





Out of 19 ministers present at that meeting only one now remains in Newfound-

"Some have gone to lands far dis tant, and some are gone from us for ever, longer here they may not stay They have reached a fairer region, far away, far away!"

The lecturer paid a glowing tribute of respect to those self-sacrificing men who had laboured so cheerfully under trying conditions in all weather over sea and land. He gave some pleasant reminescences of his life on the circuit, Fortune, Channel, Herring Neck Bonavista, Elliston, Freshwater, Western Bay and Greenspond. The four years spent in St. John's West were the happiest of all being a continuous picnic. The people were very kind to him and proved their love in a practical manner when they made up a purse for himself and Mrs. Lench and enabled them to go to England on three months holiday. They had the grandest time of their lives, while six kind hosts boarded their six children while they were absent. Very kindly eferences were made to the kindness of our people, their self-denial, hospitality and the ingenuity of our fishermen, their success abroad. Playing Billiards With One Hand.

Champion Collins, of England, Tells the Story of His Career—Celebrated Match Recalled.

The reason why I first began to play to exlain, says Frank Collins, the onehand billiard champion of England, in an English paper. Fourteen years ago I was in charge of a large billiard sa-Icon in London, and as I was such a good exponent of the spot-stroke, then allowed in the game, I had always to give my oponents either a very hig start or to play them on 50 and 100 breaks. One day there came along a gentleman whose form I knew well, who said he had at last found a "handicap" he could take me on atviz., that if I would play him 500 up. on level terms, myself using only one hand, and no rests whatever, he would back himself to heat me for £10.

Well. I knew his capabilities, and se asked for a week or two to think it ver. During that time I practised hard at this strange one-hand play and after a while I came to the conclusion that I had an excellent sport ing chance at it against him. So we made the match, which duly came off. and I won the game by 200, making three breaks of over 50 each, much to In each case first aid was rendered by his surprise.

At that match the room was crowded, and several people present who owned or rented billiard saloons made me good offers to play exhibition matches with one hand at their places. Just at first a trifle nervous abou doing this, after due consideration l accepted, and so began my one-handed billiard career, which has proved so strikingly successful.

Of course I use no rest at all in making my strokes, not even when I have to use the long "butt." Naturally there is a tremendous strain on the arm in holding this unwieldly article, let alone in making a stroke with it. But practice has enabled me even to overcome this difficulty, and to-day I can play with the "long-arm" practically as well as with my own ordinary cue.

The hardest stroke to make with one hand is the forcing stroke from the centre of the table; but as a rule I bring that off successfully three times out of every four. I can make any screw-shot equally as well with one hand as with two, and I can play the masse shot very well also with one hand. Indeed, I believe that, though some other players are able to play with one hand fairly successfully, on the whole. I am the only cueist who can make the masse shot successfully under those conditions

Playing with one hand, I have exceeded 100 in a break at least six dif ferent times; I have also made a break of 99 off the red alone with bonzoline balls, and one of '90 similarly with ivory balls.

My highest break playing one hand with both hands has been 420. I have naturally had matches against most of the chief amateurs and best-known professionals, and usually I have come off the best, though occasionally this or that first-rate amateur has said at the beginning of the game that he was sure it was impossible for me to play with one hand as well as he could

with two. The best one-handed man I've ever met was a cueist named Reeves. against whom I played in a money match at Brixton. He played extreme ly well, though I won easily; but our styles were quite different, as Reeves played with the left hand where I used the right I also played D. Kellard one hand he being allowed to place a handkerchief on the side of the table when he wished to keep his cue steady and to use the rest in the middle of the

table. Nevertheless, I beat him. I must have been born with the billiard instinct, I suppose, as my father was George Collins, the famous cueist of the earlier John Roberts and Joseph Bennett period, whilst my sisters, Ella, Ethel and Eva. are, as most folks know the finest lady players at billiards in England, all of them being now coaches at various celebrated
