at Niagara. By an Act of this Parliament (1792) the names of the four Upper Canada districts were changed into Eastern, Midland, Home and Western. An Act was also passed for the building of a gaol and court house in each of these districts. During the administration of John Graves Simcoe, the first governor of Upper Canada, an act was passed dividing the Province into nineteen counties, viz : Addington, Dundas, Durham, Essex, Frontenac, Glengarry, Grenville, Hastings, Kent, Leeds, Lennox, Lincoln, Norfolk, Northumberland, Ontario, Prince Edward, Stormont, Suffolk and York. Simcoe gave the Thames its name.

From 1792 till the breaking out of the war of 1812 the following governors, lieutenant-governors and presidents administered the affairs of the Province :

The second session of the Upper Canadian Parliament was held by the Hon. P. Russell at York, at that time inhabited by only twelve families. During the administration of Lieut.-Governor F. Gore a Bill was passed determining the boundaries of the different townships, and also an Act to establish public schools in every district of the Province (1807).

Four years after this the first census of Upper Canada was taken, when the population amounted to 77,000. In the war of 1812 Major-General Brock was killed, and General Roger Sheaffe succeeded to the civil and military command. Canada was evacuated by the Americans on the fifth of November, 1814, and the Treaty of Ghent was signed on the 24th of December following; thus after two years fighting the war between Britain and the United States, in which both Upper and Lower Canada gave effectual proof of their loyalty to the Mother Country, came to an end, without any advantage being gained by either From 1814 to 1829 the country was agitated by of the contending parties. disputes between the "Family Compact" and the Reformers. It was at this time (1825) that the office of the Colonial Advocate, owned by William Lyon McKenzie, was destroyed by a mob, to whom his conduct had become distasteful. The struggle between the Reformers and Tories at last resulted in the unfortunate Rebellion of 1837. On the 23rd of July, 1840, the Union Bill, passed by both Houses the January previous, received the sanction of the Queen, and came into operation on the 10th of February, 1841. The history of Canada,

from the re-union of the Provinces down to the present time, is marked by many improvements and events that are fresh in the memory of all, and need not be here repeated.

GEOGRAPHICAL OUTLINE.

The Province of Canada extends in an easterly direction from near the Red River Settlement to the Gulf of St. Lawrence, and from Michigan to New Brunswick. It extends northward from the Canadian Lakes and the St. Lawrence to the high ridge of land which separates the rivers of Canada from those of the Hudson Bay section of the Hudson Bay Rerritory. It is bounded north by the Hudson Bay Territory, east by the Gulf of St. Lawrence, south by the States of Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont and New York, and Lakes Erie and Ontario, and west by Lakes St. Clair, Huron and Superior, and the northwest Indian Territories.

The area is 390,000 square miles, of which 210,000 are included in Canada East, and 180,000 in Canada West.

By the Census of 1861 the population of Canada East was 1,110,664, Canada West 1,396,091.

The principal rivers are the St. Lawrence, which drains an area of 565,000 square miles; the Ottawa, 450 miles long, which forms a central boundary between the two sections of the Province; the St. Maurice, nearly 400 miles in length; the Saguenay, 100 miles long, noted for its fine scenery; the Richelieu, the Niagara and others. Upper Canada has for its southern and western boundaries, five great lakes—Superior, Huron, St. Clair, Erie, and Ontario, and Georgian Bay, of which the total length is 1085 miles, and area 89,000 square miles. In some parts of the Province, especially in the Eastern Townships, the scenery is extremely picturesque.

In Upper Canada the surface is undulating, rather than mountainous. A main water shed separates the waters of the St. Lawrence from those of the Ottawa.

SUMMARY.

With a view to show the increase in the population of Upper Canada, from the beginning of the present century, we submit the following calculations:—1800, 57,738; 1810, 73,492; 1820, 119,645; 1825, 158,027; 1830, 221,567; 1835, 346,165; 1840, 437,441; 1842, 486,055; 1848, 723,332; 1850, 791,420; 1852, 950,330; 1861, 1,396,091. The estimated population in 1864, assuming the same rate of increase as between 1852 and 1861, would be 1,586,150.

It will thus be seen that the natural advantages possessed by Canada, have a steadily increasing population to develope them. Having an area of 121,260 square miles, with thousands of acres of valuable lands yet unsurveyed on its northern and western boundaries, with municipal, political, and educational in-

stitutions second to those of no other country in the world, we may certainly predict a bright future for our country.

With a view to exhibit the progress made by Upper Canada, we give the following statistics: Upper Canada had, in 1851, 99,906 occupiers of land. They numbered, in 1861, 131,983. It produced, in 1851, 12,685,550 bushels of wheat; 11,391,867 of oats; 9,982,186 of potatoes; 3,110,118 of turnips; of flax or hemp, 59,680 lbs; 3,669,874 lbs, of maple sugar. Its produce of these articles were, in 1861—wheat, 24,260,425 bushels; oats, 21,220,874; potatocs, 15,325,920; turnips, 18,206,959; flax or hemp, 1,225,934 lbs; maple sugar, 6,370,605 lbs. The value of the live stock in Upper Canada was, in 1861, as much as \$53,227,486; its agricultural implements, \$11,280,347; its farms, \$295,162,315.

In 1808, the value of the entire trade of Canada was about \$8,400,000. The value reached, in 1852—exports, \$14,055,973; imports, \$20,286,493; total, \$34,342,466. In 1861, its imports amounted to \$36,614,195; exports, \$43,046,823; total, \$79,661,013. The value of the trade with the United States alone was, in the last of these years, \$35,455,815; the imports from that country reaching \$21,099,388, and the exports to it \$14,386,427.

In 1851, the net revenue yielded by the customs was \$2,808,831; in 1861, \$4,411,160. The value of Books imported was, in 1850, \$243,580; in 1861, \$5,056,943.

On roads, navigation, and railroads, the Province has expended as much as \$60,000,000, over and above the interest in the latter of parties out of the country. There are in use at this moment between 1,809 and 1,900 miles of railway; besides 3,422 of electric telegraph, belonging to the Montreal Telegraph Company, which had, in 1861, a capital stock of \$400,000 (to which it had advanced from \$60,000, in 1847,) employed 400 persons (35 in 1847,) and conveyed 300,000 messages; the number conveyed in 1847 having been 33,000.

Our post-offices have multiplied from 3, in 1766, to 69, in 1824; 601, in 1850 and 1,698 in 1860. The number of miles of established post roads was, in the first of these years, 170; in the second, 1,992; in the third, 7,595; and in the last, 14,202. The miles travelled were, in 1765, 366; in 1824, 616; in 1851, 2,287,000; in 1860, 5,712,000. In 1852, 3,700,000 letters were transmitted; in 1860, 9,000,000. The expenditure of the Post-Office was, in the former of these years, \$276,191, and its revenue \$230,629; in the latter, its expenditure was \$534,681, and its revenue \$658,451. One hundred and ten thousand dollars additional is paid per annum, by way of subsidy, to railroads; and four hundred and sixteen thousand to steamships,

The population of United Canada numbered in the year 1800, 240,000. It was in 1825, 581,920; by 1851 it had reached 1,842,265. In 1861, it amounted to 2,506,755. The advance in Upper Canada between 1825 and 1861 has been from 581,027, to 1,396,091—not much less than 800 per cent. in 46 years.

