

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS

A pamily, or any male over 18, years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberia. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Land Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any aggency on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six mouths' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, sofely owned and occuse pied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section along side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.
