A WARNING TO NAPOLEON.
On December 29, says the "Tablet," the publisher of the "Unita Cattolica," S. Bernardino Bandi, appeared before the correctional tribunal at Turin, charged with an offence against the Emperor of the French, committed by the publication of two articles in the "Unita Cattolica" of Nov. 23 and December 11. The tribunal states that "the two articles in their entire content are an offence against the dignity and majesty of the Emperor—first, by making the Emperor Napoleon III. appear to be a man without faith, wanting in his duties of Catholic sovereignty towards the Emperor of the Church, who draws back and retreats in the face of danger, and conducts himself so as to cause the ruin of the French Empire; and further, by apostrophizing the Emperor in other similar ways."

A scene occurred at the Virginia Hotel yesterday, of a more touching character than we remember to have witnessed for many years.
Years ago, there lived in the neighborhood of Atchinson, Kansas, a family of the name of Bryant, consisting of the husband and wife and one child, about eight years old. The father was a drunken worthless character, who treated his wife in a most brutal manner, never providing anything for the family, which was supported entirely by the exertions of the wife.
Mrs. Bryant sometimes employed a certain young woman to assist her about her house, and in the course of time she observed that the husband paid little or no attention to his wife, and she immediately called him to task about it. A quarrel ensued, and separation was the consequence. The father disappeared suddenly from the neighborhood, stealing the child away with him, and although the half-distracted mother made every effort to discover his whereabouts in order to recover her child, no news concerning him could be obtained, other than that he had started down the Missouri River. At the time of separation the poor wife was in almost destitute circumstances, but, laboring faithfully and persistently, she enlarged her worldly store slowly, but surely, and now she appears upon the scene a lady worth \$60,000.
But through all these years she has never given up the hope of finding her lost child, or relaxed her efforts, and these efforts with a tearful happy success.

STANBRO INSTANCE OF SOUTHERN DESTINATION.
The Louisville Courier of the 10th relates the following: "We have not, for several years past, heard of a case that showed as plainly the amount of destination existing amongst the poor of our city and the South in general, as that which came to our ears yesterday. The gentleman hitched his horse and proceeded to where the woman designated her miserable retreat to be, and there, wrapped up in some dry blankets, he discovered a young woman, sleeping in the hollow of the tree, sheltered by some old pieces of boards and bark. He awakened the unfortunate woman and asked her her

name, Dr. Beard, who was acquainted with the father, that he believed this boy must be the one so long lost. The news, of course, was a long time getting through, but upon its receipt the doctor started for Clarksville. When he arrived, the college had been broken up, the lad was gone, and the doctor's wife a failure. So matters stood until last December, when, by a train of circumstances which we have no room to enumerate, traces of the wanderer were again obtained. The doctor again started after him, and the boy was found in the neighborhood of the town mentioned.

But here a new difficulty arose. The lad, believing his mother long since dead, refused to believe the joyful news related to him by the doctor, and on being urged to accompany his new found friend to New Orleans, by sea, utterly refused to do so, and expressed his belief that the whole history was but a plot to inveigle him into the Imperial army in Mexico. ARRIVAL OF THE ENGLISH MAIL.

HALIFAX, February 18, 1867. The Royal Mail Steamer 'China,' Capt. Hockley, arrived at Halifax this morning at half past five o'clock.

THE QUEEN'S SPEECH.

London, Feb. 8.—The following is the speech made by the Queen at the re-opening of the Imperial Parliament to-day:—

My Lords—In again recurring to your advice and assistance, I am happy to inform you that my relations with foreign powers are on a friendly and satisfactory footing.

The members of the neutrality commission, who will be entrusted with the delicate duty of reporting upon the Alabama claims, intend to commence their consultations soon after Parliament meets.

Mr. Vane, (Conservative), who formerly represented Dublin, has been elected, without opposition, to the Derby Government a legal appointment.

A vacancy in the representation of Cork county has been caused by the death of Mr. G. E. Barry, (Liberal), who was first elected to the seat in July, 1865.

It is said to be the opinion of political France that the British Cabinet is in extremis; either it must bring in a Reform Bill and face all its old opponents, or decline to do so, and go into the Opposition lobby.

Some of the semi-official journals of Paris affirm positively that no French loan is in contemplation; but it is reported that some financial measures of a bold and sweeping character will be introduced.

Another report concerning King Victor Emmanuel has gained currency in Paris. This time the rumor is of the assassination of his Majesty, but that he has fallen into a dangerous state of illness from congestion of the brain.

The long list of reform demonstrations made since Fortin and Adolphus have rejected the moderate proposals of the late Government, is being repeated, now that Parliament is on the eve of meeting.

According to reliable information, the Morning Post has reason to believe that the long-pending differences between Hungary and the Court of Vienna have been satisfactorily adjusted.

The Globe says that "the Italian Government has come to the resolution to obtain intervention of any kind in the affairs of the East, and to cultivate friendly relations with Turkey as well as Austria."

The proposal in the Italian budget for the liquidation of the Church property is just now engaging much attention in Florence, and opinions are widely divided upon it.

Mr. Gladstone has been elected almost to certainty in Paris, where for several days he was an object of intense curiosity.