In 1831, the number of cultivated acres in the whole of Canada, Upper and Lower, was 2,884,345. It came up, in 1844, to 4,968,408; and in 1851, to 7,300,837.

NORTHUMBERLAND AND DURHAM.

PROVINCE OF CANADA.

These counties are bounded on the north by the Counties of Victoria and Peterborough, on the east by the County of Hastings, on the south by Lake Ontario, and on the west by the County of Ontario.

They contain nineteen municipalities, besides the towns of Cobourg, Bowmanville, and Port Hope, viz: the townships of Alnwick, Hamilton, S. Monaghan, Haldimand, Brighton, Crahame, Percy, Seymour, and Murray, in the County of Northumberland, and Cavan, Manvers, Darlington, Hope, Clarke, Cartwright, and Colborne. The incorporated villages are Newcastle and Brighton.

The counties are well watered by numerous small streams which traverse them in every direction, some running southward into Lake Ontario, and others running north and east, irrigating the soil and affording abundant water power for every purpose. In the County of Northumberland the soil is generally a sandy loam, especially the portion between Lake Ontario and Rice Lake. Along Lake Ontario it is principally clay with a dark loam of about a foot deep. It is well timbered with pine, oak, cedar, beech, maple, basswood and ash.

The soil in the County of Durham is chiefly a clayey loam, well adapted to the cultivation of the different kinds of grain. It is well watered by numerous streams, the principal of which is Smith's Creek, which enters Lake Ontario at Port Hope. The timber the same as that of Northumberland.

Some of the townships in the Counties of Northumberland and Durham commenced settling as early as the year 1797, since which time great progress has been effected, particularly in those which border on Lake Ontario. They are now in a good state of cultivation, and contain some enterprising and flourishing towns and villages, which will be noticed in another part of this work.

The favorable position of these counties for commerce, having good ports and harbors, extensive facilities for manufactures, and a rich soil, renders them particularly well fitted to reward the enterprise of those who may engage in the different branches of busines, trade, and manufactures, not to mention the inducements offered by the means of transportation afforded by the different lines of railways which are in successful operation within their limits.

The township of Darlington, in which the town of Bowmanville is situated, contained only about 350 inhabitants in 1829, while in 1850 it had increase to 7289. In the same year there were upwards of 23,000 acres under cultivation, which yielded 169,000 bushels of wheat, 73,000 bushels of oats, 17,000 bushels of peas, besides abundance of other grains and roots. The township of Cartwright is situated immediately north of Darlington, and was some time

later in being settled and improved. It had only a population of about 400 in 1842. The census of 1850 shewed an increase of a thousand inhabitants, with over four times the quantity of land under cultivation. The northern part of the township is occupied by Lake Scugog, but the remaining part is well adapted for cultivation. The next township west of Darlington is Clarke, which began its settlement at an early period, and has made great progress. Tre soil is generally a rich sandy loam, heavily timbered with hardwood, and intersected in different directions with fertilizing streams. In 1842 there were 2832 inhabitants and 19,000 acres under cultivation; in the next eight years the population had doubled, and the lands cultivated increased in proportion. The principal village is Newcastle, situated in the south-east part of the township. Nearly north of Clarke is the township of Manvers, smaller in extent and not so well settled. The soil is pretty good and the timber generally a The population in 1842 was only 697; in mixture of hardwood and pine. 1850 it had increased to over 2,000. The number of acres under cultivation in the latter year was about 7369. The return of agricultural products for the same year show evident marks of progress. The township of Hope is immediately west of Clarke, and contains the flourishing town of Port Hope, a full description of which will be found in another part of this work. land is rolling and occasionally hilly; the soil a fine sandy loam, occasionally mixed with gravel. In the northern part of the townships the timber is chiefly hardwood, while on the shore of the Lake it changes into pine, with a very little mixture of hardwood. Hope is well cleared and settled. the township along with the town of Port Hope contained only 4432 inhabitants, while in 1850 the township alone contained a greater population. Nearly north of Port Hope is the township of Cavan. In 1850 it contained 4198 inhabitants, four grist mills, and nine saw mills, and there were upwards of 2,000 acres under cultivation.

A leading road runs through each of these townships in the county of Durham to the Lake. The township of South Monaghan is in the county of North-It is bounded on the east and south by the Otonebee River and umberland. Rice Lake. It is a small township, and contains a considerable portion of low land. In 1845 there were 900 inhabitants, and about 7,000 acres under cultivation. The township of Hamilton, directly south, in the same county, contains Cobourg, the county town of the united counties. The township progressed rapidly after its settlement, and attained a population of over 4,000 inhabitants in 1850. A considerable portion of the centre and northern part of Hamilton consisted of oak plains. The land is generally rolling, rising as you recede from the Lake. The township of Haldimand, in soil and timber resembles that of Hamilton. Its settlement began about the year 1797. In 1817 lands sold at from two to three dollars per acre. The population in 1842 was 2826, and in 1850, 4177, with about 7,000 acres under cultivation in the latter year. West of Haldimand is Crahame, which contains the village of Colborne and

part of the village of Brighton. This township was heavily timbered, which formed the principal source of wealth to the early inhabitants. In 1842 there were 15,400 acres under cultivation, and in 1850 only a little over 16,642. The increase in population exhibits the rate of progress. The most westerly township in the county of Northumberland is Murray, which consists principally of rolling lands, and the timber a mixture of hardwood and pine, while the northern part of the township consists of oak plains. The soil and face of the township of Murray is exceedingly diversified. In 1842 it had a population of nearly 3,000 and only 13,000 acres under cultivation. In 1850 the population had increased to 5,000, while the number of acres under cultivation was about the same as in 1842. The township cannot be said to have made much progress in agriculture for a long time after its settlement. North-north-west of Murray is the township of Seymour. It is traversed by the river Trent, and is also watered by the Marmora and other streams. The timber is a mixture of hardwood and pine, and the land rather low and wet. In 1842 Seymour contained 1899 inhabitants, which, in 1850, had increased to over 2,000. number of acres under cultivation in 1850 was 8,000. To the west of Seymour is the township of Percy, bounded on the north by the river Trent and watered by several of its tributaries. The population in 1842 was 200, and in 1850 2,000, with about 5,000 acres under cultivation. To the west of Percy is a small, triangular township called Alnwick, bounded on the north and west by Rice Lake. In 1840 2,000 acres in this township were granted to the Messessaga Indians by Sir John Colborne. In 1850 it contained 691 inhabitants, 175 of whom were Indians. There were about 2,000 acres under cultivation. Besides the townships above mentioned, there is a new township called Brighton, in the county of Northumberland, of which no early or separate returns are consequently made.

EDUCATIONAL.

In the very important matter of education, great progress has been effected in the Counties of Northumberland and Durham, and they have now the advantage of a liberal and permanent provision for the general and thorough education of their rising population, fully enjoying the privileges and benefits conferred by the excellent School Act for Upper Canada (13th and 14th Vic., cap. 48, 1850). The reports of the Local Superintendents of Schools for the Counties in general, indicate a growing interest in the subject of education, and a steady progress in the different sections and townships that is highly satisfactory. Each township is divided into school sections of a suitable extent for one school, and in each of these three trustees, are elected to manage its school affairs. Each school and municipal corporation desirous of establishing free public libraries, is aided by the Educational Department granting one hundred per cent on local appropriations, and supplying books from the depository in connection with the department.

