Canadian exports to Great Britain increased in the eleven months ending last November by \$8,750,000.

Four more elections to the House of Commons took place last week, and four more Liberal Conservatives were elected.

It is now said that the Conservative majority in the House of Commons will be a source of satisfaction to those who have profited by the opportunities afforded of performing acts of charity and philanthropy.

First our choice production jumps up from nothing to \$9,000,000; the cattle trade rises to a similar sum; then Canadian industries expand by a hundred millions invested capital in ten years.

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Sir Edward Reed's recent manifesto against home rule raised a storm of indignation among the liberals of the Cardiff division, which Sir Edward represents in the House of Commons. Sir Edward says in the "Herald" of Friday night and in other papers, that his change of faith.