The relations between Landlord and Tenant in Ireland have engaged my attention, and a bill will be laid before you, which, without interfering with the rights of property, will offer direct encouragement to occupiers of land to improve their holdings.

The subject of the freedom of the church in Italy and the conversion of its property continue to engage much of public attention both in Paris and Florence.

At a recent examination at Harvard College, Boston, Mass., the first prize, a gold watch, worth fifty dollars, was awarded to Mr. Evert Cameron, of Newburyport.

The High Sheriff declared the Hon. Geo. Colles and F. Kelly duly elected without opposition.

CONFEDERATION.

Resolutions in favor of a more intimate Union of the Provinces of Canada, Nova Scotia, and New Brunswick, have been passed by their several Legislatures, and the delegates, duly authorized, and representing all classes of Colonial party and opinion, have assembled in the conditions upon which such a union as will be submitted to you, which, by the consolidation of Colonial interests and resources, will give strength to the several Provinces as members of the same Empire, and animated by feelings of loyalty to the same Sovereign.

Every man which we receive from the United States, brings tidings that the day is fast approaching when, to all human appearances, this prediction will be verified to the letter.

The war between Spain and the republic of Chili and Peru still continues; the good offices of our Government in connection with that of the Emperor of the French, having failed to effect a reconciliation.

The protracted negotiations which arose out of the acceptance by Prince Charles, of Hesse-Cassel, of the throne of the Danubian principalities, have happily terminated, by an arrangement which has been sanctioned by the concurrence of all the powers signatories of the Treaty of 1856.

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I have heard with deep sorrow that the calamity of famine prevails heavily on my subjects in some parts of India, and I instruct you to urge an alleviation of that country to make the utmost exertions to allay the distress which prevailed during the autumn of last year.

The persevering efforts, and unscrupulous assertions of treasonable conspiracies, have during the last autumn, excited the hopes of some ill-considered persons in Ireland, and the representatives of the loyal population; but the firm and temperate exercise of the power entrusted to the executive, and the hospitality manifested towards the conspirators, has had the effect of restoring peace and tranquillity to the whole of that Kingdom.

I trust that you will consequently be enabled to disprove with confidence any exceptional legislation for that part of my dominions.

I acknowledge with deep thankfulness to Almighty God, the great decrease which has taken place in the number of the poor, and I trust that the visitation of the former will increase attention to those salutary measures which experience has shown to be the best preventive.

I have directed the estimates for the ensuing year to be laid before you. They have been prepared with due regard to economy and the requirements of the public service.

Your attention will again be called to the state of the representation of the Colonies in Parliament, and that your deliberations, conducted in a spirit of moderation and mutual forbearance, may lead to the adoption of measures which, without interfering with the balance of political power, shall freely extend the elective franchise.

The frequent occurrence of disagreement between the employers of labor and their workmen, causing much private suffering and public loss, and occasionally leading, as is alleged, to acts of outrage and violence, has induced me to issue a Commission to enquire into and report upon the causes of the said disagreements, and to propose measures for their mitigation.

I have directed bills to be laid before you for the extension to other grades of the beneficial provisions of the Factory Acts, and especially those reports by the royal commissions on the employment of children, and for the better regulation, according to the principle of those acts, of workshops where women and children are largely employed.

The condition of the mercantile marine has attracted my serious attention. Complaints are made that the supply of seamen is deficient, and the provisions for their health and discipline on board ships are imperfect. Measures will be submitted to you with a view to increase the efficiency of this important service.

I have observed with satisfaction the resolution introduced into the navigation laws of France. I have expressed to the Emperor my readiness to submit to Parliament, a proposal for the extinction on equitable terms, of the exemption from the local charges on shipping, which are still enjoyed by a limited number of individuals in British ports, and leave in anticipation of this step, already admitted British ships to the advantages of the new law.

A bill will also be submitted to you for making better provision for the arrangement of the affairs of the Railway Companies, which are enabled to meet the measures which will be necessary to make this enquiry effective.

The frequent occurrence of disagreement between the employers of labor and their workmen, causing much private suffering and public loss, and occasionally leading, as is alleged, to acts of outrage and violence, has induced me to issue a Commission to enquire into and report upon the causes of the said disagreements, and to propose measures for their mitigation.

I have directed bills to be laid before you for the extension to other grades of the beneficial provisions of the Factory Acts, and especially those reports by the royal commissions on the employment of children, and for the better regulation, according to the principle of those acts, of workshops where women and children are largely employed.

The condition of the mercantile marine has attracted my serious attention. Complaints are made that the supply of seamen is deficient, and the provisions for their health and discipline on board ships are imperfect. Measures will be submitted to you with a view to increase the efficiency of this important service.

I have observed with satisfaction the resolution introduced into the navigation laws of France. I have expressed to the Emperor my readiness to submit to Parliament, a proposal for the extinction on equitable terms, of the exemption from the local charges on shipping, which are still enjoyed by a limited number of individuals in British ports, and leave in anticipation of this step, already admitted British ships to the advantages of the new law.

A bill will also be submitted to you for making better provision for the arrangement of the affairs of the Railway Companies, which are enabled to meet the measures which will be necessary to make this enquiry effective.