Grammar Schools.—Each of these schools (which form the intermediate link between the Common Schools and the Universities,) is managed by a board of trustees appointed by the county council. There is one grammar school in each county town, which receives at least \$400 per annum from the government, and when the funds will admit of it, others may be established in different parts of the county.

There are six grammar schools in the United Counties of Northumberland and Durham—one in Cobourg, Port Hope, Bowmanville, Brighton, Colborne, and Newcastle. Altogether an excellent and well-organized system of schools and churches has been planted amongst the settlers, and such as had been the blessing of their earlier days and the pride of their fathers.

Common Schools—Receipts and Expenditure of Common School Moneys.

—1. The amount appropriated and paid by the Department of Public Instruction from the Legislative grant for the salaries of Teachers for 1864, was, in the County of Northumberland, \$3,865; in the County of Durham, \$3,585; for the Town of Cobourg, \$574; Port Hope, \$478; Bowmanville, \$312; for the Village of Brighton, \$135; Colborne, \$92; Newcastle, \$118.

2. The amount apportioned and paid for the purchase of maps, apparatus, prizes, and libraries, being in proportion and equal to the amount expended from local sources, was, for the County of Northumberland, \$178.04; for the County of Durnam, \$132.23; for the Town of Cobourg, \$12.

3. The law requires that each municipality shall provide a sum by assessment at least equal to the legislative grant, but each municipality can provide as large an additional sum as it may think proper for school purposes. The amount provided by municipal assessment, was, for the County of Northumberland, \$3,844; County of Durham, \$3.585; for the Town of Cobourg, \$2,740; Port Hope, \$1,900; for the Village of Brighton, \$835; Colborne, \$1,062.50; Newcastle, \$650; Bowmanville, \$1,556.74.

4. As the council in a municipality, so the trustees in a school section, have authority to provide money for the support of their school or schools by assessment, and also by fees on pupils, unless the rate-payers decide in favor of a free school. The amount of assessment levied by trustees in addition to the levy by the municipal councils, was \$19,887.37 for the County of Northumberland, \$19,065 for Durham, \$142 13 for the Town of Cobourg, for Port Hope, for Bownanville.

Rate-bill fees on pupils are only imposed where the schools are not free.
 The amount of rate-bills imposed, was, for Northumberland, \$2,029.18; Durham, \$2,954.60; Town of Cobourg, \$664.37; Port Hope, \$805.82; Bowmanville, \$228.70; Newcastle, \$100.

6. The amount received by trustees from the Clergy Reserve Fund and other sources and appropriated for the counties, was, for Northumberland, \$2,161.58; Durham, \$2,337.43; Bowmanville, \$87.96; Brighton, \$40.75; Colborne, \$47.25.

7. The amount available in 1863 from the balances of 1862, was, for Northumberland, \$3,035.46; Durham, \$1,942.11; Cobourg, \$9.18; Bowmanville, \$36; Brighton, \$455.94; Colborne, \$15.35; Newcastle, \$107.30.

8. The total receipts for common school purposes for the year 1862, was, in the County of Northumberland, \$35,000.63; Durham, \$33,601; for the Town of Cobourg, \$1.754; Bowmanville, \$2,267.25; Port Hope, \$3,188.82; Village of Brighton, \$1,466.69; Colborne; \$1,217.10; Newcastle, \$1,000.

EXPENDITURE.—9. The amount paid the salaries of teachers, was, in Northumberland, \$27,045.28; Durham, \$25,478.38; Cobourg, \$2,924.63; Bowmanville, \$1,194; Port Hope, \$2,460; Brighton, \$723.34; Colborne, \$876; Newcastle, \$717.75.

10. The amount expended in the purchase of maps, apparatus, prize books, and libraries, was, for Northumberland, \$399.83; Durham, \$324.38; Bowmanville, \$91.31; Cobourg, \$330.40; Port Hope, \$; Colborne, \$1.65; Newcastle, \$50.

11. The amount expended for school books, stationery, fuel, and other expenses, was, for Northumberland, \$2,182.86; Durham, \$1.847.99; for the Town of Cobourg, \$271.15; Bowmanville, \$718.92; Brighton Village, \$96.78; Colborne, \$136.92; Newcastle, \$0.25.

 The amount expended for the purchase of school-sites and the erection of school-houses, was, for Northumberland, \$1,189.92; Durham. \$2,169.06.

The amount paid for the rents and repairs of school houses, was, for Northumberland, \$677; Durham, \$335.48; Bowmanville, \$254.96; Cobourg, \$401.98; Port Hope, \$230; Brighton, \$73.67; Colborne, \$13.93; Newcastle, \$70.

14. Unexpended balances of the preceding years, were, for Northumberland, \$3,505.74; Durham, \$3,446.64; Town of Cobourg, \$13.52; Bowmanville, \$7.87; Brighton, \$572.90; Colborne, \$53.85; Newcastle, \$162.30. These balances are rather apparent than real, arising from the fact that many of the municipal councils and trustees do not, until after the close of the civil year, collect the sums necessary to pay the expenses of such year.

15. The total expenditure in behalf of the common schools, was, in Northumberland, \$31,494.89; Durham, \$30,155.29; Town of Bowmanville, \$2,259.18; Cobourg, \$4,128.16; Port Hope, \$3,183.82; Brighton, \$893.79; Colborne, \$1,163.25; Newcastle, \$838.

School. Population—Pupils attending Common Schools.—An act still unrepealed requires the legal returns of school population to include only school children between the ages of 5 and 16 years, but the law secures to all persons from 5 to 21 years of age the right of attending the schools; so long as their conduct conforms to its rules and discipline.

The school population (including only children between 5 and 16 years of age), was, in Northumberland, 9,907; Purham, 9,050; Town of Bowmanville, 500; Cobourg, 1,055; Port Hope, 1,100; Village of Brighton, 330; Colborne, 300; Newcastle, 240.

2. The number of pupils attending the schools from 5 to 16 years of age, was, in Northumberland, 8,285; Durham, 7,469; Bowmanville, 322; Cobourg, 752; Port Hope, 873; Brighton, 285; Colborne, 154; Newcastle, 155. The number of pupils of other ages attending the schools, was, in Durham, 613; Northumberland, 742; Cobourg, 15; Port Hope, 25; Brighton, 12; Coborne, 20; Newcastle, 9. The total number of pupils attending school, was, in Northumberland, 9,027; Durham, 8,082; Bowmanville, 322; Cobourg, 767; Port Hope, 898; Brighton, 297; Colborne, 174; Newcastle, 164.

3. The number of boys in the schools, was, in Northumberland, 4,763; Durham, 4,415; Town of Bowmanville, 187; Cobourg, 447; Port Hope; 479; Brighton, 147; Colborne, 102; Newcastle, 93. The number of girls, was, in Northumberland, 4,264; Durham, 3,667; Bowmanville, 135; Cobourg, 320; Port Hope, 419; Brighton, 120; Colborne, 72; Newcastle, 71. The different branches of instruction taught, are, reading, writing, arithmetic, grammar, general and Canadian geography, history, book-keeping, mensuration, algebra, geometry, natural philosophy, vocal music, linear drawing, needle-work, and other studies.

