But we must keep in mind that it is to those who are conducting our stores that we look for the greater amount of money for the town and county coffers and also we believe from them come the major portion of the amounts figuring on public voluntary lists.

A community without stores would be a pret-

A community without stores would be a pretty mean place in which to reside. Stores without business are impossible. Now what about those who are buying out-of-town articles which might be purchased in town. Are they not pulling in the direction of a storeless community and are they not whenever they send a cent out-of-town that might have stayed in town, cutting down the town revenue as well as striking a blow at our voluntary contributions?

How is the money raised to buy fire apparatus, clean our streets and do the hundred and one other things that is done by the town? By taxation, everything knows lhat. And what are the two broadest divisions in property? Why, residential and business of course. And which is the more valuable? Business property, you will reply.
