

Canning Items.

Rev. Joseph Bellar exchanged pulpits on Sunday with Rev. Mr. Lane, of Vermont, Chaplain of 93rd (Cumberland) Regiment, who gave two very able and interesting addresses. Mr. Lane was the pastor of the Methodist church here twenty-two years ago.

Scarcity of Teachers.

Public schools opened on August 22nd and September 8th. It will be seen from the list appended that a large number of sections have not yet teachers. It may be that a few on the list have neglected to notify the Inspector of the opening of their schools. In this case they lose their grants, until they comply with the law and send the required notice.

That sections will not have to do without teachers for the fall year, arrangements have been made to grant temporary licenses, in cases of weak sections failing to get teachers. To do this trustees must certify that they cannot get licensed teachers, and ask that a temporary license be granted to those holding at least a grade IX certificate and an M. P. Q. certificate, or in extreme cases to those holding only the grade IX certificate. This latter is a new regulation and will be permitted only in extreme cases. Let all such extreme cases be reported to the Inspector as soon as possible.

So far has been from doing it that he has been a leader in the practice of spending public money for political purposes.

He has systematically bribed his own constituency with public works of a sort which in Ontario are left to municipal and private enterprise.

He has spent at least \$150,000 in that one riding. The Public Works estimates of this year, with their 1,257 items, with their eighteen millions of expenditures, are absolutely keeping with his methods.

Cabinet secrets are well kept, but even Cabinet Ministers talk at times, and this much has crept out, that at the council board Mr. Fielding's voice has not been for economy or for order and systematic expenditure.

He has not, it seems, challenged expenditures and made each Minister proposing a new way of spending money slow as the Chancellor of the Exchequer does in England or as the unpopular Mr. Foster did in his day.

Rather it has been an attitude of the Minister who was careful and scrupulous lest that he might be reproaching money which would not be saved in any case and which some more lavish colleague would get the advantage of spending.

In a word, Mr. Fielding has not attended to his special job. He has not controlled the expenditure. He has let it drift. He even hampered extravagance.

RECKONMY AT A DISCOUNT. Why is it that a Minister who has not figured in the two great achievements of the Administration and who has not discharged his own particular job in the Cabinet, should stand so high? For one thing, economy long has been at a discount. The revenue has been very large and the public has not looked sharply at the way it has been spent.

For another thing, his Parliamentary standing. For another, his party has been very successful in his own Province. Men on the inside of things in the East will tell you that the Nova Scotia victories are really due to an exceedingly well-organized machine of which Mr. Pearson is the chief and Mr. Fielding, but the titular chief, still, Mr. Fielding gets the credit. Then, he is exceedingly active in management work, and so is a power within his party. Always full of business; with so many appointments that he is unpunctual for most of them; restlessly stirring a finger in every pie; clever in rapid getting up of detail work; so occupied with detail work as to lose sight of essentials; always all a politician eagerly scanning every phase of every situation for a party advantage; these you have the Finance Minister.

NOT A LEADER. Leadership! Not a bit of it. Instead, with all his activities, his position in that respect has got some of late, the French Canadian Liberals having taken a dislike to him, so that it is very doubtful whether, on Sir Wilfrid Laurier ceasing to reign, the reversion really would be his. These things are obscure, but it looks very much as if on the one occasion when he came along a big matter of policy he alienated the French element. There are stories about his deep reluctance to swallow the surrender of Liberal principles in 1905, of his having been on the point of resignation, of his having cleared out his desk in order to vacate his office. If the stories are true, and there is much to corroborate them, his hesitancy seems to have given offence.

The inner affairs of the Liberal party need not trouble us. Open and patent facts are enough. Mr. Fielding's claims to consideration rest purely upon the fact that he is a clever speaker in Parliament. He has not so much mismanaged his position as the Finance Minister as that he has managed it at all. He has thrown away one of the most brilliant financial opportunities ever presented to a public man.

The historian of 1905 probably will set Mr. Fielding down as the most overrated politician of his day. C. F. H.

Talmage on Tobacco. Dr. Talmage, in a sermon on 'Tobacco,' spoke as follows:

'You say to me: Didn't God create tobacco? Yes, in not God good? Yes, well, is not tobacco good when created by a good God? Yes, your logic is complete, but God created common sense at the same time, by which we are to know how to use poison and how not to use it. That tobacco is a poison no man with common sense will deny. But, you say, have not people using it lived on to a good old age? Yes, I have seen inebriates seventy years old. At Boston, some years ago, there was a meeting in which several centenarians spoke. One had been an inveterate smoker, while another declared that he had hardly seen a sober moment for the last fifty years. How many outrages a man may commit upon his physical system and yet live on! In the case of the man of the jug, he lived on because his body was a physical pickie, while he of the pipe lived on because his body was turned into a smoked liver. But what is the advice to be given to the young people who are here this day? First of all we must advise them to abstain from the use of tobacco, because the medical fraternities of the United States and Great Britain concur in calling this habit destructive and unhealthy. Temperance reformers will tell you that tobacco creates an unnatural thirst, and this causes more drunkenness in America than any thing else. I say in the presence of his assembly to day that the pathway of the drunkard to Hell is strewn with tobacco leaves. American Christians smoke five million dollars' worth of tobacco. I speak to-day in the presence of a vast multitude of young people who are forming their habits. Habits are easy to acquire, but hard to get over. You must smoke either expensive or inexpensive tobacco. If it is cheap, it contains lime, tellers, earth, lamp black, burdock and other things, and little tobacco. How can you afford to put such a mess as that into your mouth? Many young men—otherwise and more properly called duffers—are daily seen strutting about on streets, swelling their chests and unking themselves, complete and offensive by their cigar smoking and pious, swelling manner. A million of such fops, gathered into one grand army, would not be worth, even for a great moral show, much less for fighting purposes, the coat of the 'kid gloves' you know; they would always insist on wearing.