ROMAN CATHOLIC SCHOOLS.—There is one separate school in Cobourg. Amount received for legislative school grant, including the amount for 1862, \$118. The amount received from separate school supporters, \$115.92. Total amount received from all sources, \$376.05.

Expenditure.—Total amount paid to teachers, and for maps, apparatus, &c., \$376.05.

Grammar Schools—Reckipts.—1. The amount of legislative grant and fund apportioned and paid for master's salary, (received from January 1st to December 31st,) for Bowmanville, \$348; Cobourg, \$975; Port Hope, \$500; Brighton, \$205; Colborne, \$305; Newcastle, \$242.09.

The amount received from the legislative grant and fund apportioned for the purchase of maps, apparatus, and prize books, was, for Port Hope, \$50.

3. The amount received from local sources, was, from Cobourg, Port Hope, \$500; Bowmanville, \$491.26; Brighton, \$10; Colborne, \$200. From balances and other sources, was, for Cobourg, Port Hope, \$50; Brighton, \$47.

4. Total receipts for grammar school purposes for 1863—Cobourg, \$1,586.95; Port Hope, \$1,915.43; Bowmanville, \$997.78; Brighton, \$511.80; Colborne, \$639.50; Newcastle, \$242.

Number of pupils attending each school—Cobourg, 38; Port Hope, 130; Bowmanville, \$8; Brighton, 35; Colborne, 49; Newcastle, 58.

The various text books used and read in the schools are Lennie's English Grammar, Edinburgh Academy Latin Grammar, with other Latin text books; Arnold's and Anthon's Greek Grammars, and Xenophen's Reading Book, French Grammar and Reading Book; in arithmetic, Irish national, and Sangster's national, with Algebra; Euclid, geography and history, text and reading books.

APPEALS TO THE CHIEF SUPERINTENDENT OF EDUCATION .- All parties concerned in the operations of the grammar and common school law, have the right of appeal to the Chief Superintendent of Education, and he is authorized to decide such questions as are not otherwise provided for by law. But, for the ends of justice, to prevent delay and save expense, it will be necessary for any party thus appealing: 1st, to furnish the party against whom they may appeal with a correct copy of their communication to the Chief Superintendent, in order that such party may have an opportunity of transmitting any explanation or answer deemed expedient. 2nd, to state expressly, in the appeal, that the opposite party has been thus notified; as it must not be supposed that the Chief Superintendent will decide, or form an opinion on any point affecting different parties, without hearing both sides-whatever delay may at any time be occasioned in order to secure such hearing. Application for advice in Common School matters should, in all cases, be first made to the Local Superintendent having jurisdiction in the municipality.

JUDICIARY OF THE COUNTIES OF NORTHUMBERLAND AND DURHAM.

County Court.—This Court is presided over by a resident Judge in every county. Their jurisdiction extends to all personal actions, where the debt or damage claimed do not exceed \$200, and to all suits relating to debt, covenant, or contract, where the amount is ascertained by the acts of the parties, or signature of the defendant, to \$400; and to all bail bonds and recognizances of bail given in the county court to any amount; but not to cases involving the title to lands, validity of wills, or actions for libel and slander, crim. con., or seductioe. An appeal lies to either of the superior courts of law. These courts also possess equity powers, to the amount of \$200, subject to an appeal to the court of chancery. Officers of court:—Judge, G. M. Boswell; Clerk, R. F. Chatterton.

COURT OF QUARTER SESSIONS.—For the trial of issue of fact and the assessment of damages, on the second Tuesday in March, June, September, and December in each year. G. M. Boswell, chairman.

SURROGATE COURT.—The jurisdiction of these courts relate to all testamentary matters and causes, and to the granting or revoking of probate of wills and letters of administration of the effects of deceased persons having estate or effects in Upper Canada, and all matters arising out of or connected with the grant or revocation of probate or administration, subject to an appeal to the court of chancery. The county judges are also judges of the surrogate court, Judge, G. M. Boswell; Registrar, M. D. Whitehead.

Law Circuits.—The counties of Northumberland and Durham belong to the Midland circuit.

DIVISION COURTS.—For the summary disposal of cases by the judge; but a jury of five persons may be demanded in certain cases. Their jurisdiction extends to actions of debt or contract amounting to £100; injuries or torts to personal chattels amounting to £40; but not actions for gambling debts, liquors, etc., or any toll, custom or franchise, will or settlement, ma-

licious prosecution, libel, slander, crim. con., seduction, or breach of promise, or actions against a J. P., for anything done by him in the execution of his office, if he objects to it. Courts are held once in two months in each division, or oftener, at the discretion of the judge. The divisions are established by the courts of Quarter Session. G. M. Boswell, Judge.



The Township of Haldimand is bounded on the North by Alnwick, West, by Hamilton, and East by Cramahe. It was first settled in the year 1797, and 6,258 acres were under cultivation in 1817. The township of Murray is bounded on the north by Seymour, west by Brighton, and east by the township of Sidney, County of Hastings. The land is principally rolling, and is timbered by a mixture of hardwood and pine. In 1842 it contained 2,765 inhabitants. In 1850, 13,332 acres were under cultivation; two grist mills and fourteen saw mills were in operation. In 1861 the population numbered 3,612; of these 142 were natives of England and Wales; 45 natives of Scotland; 317 natives of Ireland; 2,942 natives of Canada not of French origin; 37 of French origin,; 114 natives of the United States; 3 natives of Nova Scotia; 3 natives of the West Indies.

The township of Cartwright is bounded on the North by Mariposa, County of Victoria; on the West by part of the County of Ontario; on the South by Darlington; and on the East by Manvers. The soil of Cartwright is generally a rich loam, and is timbered by hard wood. In 1850 the population numbered 1,558, and in 1861 it increased to 2,727, of whom 226 were natives of England and Wales; 48 natives of Scotland; 697 natives of Ireland; 1,733 natives of Canada not of French origin; and 20 natives of the United States.

COBOURG.

Cobourg is the county town and judicial seat of the united counties of Northumberland and Durham. It is advantageoutly situated in a broad and level valley facing the Lake. It is also on the line of the Grand Trunk Railway, of which it is an important station; and also the southern terminus of the Peterboro' & Cobourg Railway. It is distant from Port Hope 7 miles; from Kingston 110 miles by water, and 100 miles by rail; from Toronto 70 miles; from Peterboro' 24 miles, and from Rochester, N. Y., sixty miles, with which it has daily communication by boat.

The streets of the town are broad and well laid out, and the land rises gradually from the water's edge, forming the most beautiful rural scenery in the

vicinity that can be found in the Province.

It was early settled, and among the pioneers who made their homes here, may be mentioned Elias Nicholson, Nathan Williams, Elias Jones, David Lent and Asa Burnham. In 1799, John McCarthy settled where the principal part of the town is now built, and is the only survivor of the earliest inhabitants. The town was surveyed by Messrs. Hughson & Saunders, Provincial Lund Surveyors, and immediately afterwards its settlement was proceeded with, when lots of one-quarter of an acre sold for one hundred dollars. Cobourg was incorporated and had a board of police in 1837; and in 1850 its affairs began to be managed by a mayor and councillors; and in 1859 it was separated from the counties, but it still pays a certain rate for the administration of justice, etc.

