Burying the Dead at Naples. A description has been given in the London Times of the Campo Santo Vecchio—the pauper burying ground at Naples, and the almost in credible horrors that take place there. The place is first described :-

" At the Campo Santo Vecchio is a large court yard; it is about 150 yards square, and is enclosed within four walls, which are decorated with gaudy frescoes taken from subjects in Scripture history, The pavement is composed of large blocks of stone, and the mouth of each of the 365 vaults or pits is easily discernible by the iron ring, by means of which, at the appointed time, the stone is raised. The burial, if indeed it can be dignified by such a term, takes place every day at 4 p. m. exactly, and the courtyard is open to all. Any bodies that may be brought after 4 p. m. are not buried until next day; they are placed in wooden shelves fitted into the west side of the courtyard."

The writer was present at one of the burials A number of coffins and trucks containing bodies were lying about. A priest came and rapidly muttered a brief form of words. Then this took

"The first two coffins contained the remains of adults, a man and an elderly woman, but as they were decently clothed, and had been dead long enough to allow the rigor martis to set in, the sight was less revolting than that which followed. They were each tilted out on the pavement, and then pushed head foremost into the pit, where they fell with a dull heavy sound among the bones and skeletons, browned with the mouldering of the previous twelve months. The nex was a smaller coffin, and contained the remains of a young girl about 14 years of age. In life slie must have been a lovely child ; she was neatly but parrly dressed, and her head was pillow-ed on freshly-gathered flowers. What would the bereaved one who placed those flowers there and catching hold of the skirts of the frock, lit erally toss the beloved remains head downwards into the pit. It was indeed a ghantly spectacle, the desecration of that fair young corpse, her hair flying about, and her limbs not yet stiffened in death! The next in order was a full-sized coffin, and, as I learned from the conversation of the employes, was a contribution from the Albergo di Poveri poor-house. What followed sounds incredible, nevertheless it is true. The lid of this coffin was already ajar; and no wonder, for when it was raised there were disclosed to view the bodies of a number of young children, closely packed, one on the top of the other!
