



"Neither do I," the old woman agreed.



The general feeling of Australia seems to point to readiness on part of commonwealth claim our seat in imperial council, directly our share in practical defense of empire attains a magnitude which would warrant the claim. Meanwhile Australia is steadily proceeding on agreed lines in building up a efficient squadron.

DUBLIN, To-day.

Asquith last night was the recipient of another ovation at the hands of Dublinites, both inside and outside the Theatre Royal, where he made an address. Asquith who was accompanied by his wife was greeted by enormous crowds who repeated the welcome they gave him last night. Redmond, leader of the Nationalists, in introducing the Premier to his auditors, said such a reception never hitherto had been accorded to any Cabinet Minister, and never again would be until Asquith came to Dublin, attending the King to open an Irish Parliament. Asquith's speech was interrupted at times by male and female suffragettes, several of whom were violently ejected from the theatre. The speech was a warm defence of the Irish cause, and characterized opposition to Home Rule as merely obstructive and chaotic, but powerless to wreck. The Home Rule Bill, the Premier said, would be sent to the House of Lords before Christmas. He then added, with patience and discipline the end is in sight, because no longer is it possible for the Lords to override the decision of the people. The triumph of Ireland's cause, Asquith declared, would be a first step in Imperial reorganization which Home Rule was the one and the only solution. Expressing disbelief in the possibility of civil war in Ulster, the Premier repeated his previous statement that the Government stood ready sympathetically to consider proposals to strengthen and safeguard that country. While the meeting was proceeding, extraordinary scenes were witnessed outside the theatre. Suffragettes who attempted to make a demonstration were set upon by the populace, who tried to throw them in the River Liffey. The police interfered for their protection.

## MURDERER CONFESSES

### Killing Julia Connors, Hottville Innocent.

The murderer of Julia Connors a twelve year old girl has confessed to the crime, and Earnest Hottville the innocent Newfoundland boy who was arrested on suspicion is now absolutely cleared of the charge. A New York despatch of the 16th has the following:—  
"Events moved rapidly to-day in the proceedings to fit the responsibility for the brutal murder of 12-year-old Julia Connors, in the Bronx last week. The father of Nathan Swartz, the young hanger-on of pugilism, who has been sought in connection with the crime, admitted to the grand jury that his son had confessed to him that he was guilty of killing the girl. Mrs. Frances Alexander, sister of the youth, corroborated the statement and gave the jury the first details of the tragedy which has called out all the resources of the local police for a week past.  
"At the conclusion of hearing filled with sensational testimony, the grand jury unanimously voted in favor of an indictment of murder in the first degree. On account of the late hour the drawing up of the bill was put over until to-morrow. Mrs. Alexander's repetition of the story of the crime as she said her brother had told it to her, was detailed, explicit and telling in its revelation of horror.  
The Story Told by the Sister  
Mrs. Alexander, according to Attorney Nott, told the jury that her brother said he had met Julia Connors on Saturday night and asked her to take a pair of opera glasses to his home, which is just across the hall from the vacant flat where the murder was committed. The young man said he followed the girl, and at the top of the stairs pushed her into the flat and attempted to assault her. The child screamed, according to the story of Mrs. Alexander, and then Nathan said he plunged his pocket knife into her. She continued to scream, the witness testified, and Nathan stabbed her until she finally

fell and then plunged the knife into her breast near the heart. Then Julia remained still.  
and procured the box in which the body was found. He placed the still living child into this box, after cutting off her hair, put the box on the dumb waiter and let it slide to the bottom.  
Following the Body to the Cellar.  
He went to the cellar and took the unconscious child from the dumb waiter and laid her in the cellar. He then went home, Mrs. Alexander said he told her, and went to sleep.  
Early the next morning (Sunday) he took the girl, still alive, into the lot where she was found. Mrs. Alexander said she threw the youth out of her house when she heard the tale. He then went to his father's place of business, where he told the same story according to the father, who corroborated the daughter's story.  
Other witness were called, but their testimony was insignificant with that offered by Samuel Swartz and his daughter.

other details of the agreements the Premier entered into with the underwriters. Why should the Premier not disclose the exact rate of commission and the charges he agreed to pay in 1910 and 1912?

It was contended by the correspondent of the N. Y. Post, before the 1912 loan was put on the market, and before the Premier had agreed to subscribe, that the Premier had agreed to pay such a high rate of commission that the public would be shy in investing. There can be no shadow of a doubt as to the event, whether the cause assigned was right or wrong. The public were shy. That part is testified by the highest authority, Messrs. Coates, Son & Co., who advised the Prime Minister, yesterday that the public had taken up only £55,000 of the £400,000 debentures put on the market.