With a view of showing the early history of the town, we give the names of the persons and the dates of the establishment of the different branches of industry and trade. The first grist mill was erected by W. Carsons, the second by David Lent, and the first saw mill by Asa Burnbam. Elias Jones opened the first store in 1798; the next (fifteen years afterwards) was carried on by Jones Bethune, agent for the Upper Canada Bank, and the first postmaster. In 1806, the first tannery was started by Jeremiah Lapp. There was a large distillery built in 1807 by Z. Burnbam; and another, six vears afterwards, by Jones Bethune. The first brewery was established in 1833, by James Calcutt.

The Wesleyan Methodists built the first church in 1822. The Church of England built in the following year, and a Presbyterian Church was creeted in 1841. All these structures have since been replaced by elegant new edifices, which add greatly to the beauty of the town, and reflect credit upon its enter-

prising inhabitants.

Cobourg, previous to the coronation of Queen Victoria, was called Hamilton, on account of being in Hamilton township; but at that time a public meeting was called, and the name changed to Cobourg, in honor of the Queen. The following are the names of some of the parties present at the meeting:—Z. Burnham, Major Jones, Elijah Buck, Dr. Citchgus, Richard Hare, David Rodgers, and Henry Ruttan.

The Upper Canada Academy, a large and commodious building, was erected

in 1832. The name was changed in 1845 to the Victoria College.

Cobourg, from the time of its settlement, progressed rapidly; much more so, however, when the improvements in its harbor were made, and the Grand Trunk and Peterboro Railways were completed. The harbor was built by Government, but extensive improvements have been made upon it since it came into possession of the town. Within the last eight years the eastern pier has

been extended 350 feet, and the western one 200 feet. The harbor is now capable of sheltering with safety about one hundred vessels with easy access in all kinds of weather. There is a light house (built in 1850) lighted with gas, allowed to be the best lighted on the Lakes. Cobourg is visited daily by four steamers and several schooners.

Among its public buildings are, the Victoria College, the different churches, and the Victoria Hall—a magnificent structure, 44 x 80 feet, built principally of cut stone, in 1857, at a cost of \$100,000. It contains all the county offices, besides a spacious hall, capable of seating upwards of one thousand persons.

The hall is surmounted by a bell and clock.

Cobourg was early supplied with newspapers, The Cobourg Star being established in 1831, by R. D. Chatterton. The Sun newspaper was formerly published in Picton. The Sentinel was established by the present proprietor, Mr. D. McAllister. The World was started in 1864, by Mr. Henry Hough. The Canada Christian Advocate was first published in Cobourg, in 1845. It has since been removed to Hamilton.

Cobourg contains a number of fine brick stores, principally situated on King and Division Streets. Besides these, there are some very fine residences, with richly ornamented grounds, with every appearance of wealth and taste. Its educational advantages are superior, (the different schools will be noticed elsewhere) enhancing its value and desirability as a residence, while its manufactures and general business are in a favorable position.

The rich extent of country that stretches to the north of Cobourg, and its access to all the markets of the Province and the United States, both by rail and water, have added greatly to the material and permanent prosperity of the town. Among its prominent manufactures may be mentioned the large Woollen Mills of Messrs. Frazer & Co., the most extensive establishment of the kind in the annual consumption of wool being over 200,000 lbs. There is also a large distillery consuming over 120,000 bushels of grain per annum.

MANUFACTURES.

The Ontario Distillery, situated on William-street, was established by Captain Wallace, and is now carried on by David Burnet. He employs about thirty-five hands, and consumes upwards of 10,000 bushels of grain per month. The machinery is impelled by three steam engines. Harris' Creek supplies water for milling purposes.

ONTARIO WOOLLEN MILLS, situated on Harris' Creek, established fifteen years ago, by Mr. McKechnie, and now carried on by Messrs. Frazer & Co. The main building is five stories high, 50 x 100 feet, with a large frame wing and several detached buildings. The annual consumption of wool is 200,000 lbs., mostly Canadian. It turns out about 700 yards of cloth per day, and employs about 100 hands. The machinery is impelled by two engines of 30-horse power each. The Factory is well worth a visit.

ENGINE AND MILL WORKS.—This establishment is situated on Division-street. There are from 20 to 30 hands employed.

ONTARIO FOUNDRY, situated on Cottage-street, manufactures reaping machines, threshing machines, steam engines, mill gearing, etc.

VICTORIA BREWERY, situated on Hibernia-street, was established in 1862—Manufactures about 2,000 barrels annually. Machinery driven by steam.

Sash, Door and Blind Factory—Situated on George-street; has 2 planers, 2 circular saws, moulding and bevelling machines.

Kingley & Calcutt's Brewery—Established in 1833; consumes about 3,000 bushels of grain annually.

Besides these, there are two grist mills, one saw mill, four cabinet factories, gas works—which supply the town with light—and one potash factory.

CHURCHES.

Bethune, M.A. Three Sunday Schools in connection with St. Peter's Church. 1st,—St. Peter's School-house, adjoining the Church; attendance, 200; 22 teachers, and librarian. Superintendents—Rector and Curate. 2nd,—King-st., west; attendance, 35; 4 teachers; Wm. Conigal, Esq., superintendent. 3rd,—Elgin street, west; attendance, 50; Mrs. Ruttan, superintendent. Library for the schools, 550 vols.; Mr. Cox, librarian. Church served by the above clergymen, 2nd concession of Hamilton; red brick; built 1862; accommodates 150. Sunday School recently established. Three school-houses also served by the above.

Canada Presbyterian Church, situated on King-street.—Built of white brick, A. D. 1862, at a cost of \$20,000; seats 800. Rev. John Laing, Minister. Sabbath School in connection; 250 pupils; David Brodie, superintendent; library of 300 volumes; John Short and Donald Fletcher, librarians.

VICTORIA UNIVERSITY.

This Institution was founded as Upper Canada Academy in 1836, and chartered as a University in 1841. It embraces at present, the three faculties of Arts, Law and Medicine. The Medical School is conducted in Toronto; the annual attendance in all the faculties, is about 230; the average expense for board, tuition and incidentials does not exceed \$120.

The University is under the direction of the Wesleyan Methodist Church, but is open alike to all denominations. Sectarian tenets are not inculcated, but the moral principles and habits of the students are carefully guarded.

Extensive and well-selected cabinets of minerals and fossils have recently been fitted up, and the facilities for instruction in this department of science are now second to none in the Province.

There is an efficient Grammar School connected with the University,

open to boys not under fourteen years of age.

The Session in the University, and also in the Grammar School, commences on the last Thursday in August, and closes on the first Wednesday of May. The University receives \$5,000 a year from the Legislature, with \$800 additional for the Medical School at Toronto. The authorities of the University are required to report annually to the Government, and three members of the Executive Council, together with the speakers of both houses of the Legislature, are ex-officio members of the University Senate.

The village was laid out by Jas. Byers and Josiah Wilson, and surveyed by Wm. Walbridge, P. L. S., when Lots sold for \$100. The Post-office was established in 1859. F. Blakely was the first P. M., and also opened the first store, in 1858. The first hotel was started by Thos. Powers, There is a grist mill within a mile and a half of the village, started in 1863 by C. C. Cain, on Lot 20, 7th Con., Manvers, which is driven by a branch of Pigeon Creek. The village now contains two general stores, one grocery, two hotels, one wagon shop, one shoe shop, one saddle and harness shop, two blacksmith shops, one school, taught by Miss Grandy-the schoolhouse was built in 1862. There are two Churches, (frame), Presbyterian and New Connexion Methodist. The surrounding country is well cultivated; soil sandy. Principal business, buying and selling of grain, and general merchan-There is a daily mail arriving from Lindsay at 11:15, a.m.; and Port Hope, or from south, at 5, p.m. Mails are also sent daily to Ballyduff and Lifford, and tri-weekly to Burton and Janettville, at 8, a.m., and returning at 4, p.m.

