THE CROP CONDITIONS ON C.P.R. IN ALBERTA

First Crop Report Shows Conditions to be Highly Satisfactory—Seedling About Over in Most of Provinces—Detailed Reports From Various Places.

Calgary, May 17.—The first crop report for the season filed by the C. P. R. station agents at various points throughout the country is on the whole favorable.

On the average 90 per cent of the seeding is completed, and from several points the report is sent that the crops are up one and two inches. So far there has not been a single report received of any loss from lack of rain or from frost.

These reports are received by the C. P. R. once a week, and cover the week ending yesterday.

NEVER EQUALLED IN ITS GRANDEUR

Impressive Ceremony Marks Conveying of King Edward's Remains to Westminster Hall

London, May 17.—Dignity, reverence and beauty mingled today in the impressive ceremony with which King Edward's mortal remains were taken from Buckingham palace to Westminster hall, there to lie in state.

Through Westminster hall tonight 100,000 persons passed with absolute decorum, saying the last tribute of loyal subjects to their dead sovereign although they were not permitted to look upon his face.

Remembering what passed recently the juxtaposition was tragic, the Lords and the Commons two black coated, silent masses, faced each other at the altar of him, who was peace-maker for nations and who sought to be peacemaker at home.

It was the first time in history that the two houses have been brought in juxtaposition as such to-day.

All agree that the splendor of Victoria's jubilee and Edward's coronation were unequalled in the history of the monarchy.

No greater crowds ever assembled in London than those, a deep cloud of black behind a fringe of scarlet uniforms that edged the short course through which the procession trod.

The procession moved slowly to points of vantage along the funeral's short course. There was no crowding, no pushing, no shouting.

The coffin of oak from Windsor Forest, was mounted on a gun carriage and laden with the royal insignia.

After the kings and princes followed a squadron of Life Guards, the solemn funeral cortege, mounted on black chargers, as the cortege passed the troops, 6,000 of them gave the royal salute, the last but one. Then came the Queen Mother.

"Lower your heads," whispered the officers, and with one motion the busied heads of the troops sank as the Queen Mother passed between the two lines of soldiery.

The regular monthly meeting of the local board of trade was held Tuesday evening when a large number of members were present.

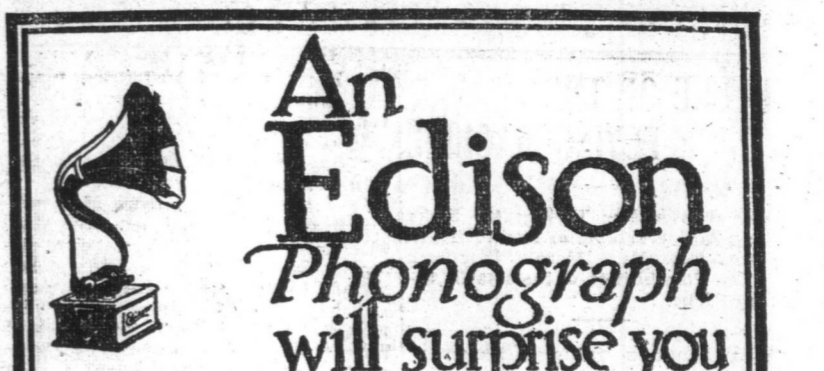