The Daily News, as an offset to this, says the New Zealand loan was not taken up readily by the public. But that loan was issued at 99, while the Newfoundland loan was issued at 93. In other words New Zealand offered £3 10s. a year for the loan of every £99 less underwriters' commission and charges, while Newfoundland offered £3 10s. a year for the loan of every £93 less similar charges, or for about £87.

Newfoundland 3½ per cent. bonds were issued at a discount of 7 per cent. while New Zealand 3½ per cent. bonds were issued at a discount of 1 per cent. As the public were shy in taking up these New Zealand bonds, the editor of the Daily News who has had free access this week to that fountain of financial wisdom, Sir Edward Morris, characterizes the New Zealand venture as a "public failure."

If the Daily News phrase is just and appropriate in its application to the New Zealand venture, what kind of a public failure was the Premier's 1912 financial venture?

Morris's loan was issued at a cheaper rate than ever any Newfoundland 3½ per cent. loan was ever issued before, six points below the price of the New Zealand loan, and yet the public take only £55,000 of the £400,000 bonds issued. The percentage of the loan taken up yesterday was stated in the cable message to be only 15 per cent. This is an exaggeration. Messrs. Coates, Son & Co. advised Sir Edward Morris yesterday that the public had taken only £55,000 of the £400,000 offered. A simple calculation will show that this is not 15 per cent. of the issue but only 13½, and it follows that the underwriters held 86½ per cent. of the debentures left on their hands. If the New Zealand venture was a public failure, how much greater a public failure must the Morris venture have been. Morris offered 3½ per cent. at 93, six points lower than the New Zealand offer, and at a cheaper rate than ever a Newfoundland 3½ per cent. had ever been issued before, and in spite of these features favourable to investors, and in spite of it being a registered and inscribed stock in which trustees are authorized to invest, only 13½ per cent. of the debentures were taken up by the public.

If the shyness of the public, in investing in the new New Zealand 3½ per cent. at 99, warrants the editor of the Daily News in dubbing the New Zealand venture a public failure, how can the shyness of the public in investing in the new Newfoundland 3½ per cent. at 93 be a transaction in which "Sir Edward Morris has been signally successful." If the ill-success of flotation of 3½ per cent. at a high price is a public failure, want of success in the flotation of 3½ per cent. at a low price is a phenomenal public failure. How then can the editor of the Daily News be so inconsistent and illogical in his statements, unless he is among, to use his own words, "those blinded by party passion."? If he was warranted in dubbing the New Zealand venture by a term of opprobrium, how can he justly eulogize Sir Edward on a more palpable misadventure? How can a worse misadventure be a signal success? Answers echoes—Only by the blindness of party passion. I thank thee Jew for that word.



Your memory, our dear Sogarth Aroon, shall remain green in our souls. May God in His goodness grant you long life and health to continue your good work.



## The Sagona on the Bar.

Strikes on the Bar at Entrance of Harbor Grace—Will Come Off.

While going out of Harbor Grace this morning at 1.30 on her way to Labrador the S. S. Sagona, Capt. Parsons, went ashore on the Bar which is about 200 yards off Point of Beach.

It was very dark and thick at the time and the ship, we hear, was running at less than half speed when the accident occurred. The bottom there is sandy and the Reid Nfd. Co. believe she will float off easily at high tide.

All the passengers, several of whom are tourists from the United States, are remaining on board, and passengers by the local train to-day say the water is very smooth where she struck and that no danger to the ship is apprehended, though should a N. E. wind come up a heavy sea would heave in and make matters bad for her.

The Prospero left for the scene of the accident this forenoon, and the Ethie left Carbonear at 11.45 to render any necessary assistance. It is likely some of the freight on board will be transferred to these ships to facilitate the floating of the steamer.

We learn from the Reid Nfd. Co. that the ship is making no water and it is not thought she will suffer much damage. She is not tilted but is perfectly upright, and when she struck there was no panic, Capt. Parsons and his officers re-assuring the passengers—all of whom were in their state-rooms. Messages were received by the Anglo and Postal Telegraphs of the same purport as those which the Reid Nfd. Co. got.

Hon. J. C. Crosbie went to the scene by the Prospero and Mr. St. Hill went out by train.

The ship is fully covered by insurance. If the ship is not damaged much she will resume her voyage as quickly as possible.

I enclose you a clipping from a Stock Exchange Report taken from the London Standard to show you what I state is correct. If New Zealand can command 99 for her 3½ per cent. Bonds, why was Newfoundland to accept 93? The answer is clear—the country has been discredited by Morris and his gang.