A post village situated on lots 11, 12 and 13, fourth and fifth concessions of the township of Cavan, County of Durham. There is no regular plan of the village, the lots having been laid out as they were called for by the settlers. The first Grist and Saw Mill was built upwards of 45 years ago, by James Devell. The village made very little progress previous to the construction of the Port Hope, Lindsay and Beaverton Railway, which gave encouragement to the establishment of manufactories, and an impetus to business generally. The branch to Peterborough, which was completed in 1858, done much to improve the place. During 1855 a Foundry was started by Geo. Fair, who still carries on the business. A steam saw mill was also built in the same year by R. J. Armstrong. Mill Creek passes through the village, affording excellent facilities for manufacturing purposes; it empties into the Otanabic river, in South Mona-The village now contains in addition to the above a woolen ghan township. factory, flax mil!, 3 general stores, 3 groceries, carriage factory, 3 shoe shops, 2 tanneries, a watchmaker and jeweller, 3 blacksmith shops, a drug store, dentist, 2 physicians, 2 lawyers, 2 butchers, 2 cabinet factories, chair factory, 2 tailor shops, 2 milliner shops, a potash manufactory, and a printing office owned by Alfred E. Hayter, who publishes a newspaper called the Weekly Messenger, which speaks well for the enterprise of the place ;-it is now eight years since it was started; five hotels, a union school, a substantial brick building crected in 1857, at a cost of \$1,600, capable of seating 150 pupils, 4 churches, Episcopal, Presbyterian, Weslevan Methodist and New Connection Methodist. The fourth Division Court is held here, Wm. Turner, clerk. Mails received daily from Pert Hope at 11.40 a. m., and 4.20 p. m.; from Lindsay at 11.40 a. m. and from Peterborough at 4-40 a. m. Millbrook is distant from Port Hope 18 miles, from Cobourg 25 miles, Lindsay 24 miles, Peterborough 14 miles, Mount Pleasant 7 miles, Cavanville 3 and-a-half miles, South Monaghan 6 miles. A gravel road passes through the village, being the leading road from Port Hope to Lindsay, a distance of 45 miles, 26 of which is comploted. In the vicinity of the village the land is of excellent quality, producing wheat, barley, oats, &c., in great abundance. The post office was established in 1846. Matthew Knowlson, first post-master. The township of Cavan agricultural society holds its annual exhibitions here. Millbrook contains a population of about 1,100.

GORE'S LANDING.

Gore's Landing-so called after Thomas Gore, Esquire-is a Post Village situated on Rico Lake, which is an expansion of the river Treut. This lake is 22 miles long, the widest part of which does not exceed three and-a-half miles, and covers an area of 60 square miles. There is a good gravel road from this village to Cobourg, a distance of 12 miles, and is distant from Port Hope 15 miles. There are a number of the first pioneers still residing in the village, some of whom had considerable capital, and others by their industry have provided for themselves a competency which they now enjoy. The vicinity of Gore's Landing is not destitute of romantic scenery which ever attracts the eye of a traveller, and for wild flowers, as to beauty and variety, it surpasses any place we have ever seen. The following are the names of the first settlers, and also the dates at which some of them settled :- Judge Falkner, 1836; Colonel Robert Brown, 1845; Capt. Alfred Hayward, 1842; Thomas Traill, Esq., James Finley, Esq., J. Hatris, Esq., and the Rev. Mr. Bridges. A woolen factory was started in 1855 by Joseph and James Brooks, now carried on by J. A. Gordon. Wm. Brown, Esq., was the first post-master. Clanerton's steam saw mill was erected in 1861, now carried on by Wm. Dalye, capable of sawing 12,000 feet of lumber per day, and employs 14 men.

TRENTON.

For the description of this flourishing village we are indebted to the publisher of the Hastings Directory.

Trenton is an incorporated village and port of entry, situated at the confluence of the river Trent with the Bay of Quinte. It contains a population of over 1,600 inhabitants, and if we include its outlets lying on the immediate precincts, at least 200 more may be added to this number. Before its incorporation a great portion of the village was in the township of Murray and county of Northumberland; but since that period it has formed a portion of the county of Hastings. Its situation at the head of the Bay of Quinte and at the mouth of the river is beautiful and picturesque, and many spots on the high lands and

ridges which surround it, present delightful views of the bay, or the windings of the Trent, and contribute to furnish such views as many a painter would be delighted to delineate with all his artistic skill. The rapids of the river, which extend from a mile above the village to eight miles into the interior beyond the village of Frankford, afford many a striking picture as the waters rush wildly on between wooded islands and the deep banks of the stream. A local poet, long ago removed by the hand of death, has beautifully described these peculiarities

of the river in language congenial to so striking a theme.

The vicinity of Trenton p essents to the geologist and naturalist much of especial interest, and more particularly to the former, as here are the upper shally stream of the Trenton limestone of the New York and Canadian classification of the lower silurian series of rocks, and abounding in fossils. Here are crenoids, brachipods, cepalopods, and trilobites, in great profusion, sufficient to delight the eye and reward the research of any paleontologist, and three miles up the river on the west side, and on the banks of a tributary stream, there is evidence of glacial action in the shape of a large boulder 22 feet high at the most elevated point, and whose longitudinal circumference is about 114 feet. This boulder compares favorably with many published accounts of such in other parts of the world in bulk, and is not destitute on its storm-beaten sides of botanic interest.

A large business is done here in the rafting of square timber for the Quebec market. A large quantity is brought down the river for this purpose from an immense range of country divided by the Trent end its tributaries, and in the year 1864 it amounted to about 5,000,000 of cubic feet of square white pine, together with a quantity of eak and elm, amounting to about 500,000 cubic feet. The whole of this re-ratted and formed into bands or drams suitable for progress down the rapids of the St. Lawrence to Quebec. The period of the humberers being detailed here is from a fortnight to four weeks, and gives a great business to the merchants. The yearly number of saw logs brought down the Trent and sawn up here for the American market is about 140,000. In addition to these there is an average brought down the Mora and Salmon rivers and towed here of 40,000 logs, for the same purpose. This gives during the Beason employment to a large number of schooners in the conveyance of the sawn lumber to Oswego and other American ports, from which they bring back salt, plaster, water lime, &c.

There are in this vicinity two large steam saw mills, one owned by Messts. Gilmour & Co. of Quebec, and the other, on an island below the mouth of the river, belonging to Saciford Baker, Esq. Messra. Gilmour's mill saw annually from ten to fourteen million feet of boards, and the daily capacity of the mill for this purpose is from 100,000 to 110,000 feet during the 24 hours. There are in this mill five gates or gangs of saws, besides double and single, edging, splitting and cutting saws, lath machine, planing machine, &c., &c. The mill

gives employment to over one hundred men.

The steam saw mill of Mr. Sandford Baker contains four gangs of saws, viz, slabber, stock-gang, a gang nomed the Yaukee gang, and single, which latter is now being replaced by a new full gang, making in all seventy-five upright saws. This mill will cut in the day of twelve hours about three hundred and forty 18-inch logs, or 50,000 feet of boards, and employs about sixty hands. In addition to this there is a complete butting table and edging machine, also a lath mill which cuts 20,000 laths per day, and employs seven boys. The mill during the seven months of the year it runs, viz., from April 20th, to November 20th, cut cut 10,000,600 feet of boards, merchantable in the American market.

At no great distance from Messrs. Gilmour's mill, and on the shore of the

Bay of Quinte, is the steam grist will, brewery and stave factory of J. F. Filadeil, Esq., which latter has been but recently erected, at a cost of over \$2,000. On the north side of the wildare, on a tributary of the Trent, are the two grist mills of E. W. Meyers, Esq. Three miles up the river is another excellengist mill, exected by the late C. Weaver, Esq., and now owned by Geo. H. Gordon, Esq. It has these run of stones, and its capacity is about 100 barrels a day.

Above and below the mill for miles there are mill sites in abundance, and water power to drive machinery, cotton, woollen and flax mills, &c., which, if they were only in the hands of capitalists, from the copious supply of water, would afford ample manufacturing power for these purposes, and such as would give the banks of the Trent something of the aspect of Lowell, in Massachusetts—Manchester of the United States.

A little higher up the river than Mr. Gordon's mill, and on the opposite or eastern bank, there is the paper mill of Messrs. Ford & Taylor, recently erected, and now in full working order. Between this and Mr. Gordon's mill, a long-talked of bridge is to be built, and the probability is that the work will not long be delayed. Along the west bank of the river there is an excellent gravel road to Frankford, eight miles.

In the village is a large tannery worked by steam power, belonging to W. H. Austin, Esq., and also another smaller one belonging to Mr. R. Pearce. There is a carding machine at the lower mill of Mr. E. W. Meyers. A tin factory, for making stamped and pressed tin ware, has been recently erected by W. Shea, Esq. It is said to be the largest in Canada.

On the east-side of the river, near Messrs. Gilmour's fine stone store and offices, is a large stone foundry and two-storied machine shop and engine house of the same material, of ample dimensions, built by Sheldon Hawley, Esq., for his son, the late J. G. Hawley, Esq. It presents facilities of a most desirable character, with the adjoining wharf and storehouse, for this business.

The facilities for ship-building at Trenton can scarcely be surpassed in Western Canada. Materials can be so readily produced there, and ships could be built and litted for ocean navigation here at the head of the Bay of Quinte, from which, by the St. Lawrence, they would have ready access to the Atlantic This is now being appreciated, and a large schooner was built during the surmer of 1864, by the Messes, Gibnour. Her length of keel is 115 feet; breadth of beam, 26 feet; depth of hold, 9 feet 6 inches; burthen 385 tons.

There are in Trenton ten dry goods stores, three drug stores, two harness shops, groceries, provision stores, hotels, &c., &c., sufficient for the community in and around the village. A large amount of European and Canadian manufactured goods are brought up from Montreal during the year by water and by rail.

There is a town hall, built of stone, 60 x 40 feet, at a cost of \$3,000, of some architectural pretensions, having a council chamber, ante-room, &c., in the second story. The lower story is occupied with butcher's stalls, clerk's office, and lock-up. Around it is an open space with hay scales, fire engine house, and ground for outside market.

The places of worship are four in number, viz., the Church of England, of stone, with a square tower, and a nave of over 60 feet in length, a chancel 20 feet in length, and in the advanced early style of ecclesiastical architecture.

Rev. W. Blensdell, M. A., Examining Chaplain to the Lord Bishop of Ontario, Rector. There is a Wesleyan Methodist Church, of frame, with a beautiful price. There is also an excellent pursonage belonging to this church. Rev. Mr. Russ is minister. The Canada Presbyterian Church (free) has a next

building of frame, Rev. Thos. Killough, minister. The Roman Catholic church is of frame, with an excellent stone residence for the resident minister, Rev. H. Brettargh.

Trenton is the established site of a grammar school, and has two excellent

common schools. There is also a Roman Catholic separate school.

Trenton is distant from Toronto 100 miles, Kingston 66 miles, Belleville 12 miles, Frankford 8 miles, Brighton 10 miles, and Cobourg 34 miles. The railway station is about a mile and a quarter from the village; Mr. John McColl, station master. The principal business streets are Water and Dundas streets, to which may be added Elgin street, leading to the market, and now rising into importance.

BOWMANVILLE.

Bowmanville—so named after Chas. Bowman, Esq.,—is an incorporated town, pleasantly situated about two miles and a half from the Lake, in the County of Durham. There are two excellent mill streams passing through it, and in every respect it possesses superior advantages. It was first laid out in 1832, and, at that time, contained a grist-mill, saw-mill, store and school-house. Prior to 1831, it was called Darlington; but at that time a meeting was held and the

name changed to Bowmanville. The incorporation now extends north to the road between the 2nd and 3rd concessions of Darlington, east to the 8th lot, and west to the 14th. The town made rapid progress until 1837—at which time a crisis took place-and it improved very little for some time. It has the advantage of a good harbour-Darlington, now called Port Darlington-which is said to have the longest pier on the north side of Lake Ontario. The first Church (Episcopal) was built of frame in 1845, which has since been replaced by a brick structure. There are now nine Churches, viz: Episcopal Congregational, Wesleyan Methodist, Episcopal Methodist, Presbyterian, Bible Christian, Roman Catholic, Established Church of Scotland, and Disciples. There is also a good Union School-Grammar and Common. The Montreal Mail Line call here daily, and Freight Boats carry produce, &c., to and from Oswego and other Ports on the Lake. The Wharf was built by a Company called the "Port Darlington Harbour Company." There are several Private Schools in A regular Market was established in 1855, from which time the place made rapid progress, and now contains 3,000 inhabitants;—in 1849 it contained but 1,000. Two Foundries were started—one by Jacob Nuds, and the other by Wm. Porter-about 1855. A steam Cabinet Factory was built in 1856, and a Tannery in 1835, by G. Gifford. The completion of the Grand Trunk Railway done much towards the improvement of the place, having greatly increased the business. There is a good Gravel Road from Toronto to Kingston, and another extending from the Port to Scugog Lake, passing thro the townships of Darlington and Cartwright. The town at present contains about 40 places of business, including a number of manufactories. Darlington and the South Riding of Durham Agricultural Society holds its annual exhibition here. There is one weekly paper, the British Canadian. Total imports for the year ending June, 1865, \$38,436; exports, \$152,603. Mails received daily.



PORT HOPE.

Port Hope is the county town of the County of Durhem. It is beautifully situated in a small valley on Smith Creek, the mouth of which forms an excelent harbour, well sheltered from the East, West and North. It was formerly called Smith's Creek, and about the year 1820, the name was changed to Port Hope, it being situated in the township of that name. It is distant sixty-three miles from Toronto—one hundred and seven miles from Kingston, and seven

miles from Cobourg, the county town of the United Counties.

The site of Port Hope and the land in its immediate vicinity is very pretty and romantic, the western side of the town being composed of a succession of little hills rising one above the other, the highest commanding a fine view of the town and lake. The business portion of Port Hope is chiefly built in the valley, the sloping hills on each side being occupied with numerous elegant private residences, the owners of which appear to have taken advantage of the natural beauty of the situation and added much in the way of ornament.

The first settler in Port Hope was a United Empire Loyalist, named Myndert Harris, having arrived in June, 1793, at a time when there were scarcely any inhabitants from the head of Lake Ontario to the Bay of Quinte. The early settlers like all pioneers endured many hardships, having to take their grain to Belleville, in the County of Hastings, a distance of about fifty-six miles.

The first grist and saw mill was started here in 1796, by Smith & Walton, a grant of 600 acres of land being made to them by Government, on the site where the town now stands for the purpose of building the mill. The first frame house built in the township of Hope was erected by Peter Smith, Esq., in 1798. It is situated on King street, and is still occupied. From 1798 to 1820 the place improved slowly. In 1815 a store was started by Jeremiah Briton, others followed by Charles Fethergill and John Brown. The first distillery was built in 1802 by Elias Smith, and the first tannery in 1800, by Joseph Coldwell—the second tannery was started in 1820 by Joseph Roberts.

The first church was erected in 1818, by the Episcopalians. It is situated

on King street and is vet in use.

Port Hope was incorporated with a board of Police in the year 1851. Its incorporation as a town took place 2 years afterward; subsequently, the first Mayor was John Tucker Williams, Esq.; the present is C. Quinlan, Esq.

The first newspaper was started by John Vail, in 1831. The Port Hope Gazette was commenced in 1844, by Wm. Furby; other journals were started at different times; there are at present three weekly newspapers in Port Hope, viz: the Guide, Canadian and Valuator. The latter is in its first volume.

Port Hope enjoys excellent facilities for manufactures and commerce, being on the line of the Grand Trunk Railway, and the southern terminus of the Port Hope, Lindsay and Beaverton Railway—and also having the benefit of navigation during the summer, with excellent roads leading out of the town from every direction. In 1842 the township of Hope and the town of Port Hope only contained a population of a little over four thousand. In 1850 the township alone attained a population of four thousand six hundred, and the town of the summer of two thousands are hundred; and at present contains not fewer than four thousand five hundred.

The value of exports sent to the United States (no account being taken of produce, &c., sent to Montreal and other British Ports) during the season of 1850, was about \$300,000, of which there was \$38,000 worth of lumber, \$15,000 worth of wheat, and \$16,000 worth of flour—the remainder consisted of

stock and produce.

The imports for Port Hope and Peterboro' for the year ending June 30th, 1865, were \$159,179—duties on the same \$16,002. The exports for the same time were altogether, \$833,862—of which \$456,434 was produce of the forest; animals, \$231,009; agricultural produce, \$241,810; manufactures, \$2,854; other articles \$1,755: this is exclusive of what was sent to Quebec and other parts of Canada.

The educational advantages possessed by Port Hope, are ample. There is a good union grammar school, besides primary schools in the eastern and western section of the town. There is also a mechanics' institute, organized in 1855—

situated on Walter street.

Manufactures of various kinds—particularly the buying and selling and forwarding of lumber and wheat (in which there is a large capital employed) has

been a source of great prosperity to Port Hope for some time.

The general business comprises numerous stores and workshops of the various branches of mechanical industry—among its mills may be mentioned that of Barrett, erected in 1854, on Smith's creek—it contains four run of stones and is capable of grinding about twenty-five bushels per hour. The Port Hope Plaining mill and door, sash and blind factory is situated on Elias street; it has two circular saws besides all the other necessary machinery. Barrett's hosiery carding mill is situated on Cavan street; besides custom carding the manufacturers consume annually 50,000 lbs. of wool.

Wm. Craig & Sons' Morocco manufactory was established in 1852, and is

now doing an extensive busines.

NEWCASTLE.

An incorporated village and port of entry situated in the township of Clarke, on the Kingston and Toronto gravel road and on the shore of Lake It received its name from what was formerly called the Newcastle The Grand Trunk Railway passes through it, affording excellent traffic advantages to the place. It is at present in a very flourishing condition and contains many good and substantial brick structures, among which we might mention the Church of England, situated about the centre of the village, south of Main-street, which was erected at a cost of several thousand dollars; also the Union School building, which is a very spacious structure. The village was laid out in 1841, by the Hon George Boulton, surveyed by John K Roche, PLS, when lots sold at from \$50 to \$400. It is distant from Port Hope, 17 miles, from Cobourg 24 miles, Toronto 48 miles, Bowmanville 5 miles. In 1841 a wharf was built by a joint stock company at a cost of \$4,000, including warehouses. It has since been extended. The following are the officers of the company:—Hon George Boulton, president; Ira Wilson, Esq, vice-president; Francis Nicholson, wharfinger and sec'y. The first grist mill was built in 1845 by the proprietors of the land upon which the village was laid out, and contains four run It was re-built by Mr Wagstaff in 1862. Another grist and of stone. flouring mill was erected in 1853 by Andrew McNaughton, containing three run of stones. The village now contains 6 general stores, 4 groceries, 1 foundry and machine shop, employing from 40 to 56 hands, with 20-horse power engine, I woollen factory, I planing mill, I pitch fork manufactory, 3 carriage and waggon factories, 1 chair factory, 4 blacksmith shops, one watchmaker and jeweller, 5 shoe shops, 2 tailor shops, 1 tin shop, 1 brick and tile manufactory, and also a brick manufactory, 2 tanneries, 1 saddle and harness maker, I marble factory, I wholesale and retail druggist, four hotels, I lawver and I dentist.

These mills have been rebuilt by Robt. Wright, who still carries on business. The village now contains a steam sawmill, two hotels, one wagon shop, one shoe shop, one blacksmith shop, one grocery, a good school, trught by Mr. Newton; also a church—New Connexion Methodist. COLBORNE.

An incorported village pleasantly situated on the 1st and 2nd concessions of the township of Cramahe, (South-half of lot 27, 28, 29, 30, 31, and 32, of the 2nd concession, and north-half or the same, 1st concession.) In 1852, Colborne contained only 600 inhabitants, and the business of the place was at that time exceedingly limited; but since that date it has greatly increased in population and importance, and is now one of the most enterprising villages in the United Counties of Northumberland and Durham. In 1858 it become a separate municipality, (11th December) the administration of which is carried on by a village Council, presided over by a reeve. It contains at present a population of one thousand one hundred; two grist mills, I saw mill, I foundry, two tanneries, one pottery, one sash, door and blind factory, two waggon and carriage shops, two harness makers, 4 boot and shoe shops, one tin shop, two bakeries, three drug stores, three cabinet factories, 4 physicians, six general stores, five groceries, three tailor shops, 4 hotels, a good union school, Grammar and Common. There are three teachers employed. The building was erected in 1860, at a cost of \$3,500, and is capable of seating 200 pupils; 4 churches: Church of England, Presbyterian, Wesleyan Methodist and Episcopal Methodist. The principal business consists of the shipping of lumber, shingles, staves, &c., which are sent to Albany, Oswego, Rochester and Troy. There is a good gravel road passing through the place, extending to Castleton. The village is distant from Norham 14 miles, Workwarth 15 miles, Campbellford 13 miles, and from Hastings 24 miles. The 7th Division Court is held here, of which James F. Reid, Esq., is clerk. The Toronto and Kingston gravel road passes through the place, also, the Grand Trunk Railway. The Registry office for the East Riding of the County of Northumberland is here, J. M. Groves, Esquire, Registrar.
